## Polling places to implement saftey protocols

Polls open around Oklahoma for the General Election on November 3rd. The time slot is still 7am - 7pm, but some new safety protocols have been implemented. Partnering with professionals at the OU Health and Science Center, state election officials have taken the necessary precautions to ensure in-person voting is sanitary and efficient for staff and voters.

Staff at polling places will have access to PPE (masks, gloves, and eye protection) and disinfectant. Masks or face coverings are strongly recommended for both workers

and voters at voting sites. social distance markers and signs will be setup so voters in line can maintain approved spacing.

Please be respectful of others and follow your local voting sites instructions so the voting process can be as smooth as possible.





# "The Coin Guy" 1st American Circulating Currency






Issues of currency notes in the United States are those from the War of 1812. They are rare and unusual Treasury notes. They are not considered "legal tender" and fail to comply with today's Federal standards.

In order to raise funds to fight the British Congress enacted legislation to print currency from 1812 to 1815. Denominations in the amounts of \$20 to \$1,000 were made. The only denominations to survive today were \$3 to \$50 notes. These notes were used to pay for customs duties, goods and services, and to allow banks to have cash reserves.

A collector assembled 21 examples of notes and these will go on the auction block on November 4, 2020 in Dallas, Texas. These notes were printed by the firm of Murray, Draper, Fairman, & Co. in Philadelphia. The above \$3 note is unique and has a pre-auction estimate of \$150,000

Weatherford Food & Resource Center's Volunteer of the Month for August 2020 is Vicki Perkins.





### **HIGHER GROUND Amazing Grace**



"What's So Amazing About Grace?" This is the title of a book written by Philip Yancev, a brilliant writer and author of a number of books. Published in 1997, it resonates even more today in the height of angry political rhetoric and name-calling.

In one chapter entitled "The Lovesick Father," Yancey describes a British conference on comparative religions. Experts from around the world gathered to debate what was unique about the Christian faith. After some discussion, C.S. Lewis wanders into the room and asked what they discussing. When told, he said, "Oh, that's easy. It's

After some discussion the group agreed. As Yancey says, "The notion of God's love coming to us free of charge, no strings attached, seems to go against every instinct of humanity."

Every other religion in the world bears with it some effort on man's part to earn God's favor. The

Christian faith is like receiving a gift which we never earned or deserved. It simply involves relinquishing control of our lives to allow his grace-filled Spirit to set up residence in our hearts. In that process, not as a separate act, we recognize our sin and by faith accept His death on the cross as full payment for our sins, past, present, and future.

Perhaps the best know hymn is Amazing Grace, written by a converted slave trader, John Newton. It is amazing that in the '70s it rose to the top of the music charts, even in the secular world. Everybody seems to feel that we all are in need of grace.

Yancey tells a story that pictures grace in a way that few of us could demonstrate. He accompanied a group to Russia during a time when the Communist state was falling apart. The Russians had requested their presence to help them restore morality in their country. General Stolyarov, Vice-Chairman of the KGB begins; "We here in the USSR realize that too often we've been negligent in accepting those of the Christian faith. But political questions cannot be decided until there is sincere repentance, a return to faith by the people. That is the cross I must bear. In the study of scientific atheism, there was the idea that religion divides people. Now we see the opposite:

love for God can only unite."

Seated in the room was Alex Leonovich, a Christian evangelist. He responded, "General, you say you repent. Many members of my family suffered because of this organization. My dear Uncle went to a labor camp in Siberia and never returned. General, you say that you repent. Christ taught us how to respond. On behalf of my family, on behalf of my uncle who died in the Gulag, I forgive you." He then reached over to the KGB Vice-Chairman and gave him a Russian bear hug.

As a country and as a people, perhaps divided as never before, we desperately are in need of giving and receiving grace. We know little about disagreeing gracefully. We are prone to judgment, condemnation, and verbal abuse. Sadly, we in the Christian community are not except from this sin. Andy Rooney is quoted as saying. "I am against abortion; I believe it is murder, but strangely I feel more comfortable in the midst of a secular pro-choice group then with right-wing conservatives."

Personal Goal for Season: I hope to qualify for the College National Finals and from there win the College Finals in the Saddle Bronc.





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

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# **Theodore Roosevelt - part 2**

Theodore Roosevelt had lost the two most important women in his life. His mother Mittie and his wife Alice Lee Hathaway passed away within a twelve-hour period of each other. TR had been with each of them when they died.

He threw himself into his work, while his sisters stayed with him to help care for his newborn daughter Alice who was named after her mother. Theordore knew little about

raising a baby. He seldom slept. His family listened as he paced his room until the early morning hours. He had been fighting corrupt politicians and judges in New York City (some things never change). After the death of his wife, he took his anger out on them all. Exposing their corruption would become the first display of his signature tenacity.

He seldom spoke of Alice's death. He was hollow inside, and he knew it. Back in 1883, he traveled to the Badlands of The Dakotas for a buffalo hunt. He now longed for that part of the country again. The West was calling to him. Answering that call would quench his thirst for adventure and perhaps heal his battered soul. He announced to his fellow statesmen that he would be leaving for the Dakotas. He would take a leave of absence to mend himself.

He settled in near Medora, North Dakota, still a territory at the time. Most of the rugged frontiersmen thought him to be a "dude," in his store-bought buckskins and Boss of the Plains hat. His clothes may have looked

the part, but the lanky man with glasses and a mouthful of teeth seemed out of place.

He hired a couple of men to accompany him on a hunt. Since money was money, they accepted. They were surprised to see that the "greenhorn" covered more ground than they could. He soon left the two lagging behind, and as he bagged his game, they began to respect the determination in their employer.

It was while in Medora, visiting new friends (TR

loved engaging in conversations), that he bumped into the local bad man Bill Jones. Jones was the stereotypical bad man and a known killer. His language was considered the foulest that Roosevelt had ever heard. Roosevelt was a man with standards and Jones had crossed the line of civility. Confronting Jones about it, TR said, "Bill, I can't tell why in the world I like you, for you're the nastiest-talking man I have ever heard."

Jones' hand dropped to his gun. The cowboys and locals stepped clear. Roosevelt stood firm. What happened next left spectators in awe and shocked. Jones cleared his throat and spoke, "I don't belong to your outfit Mr.

Roosevelt, and I'm not beholden to you for anything. All the same, I don't mind saying that maybe I've been a little too free with my mouth." Roosevelt had stood toe-to-toe with this desperado and never wavered. His stock went up with the locals.

After some time, he bought a herd of cattle for 14

thousand dollars. The previous year, he invested in a ranch near Cheyenne, Wyoming, so it wasn't his first foray into the cattle business. What he built would come to be known as The Elkhorn Ranch, some 35 miles north of Medora.

By 1886, Roosevelt was becoming a true man of the West. He hunted all manner of beast, including grizzlies. He helped his cowboys with the cattle, working side-by-side, except when his asthma made him take pause.

He faced down more than one threat against his life.

He returned to New York that year to test the political waters. When crowds gathered to hear his speeches, it seemed a return to politics was a legitimate cause.

The Winters of 1886 and 1887 had plans to destroy his Western livelihood. The Winter of Blue Snow, as the pioneers would come to call it, was the worst in history. Cattle died from exposure. Ranchers, who began to fence off their lands, cut fences so that the starving cattle could roam and forage.

Photo provided: Theodore Roosevelt The snow became so deep that soon cattle wandered over the now buried fences. It was a common sight to find cattle in town, eating tar paper off buildings. They died by the thousands. When it was over, Roosevelt was finished as well. Theodore Roosevelt's adventure in the West was coming to a close.

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
