

Dick Carr, the rodeo legend

I have followed him into his workshop, a room adjacent to his house. It is filled with strands of twine, finished ropes and partially-finished ropes. The smell of leather tinges the air; it feels scared to me. Photographs of rodeo champions, posing with him are scattered about. They watch us as if they are the angels and saints of this small chapel. I see Lane Frost and find myself choking up. Dick Carr picks up a bottle, containing oil sent to him by a close friend. As he places it to his finger, he gently moves to the bull riding rig that he is currently crafting. He places the oil onto a small piece of hide and begins to offer a blessing.

Dick Carr is a rodeo legend. Not just because he was one of the early bull riders of the beginning days of the sport, but simply because of who he is and what he has done for rodeo and rodeo champions. There is an aura, or presence, to him. You either take to him and he to you or it just doesn't happen. He reads people

rather well. At 86, Dick Carr is still very sharp and steady. If you're wondering why I use both names, well, there is something about him that requires it. It's sort of like saying John Wayne. You wouldn't call 'The Duke' just John.

Born to parents, Horace and Gladys Carr in 1932, he was raised on a farm north of Canute. The family moved closer to Beutler Brother's ranch between Hammon and Elk City. There Dick Carr discovered what would become his life's passion. At ten years old he knew. "I wanted to be a Cowboy, not just a cowboy but a bronc-riding, bucking rodeo cowboy." Not many of us are so lucky to know our path at such a young age.

Watching the cowboys and hired hands at the rodeo stock ranch set a fire burning in him. "I wanted to be a World Champion Bull Rider." His mother and father saw his conviction and never held him back, his mother taught him early on to pray. It was one of the most valuable gifts he ever received.

By age 17, Dick Carr started entering rodeos. His goal, at first, was simply to ride well enough to win a buckle like he had seen on some of the cowboys he admired. He rode brones and bulls but soon focused solely on bull riding. It was in Prescott, Arizona that Dick Carr


won his first buckle. "You either gave 100 percent to riding them suckers or you weren't," he said.


The cowboys who rode the rodeo circuit were a pretty close knit group in those days. "They took me in and took care of me." Guys like Harry Tompkins, World Champion and All-Around Cowboy, Jim Shoulders and Casey Tibbs, I knew 'em all," he tells me. It is quite a list and it grows to this day.

He admits he wasn't the best bull rider, but he managed to place well enough to go to New York's Madison Square Garden 6 times, Calgary once and went to Cheyenne, Wyoming's rodeo twice when Beutler Brother's

provided the stock. "Elra Beutler was one of the main reasons I got into rodeo. He was a great man," he says. In those days, five riders might ride two bulls again and again. There was one time when 17 riders rode 70 head. That's a lot," he chuckled, boyishly. "The ground at Cheyenne was hard as this floor," as he points to the kitchen floor where we are sitting, "and they used a big oil pistol to signal you that it was time. Problem was, the gun often misfired and you might ride 12 seconds or more before they got a shot off."

Higher Ground

The Five Love Languages of God

The Five Love Languages written by Gary Chapman, has been translated into twenty-five languages and read around the world. It was followed by The Five Love Languages for Children, The Five Love Languages for Children, and The Five Love Jim Morrison Languages of Teenagers and others.



The one I will be referring to in this article is The Five Love Languages of God.

This is not to imply that God has different languages for different people, but that we receive God's message to us differently because we are unique in our backgrounds, personality, and receptivity. In essence, we are wired differently. In his book, The Five Languages of God, Chapman points out that each of us express our love for God in different ways. There are usually one or two ways that our make-up comes into play, allowing us to feel comfortable when we express our love for God. The five languages that Chapman referred to were: Words of affirmation, Quality time, Gifts, Acts of service, and Physical Touch.

Perhaps a personal example would be helpful. Most of the Praise choruses we sing in today's worship service are simply that: praise offered to God expressing how great he is and how much we adore him. This kind of worship is found throughout the Psalms so it is certainly Biblical. But I confess most of the time they don't do much for me. They are expressions of praise to God that cause many to raise their hands and face and sway to the music, sometimes with tears of emotion.

I am moved more by hymns of action and challenge—songs that want me to go out and do something to bring in the Kingdom. "I'll Fly Away" doesn't do much for me but "A Mighty Fortress is Our God, "or "Set my Soul Afire, Lord," challenges me to acts of service or sharing Christ that Hillsong choruses don't. I may be weird or just too old to appreciate praise music but I choose to believe that it is a part of my makeup. I can better express my love for Jesus by setting across the table from an inmate who feels his life is over and sharing the good news of the hope we have in Christ.

As I have stated before, praise is wonderful and reminds us of the beauty and holiness of God but let's not confuse the issue to make that the ultimate or highest form of worship for all people. Some people would not dare read a Christian book but I find joy in seeing how God worked mightily in the lives of the past saints of God, or in learning how to pray more effectively by reading the experiences of others.

There is a joy in giving sacrificially. Paul said it caused the church in Jerusalem to erupt with many "expressions of thanks" and "praise to God for their obedience." II Cor. 9:13 No doubt their gifts caused people to glorify God which is our highest gift. So for some it may be "Quality time," for others, "Gifts," for some "Words of affirmation" or for others "Acts of Service." Granted, we need to be involved in all of these to some degree but for each of us one or two may be the primary way or ways that we love God. To Him be the glory.








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

SWOSU Sayre Tuition & Fee Cuts to Assist Area Students

Southwestern Oklahoma State University is seeking to return its Sayre location to a community college tuition/fee structure effective this upcoming Fall 2020 semester.

Before the Sayre location joined SWOSU at Weatherford on July 1, 1987, it was a community college.

"This is an incredible opportunity for the residents of western Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle to enjoy the benefits of a premier regional university coupled with the price and personal attention of a community college," said SWOSU Sayre Dean Bill Swartwood. "We are excited about the opportunity."

The new tuition/fee schedule will only apply to face-to-face classes at Sayre.

"Our main goal is to encourage residents in these

areas of Oklahoma and Texas to attend classes at Sayre," said SWOSU Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. James South. "We encourage students to seek an associate's degree, which can be completed at Sayre."

The tuition rate with mandatory fees would be \$175 per hour, a savings of \$73.75 per credit hour and nearly \$1,106 per semester based on 15 hours. The price does not include Academic Enhancement Fees (AEF), which would be paid by the student.

South said Sayre remains an integral part of the SWOSU system that also offers bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

On July 15th, 1975, Oklahoma pilot and Astronaut Thomas Patten Stafford acted as commander of the Apollo-Soyuz Test Project mission. Mission prepping began in 1973, shortly after Stafford's promotion to the rank of Brigadier General at the end of 1972. The mission, dubbed ASTP, was a joint operation between American astronauts and Soviet Cosmonauts, the first international space mission. A milestone that millions of people around the world watched unfold as the U.S. Apollo docked with the Soviet Union Soyuz capsule. The success of the mission, and the famous handshake in space between the teams, is generally considered the cap on the end of the Space Race that began in 1957. A feat possible by the progress made between the superpowers and the teams performing the mission.

The United States 3-man team was comprised of Director of Flight Crew Operations Astronaut Donald K. "Deke" Slayton, Commander of ASTP Thomas P. Stafford, and Vance D. Brand. A rigorous training program had the team going back and forth between Russia and the United States.

The work paid off as the teams launched on July 15th, 1975. Soyuz 19, with crew members Alexei Leonov and Valery Kubasov, departed at 12:20 UTC, and the Apollo and crew departed at 19:50 UTC. After two days in space, they docked on July 17th.

The crews met and performed the "first major joint scientific experiment(s) in the history of mankind" – Leonid Brezhnev (Soviet leader). These experiments included an arranged eclipse of the Sun by the Apollo module that would allow the Soyuz crew to take photographs of the solar corona. The work done between the two units set a precedent for future American-Russian flights.

After docking for 44 hours, the two crafts undocked on July 19th. Soyuz returned on July 21st and Apollo returned on July 24th. During its decent, the Apollo command module began filling with nitrogen tetroxide, a common propellant for rockets. The crew quickly put on their oxygen masks but Brand lost consciousness. Stafford assisted him, and the crew safely landed and were recovered by the USS New Orleans. Upon recovery, the crew were taken to a hospital in Hawaii and treated for edema from the fuel inhalation. Both crews landed safely; ASTP was a success.

The mission was the first of its kind and the last of the dawning of the space age. The two teams used complex new designs, machines, and training to prove that the world is "big enough for everyone to live peacefully [and] too small to be threatened by nuclear war." USSR and the US recognized the mission as an act of peace and respect.





McBride Named OEA Legislator of the Year

State Rep. Mark McBride, R-Moore, was recognized by the Oklahoma Education Association (OEA) with the Outstanding Legislator Award for 2020.

The organization, which represents teachers in working with state and local government agencies as well as with lawmakers and the governor, said it selected McBride because of his outstanding support of public education

and public educators.

"I'm appreciative to be recognized for my legislative work to ensure Oklahoma public school students have the very best education possible," McBride said. "During this time of uncertainty and change, it is more important than ever that all education stakeholders come together to work for what is best for Oklahoma students. Making

sure students have access to highly qualified teachers and up-to-date classroom materials and resources improves their academic success and prepares them to be productive members of society."

"We may have disagreements at times over our approaches," McBride said, "but at the end of the day if students receive the best education possible, it is worth it."

Fall 2020 SWOSU Schedule


Classes will start on the currently scheduled date – Monday, August 17. Campus will be closed on Labor Day, Monday, September 7.
