



In 1992 he married Regena (Foster) Graham, and they made their home in Oklahoma City. They enjoyed retirement and traveling to many parts of Europe and the United States.



Regional Food Bank to Shut Down Volunteer Opportunities to Public, Continue Distributing Food to Partner Agencies Across Oklahoma

In an abundance of caution and in compliance with orders from state and local officials, the Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma will close its volunteer opportunities to the public, effective Wednesday, March 25, until further

"We appreciate the leadership of both Gov. Stitt and Mayor Holt on taking measures to keep at-risk populations as safe as possible while still allowing us to serve the one in six Oklahomans facing hunger as well as those impacted by the shutdowns," said Deb Bunting, interim CEO of the Regional Food Bank. "We thank everyone who has volunteered since the COVID-19 pandemic reached our state and want to assure all that the safety of volunteers, staff and the fellow Oklahomans we serve is a top priority."

In place of volunteers, the Regional Food Bank staff will work shifts to continue to prepare emergency food boxes to be distributed to community-based partner agencies in central and western Oklahoma. The staff will continue to operate under the new volunteer model that adheres to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's social distancing guidelines. The Regional Food Bank continues to operate in Disaster Response mode as it works to provide food assistance to Oklahomans who are food insecure and the increasing number of Oklahomans impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It is the very mission of the Regional Food Bank to provide food assistance where needed in our service area and that's what we'll continue to do," Bunting said. "Challenging times such as these require us to be innovative and make the most of our resources and that's what we are doing."

The Regional Food Bank's partner agencies report a nearly 25% increase in the number of people they are serving this week. The Food & Resource Center in Moore served 130 households on Monday and more than 30 families were visiting for the first time.

"We can't thank our partner agencies enough for serving on the frontlines to fight hunger each and every day and now helping to meet the additional need as a result of the COVID-19 impact," Bunting said. "Our work would truly not be possible without these valued partners."

Anyone in need of food assistance should visit rfbo. org/get-help to find a pantry closest to their home. It is recommended to first call the pantry to confirm hours of operations and if any restrictions are in place. They can also call the Regional Food Bank at 405-972-1111 during

to cases until they were all cured or gone. Now, if you have the same system of 100 people, but this time half of them stay still and away from others, then positive cases would rise slowly to a threshold and gradually decrease. Which results in less cases over a longer window.

Finally, if all but a few of those 100 people stay still and secluded, the one's who've contracted the virus, whether they first be at home or on the move, will have less opportunity to infect the others. This would result in the lowest rise of cases over a given period of time.

The closer we can get to this last level of seclusion the better for our healthcare workers as cases would be reduced and spread out. This would allow them to treat the patients without a shortage of equipment.

While this 3-week closure may seem extensive with

key businesses remaining available, the economic impact should be greatly reduced compared to a mass contraction of the virus across the country.

Experts in the economic/financial fields have hopes that global turn-around of the world's economy will be quick as China's factories become operational and other countries come out of their social distancing policies. For most of the world, the working age group of people are some of the least effected by the virus.

Multiple drugs/serums/vaccines are being tested in labs around the world. So, as this year moves forward, each day brings us closer to beating this outbreak. We just need to be smart, practice good hygiene, and do our best with the policies we're given.



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


Higher Ground

An Assignment

"Lord, you have an assignment for me today. Give me eyes to see and faith to believe that you can use me. May I not let fear or other supposed hindrances defeat your plan for me."

This prayer hangs in a frame on the wall just Jim Morrison above my computer. I don't know the author,



but for me it captures the mission I have as a follower of Jesus. It says in effect, "Jim you are not free to follow your own desires, you belong to me." It is poor English, but true nonetheless that, "I've been died for." The assignment may be to "plant corn," if you are a farmer. If a pharmacist, it may be to have a greater concern about the health of those you serve than the financial reward you receive. The apostle Paul wrote to the new Christians in Colossae, "And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

One of my favorite quotes is from the late Elton Trueblood, Quaker philosopher/theologian. He is quoted in The Best of Elton Trueblood, An Anthology; "A Christian is a person who confesses that, amidst the manifold and confusing voices heard in the world, there is one Voice which supremely wins his full assent, uniting all his powers, intellectual and emotional, into a single pattern of self-giving. That Voice is Jesus Christ. A Christian not only believes that He was; he believes in Him with all his heart and strength and

While we may struggle to know the assignment God has called us to fulfill, often the greater problem is having the faith to believe that God can use us. We may not question the power of God, but too often we see ourselves as "grasshoppers" unable to defeat the giants in our life. The risk is too great, so we play it safe; we count the cost and decide it's not worth it.

We fear being misunderstood or being perceived as being "radical or too spiritual." This is not to say that we should not pray urgently or seek godly counsel but we must listen primarily to that One Voice who speaks with power and assurance.

This week I visited via email with a former BCM student, a graduate of SWOSU, who left a comfortable position as student pastor in a church in Louisiana, and together with his wife, two small children, and a small group traveled to the Brooklyn section of New York City to plant a new church. They had just begun to build momentum when the virus hit. Now they are hunkered down waiting for the next step. Pray for Greg Gober and his wife Tamra, that they will be safe as they try to be creative in ministry.

We urgently need to pray that as the weather warms the virus will lose its power. Pray for the health care workers who put their lives at risk to care for those involved. Pray for those in positions of authority that they will have wisdom and insight to make careful and good decisions. Then pray for all the public school students, and collegians who will be cheated out of their last semester of school with all its memory making events. God loves us and knows all about this. Southwest Intermediary Finance Team & SWOSU Honored for Partnership

Southwest Intermediary Finance Team, Inc. (SWIFT), was among 27 business and higher education partnerships throughout Oklahoma that were recently recognized as innovative collaborations that further the education of Oklahoma's workforce.

Southwestern Oklahoma State University and SWIFT officials attended the Edmond luncheon to honor the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's (OSRHE) Business Partnership Excellence Award winners.

SWIFT is a private, not-for-profit U.S. Department of Agriculture lending intermediary. SWIFT's impact has benefitted SWOSU and the 14 counties it serves in southwest Oklahoma, according to Doug Misak, director of the SWOSU Business Enterprise Center.

One of the results of SWIFT's work is Dr. Trey Thomason. After completing medical school, Thomason returned to his hometown, Hinton, to establish his practice with the benefit from a SWIFT grant. With the nearest hospital 22 miles away, this clinic provides access to essential health care that some rural patients otherwise would not receive.

SWIFT is housed at the Timothy T. Day Business Enterprise Center on the SWOSU campus. SWOSU President Randy Beutler serves on the SWIFT board and former SWOSU President John Hays is the SWIFT board chairman. SWIFT borrowers benefit not only from the financing they receive for their businesses but also from expert technical assistance provided by the organization. SWIFT has had a positive impact on the economy of southwest Oklahoma, contributing to nearly \$17 million in earnings and the creation of 319 jobs.

Misak said the university is proud to collaborate with SWIFT in strengthening the state's workforce.

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Regents Business Partnership Excellence Award is designed to highlight successful partnerships between higher education institutions and businesses and to further cultivate the higher learning environment through State Regents' Economic Development Grants.
