

on August 25.


Dan Day and Kenneth Tidwell, both Clinton residents, are vying for the Custer County Sheriff's position.

The above pictured \$10 gold eagle coin was certified by the Professional Coin Grading Service as a Mint State 65 which is considered by collectors as a Very Choice Brilliant Uncirculated Gem.

This gold coin sold at auction on June 4, 2020 in Dallas, Texas for \$408,000.

Oklahoma's voting site (www. ok.gov/elections) is full of registration links, information about the election board, and an all-new "OK Voter Portal". The "OK Voter Portal" is an all-in-one convenient client that allows voters to check their registration, find their polling place, change information (address/party/etc.), and request ballots. The Portal is run through the Oklahoma State Election Board,

which is an administrative agency that conducts state elections and provides oversight to all 77 county election boards. The Oklahoma State Election Board's website also has a series of frequently asked questions covering almost all voting concerns.

June 30th's votes will also be for positions around Custer County. These positions and the candidates will have a Political Forum on the radio on Wednesday, June 24th at 6 pm. Candidates for the Custer County Sheriff will begin at 6 pm and Custer County Commissioner candidates will be on at 6:30 pm. The broadcast can be heard on the KWEY and the KCLI stations, and it will also be streamed on Coyote TV.

voting site to familiarize themselves with the candidates and the website's layout before the election. The Agape Medical Clinic in Weatherford will be re-opening on June 25th with some added precautions. 

STATE PARKS PARKING FEES - The Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department is implementing an \$8 daily parking fee for Oklahomans and \$10 for out-of-state visitors at 22 state parks. State Representative Harold Wright of Weatherford says he's not happy about the fee. The state says, locally, the fee will be implemented at both Foss and Ft. Cobb State Parks.

WEATHERFORD LARGE GRASS FIRE - Fire departments from Weatheford and the surrounding area teamed up to battle a large grass fire that started along the edge of Cedar Canyon and spread to about a quarter mile from Cedar Canyon housing addition. Fire Chief Mike Karlin says the fire burned about 200 acres. Karlin says the fire appears to have started accidentally, as a result of some fencing work. Some evacuations occurred for a short time.

County Commissioners have approved the 2020 resale apportionment, a total of \$300,000, that will go to municipalities and schools within the county, and also the

municipalities and schools within the county, and also the county general fund. The monies are deemed as excess funds in the county resale property fund. \$100,000 will go to the county general fund. Municipalities within the county will get a portion of \$100,000 as will school districts within Custer County.

**DEWEY COUNTY BURN BAN** - Dewey County Commissioners implemented a burn ban. The action comes after fire crews used suppression efforts on the Jeffrey Ranch fire, southwest of Vici in Dewey County, that broke out June 11th. The Oklahoma Department of Forestry says the fire has burned at least 463 acres.

HYDRO-EAKLY GRADUATION - An in-person graduation ceremony for the Hydro-Eakly class of 2020 will be held this month. The ceremony will be held June 27th at the Hydro-Eakly Event Center beginning at 7pm. A ticket is required. Each Senior has received 30 tickets for the ceremony.

 $\boldsymbol{SWODACENSUS}$  - Officials with the Southwestern

Oklahoma Development Authority say the 8 counties that they represent in Southwest Oklahoma have a census response rate of 45.69% as of June 14th, up from 40.5% the previous week. Roger Mills County raised its response rate from 27.7% to 40.1% in just one week. Custer County has a response rate of 51.1%, Beckham County 45%, and Washita County 46.7%.

**CLINTON RINKEL QUARANTINE** - Clinton interim city manager Gene McCullough says Police Chief Paul Rinkel is currently quarantined from exposure to COVID-19. McCullough says day-to-day operations are being handled by Ray Hammonds. He says there will be internal testing of the Police Department for possible exposure.

FORT COBB DROWNING - There was a drowning at Fort Cobb Lake in Caddo County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says the body of 42 year old Casey Satterlee of Edmond was located in the water, west of Bird Island, after he jumped in to try and rescue an 8 year old boy who fell from a flotation device. Authorities say the boy was able to swim safely to shore.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS FILING ENDS - One city council race has developed in the city of Clinton and two races are on tap for City Commissioner seats in the city of Weatherford after the three day municipal filing period. In Weatherford, there is a three-way race for City Commissioner in Ward 1 as Rick Miller is challenged by Terri Lockhart and Cameron Page. Ward 3 Commissioner Warren Goldmann is challenged by Lezley Bell. In the city of Clinton, Ward 4 Councilman Bobby Stewart is challenged by former Councilman Mustafa Sami. Mayor David Berrong and Ward 2 Councilman Ernie Dowdell did not receive opposition in their seats.

**ELK CITY INTERIM CITY MANAGER** - The Elk City Commission unanimously approved Tom Ivester to serve as interim City Manager. The move comes after the City Commission recently terminated the services of former City Manager Lee Litterell.

# **Higher Ground Thoughtful Prayer**

Many of us struggle to pray thoughtfully and with fervency. Sometimes we feel we don't know the right words to use, or feel inadequate in expressing ourselves. So our prayers become more of a ritual, like listening to the National Anthem before

sporting event. The apostle Paul, when writing to churches while he was in prison, often expressed his heart's desire in the form of prayers. One of my favorites is found in Col. 1:9-12a. It reads as follows:"For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you and asking God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding. And we pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, and joyfully giving thanks to the Father."

Maybe this is more of a description of his prayer rather than the prayer itself, nonetheless it pictures clearly what Paul thought was primary. So we can assume that as he thought of that young church, struggling in the midst of paganism, he put forth what he thought was most important—what he felt God wanted to see happen in their hearts and lives. Let us look at some of the areas with which he was most concerned.

he was most concerned.

First of all, he prayed that they might know God's purpose or will. This would come through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. It was spiritual wisdom and understanding they needed. This, in turn, would result in a life that was worthy of the powerful God they served and would be pleasing to Him. Out of that would come fruit through their good works, and they would grow in their knowledge of God. In this manner they would be strengthened with power. He was not thinking of power to run over others or arrogant power, but effectiveness as opposed to meaningless labor. This power was to come from God, not the wisdom of human effort. This power would bring patience and endurance. They were facing hostile attacks from those who would diminish the sufficiency of Christ so Paul knew they would need to endure and be patient, not giving in to pressure. Finally, they were to joyfully give thanks to the Father. There is no joy quite like the joy of obedience.

Do you see any connection between Paul's concern for the churches and our prayer concerns of today? Certainly, we would all like to know the mind and heart of God in our daily pilgrimage. We would like to know that our efforts and plans would be pleasing to God. Do we not desire fruitful labor that would lead to knowing God more intimately? Is our heart cry that our children would lead lives that count, that make a difference? Then pray that they would be strengthened with God's mighty power. And we would all desire greater patience and endurance during these hectic days. Meditate on this prayer of Paul and his prayers for other churches in Ephesians and Philippians. You prayer life will become more fulfilling and exciting.

# SWOSU Men's Golf has three named All-America Scholars

Heston Brown, Kason Cook and Gregor Weck of the SWOSU Men's Golf team are among the record-setting group of 614 collegiate golfers from Division I, II, III, NAIA and NJCAA who have been announced as Srixon/Cleveland Golf All-America Scholars. The teams were announced by the Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA) on Wednesday.

Of the 614 honorees, 376 players were Division I selections, 99 in Division II, 108 in Division III, 18 from NAIA, and 12 from NJCAA. 2020 marks the first year in which sophomores are eligible for the award.

To be eligible for Srixon/Cleveland Golf All-America Scholar status an individual must be a sophomore, junior or senior academically in Division I, II, III, and NAIA, or receiving their Associate's Degree and in their last year of athletic eligibility in the NJCAA. In addition, they must have a stroke-average under 76.0 in Division I, 78.0 in Division II, 78.0 in NAIA and 79.0 in Division III, 77.0 in NJCAA, and maintain a minimum cumulative career grade-point average of 3.2. For 2019-20 only, they must participate in 40% of the team's competitive rounds.

"I am extremely proud of what each Heston, Kason and Gregor have accomplished this season, both in the classroom and on the golf course," SWOSU Head Golf Coach Brad Fleetwood said. "All three of them are great examples of what it means to be a student-athlete and



fantastic representatives for our university."

Cook, a senior from Hydro, earns the award for the second consecutive season, joining previous recipients Marques Gomez (2016-17), Stefan Idstam (2016-17) and

Wouter MyBurgh (2012-13) as two-time award winners. Brown, a junior from Cordell, and Weck, a junior from Wiesbaden, Germany, both reached All-America Scholar status for the first time in their collegiate career.








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# The making of a good cattle drive

What is more iconic of the American West than images of Cowboys and horses all saddled up and steering cattle ever northward? For me, nothing. Cowboys and cowgirls are the epitome of hard work and struggle. From the early 1850's through the early 1900's, some 27 million head of cattle were herded through the West. They were moved out of Texas, driven north through Indian Territory to Kansas and sometimes beyond,

until they arrived at the

railheads where they would be loaded into cattle cars and railed east to a hungry and waiting nation. This may sound like a fairly simple job: over there are cattle, that way is North, go, and cattle will follow. Nothing is that simple with cattle. Let's take a look at one cow, be it a steer, bull, heifer, or calf. They have a good sized brain but they don't understand the human very well. Now let's add a few hundred or thousand more to the misunderstood group and what you have are thousands of horns, hooves, fly-swatting tails



and one large manure factory trying to figure out what is going on in their disrupted world. Understandably, there is a lot of clatter going on. All cattle drives had their crew. The Trail Boss would make the plan, the

Point would execute the

plan, the Swingmen and

the Flank kept the herd in line, and the Drag brought up the rear. Though not directly associated with the cattle, The Wrangler and the Chuckwagon were essential parts of the team as well. No one job was more important than another, all were essential for a successful drive.

every cattle drive was the Trail Boss. It was his decision who to hire, how many head could be handled, and where each man would be positioned on the drive. He also had to choose the time to start. Too early and there wouldn't be enough green grass for the cattle. Too late and he risked not having forage due to other herds being ahead of him. Then there is the weather to consider. For instance, Spring storms meant swollen rivers. One thing the Trail Boss kept in mind was that the Cimarron was notorious for swallowing cattle, horses and riders. The job of Trail Boss held a lot of headache.

The Point's job was to lead the herd according to the plans laid out by the Trail Boss. His main concern was how to set the pace. Too slow and the cattle began to wander, too fast and the cattle lose valuable weight. If the

The 'Big Chief' of path was too rocky, injury to the herd could occur. Horses with stone-bruised hooves move slowly and a severely injured animal had to be put down. He had to be aware of quicksand in the river bottoms, bogs around creeks, and keep his eyes peeled for trouble. Indians were rather peaceful on the trail, but they did often charge a toll of 7-10 head to cross their land. The Trail Boss would negotiate and both parties would move along in peace. There was Rustling but not like in the movies.

> The main job of the Swingmen was to keep the cattle bunched up. By letting the line of cattle 'belly out,' there would be the risk of a blowout and cattle running off in all directions. The Flank held a similar position at about 2/3 of the way back. Their job was to keep the herd from fanning out.
