





WEATHERFORD EXIT 82 PHASE 3-Weatherford economic development director Yolonda Creswell said progress is being made on Phase 3 of the Exit 82 Project. Creswell said the project should be complete in the spring of 2021. Additionally, Creswell said bids will go out for work on the Lyle Road Project once utility relocation is complete.

SWOSU SEARCH DELAY- Due to the tremendous response of applications received on the last two days of the application period that ended December 6th, the meeting of the Southwestern Oklahoma State University Presidential search screening committee will be delayed until January. The meeting was originally set for December 10th in Weatherford. There are seventy-one applications for SWOSU president. Current president Randy Beutler announced his retirement effective June 30th, 2021.

ODOT 8-YEAR PLAN- The Oklahoma Transportation Commission approved the 8-year plan for the Oklahoma Department of Transportation that will include more than 1300 critically-needed highway construction and safety projects. ODOT Division 5 Engineer Brent Almquist said that includes many projects in Custer County, including the Exit 65 and 65A interchange proj-

ect in Clinton and a five lane project on Airport Road in Weatherford over I-40.

SHERIFF AWARDED PURPLE HEART- A

Custer County Sheriff's Sgt. was awarded the law enforcement purple heart by Sheriff Kenneth Tidwell. Sheriff Tidwell said Sgt. Dan Brownfield was injured in the performance of his duties last May while assisting the Weatherford Police Department in the pursuit of a vehicle that continued on eastbound Interstate 40 into Caddo and Canadian Counties.

WASHITA RIVER BRIDGE BID- The state transportation commission approved a bid of \$7.5 million for a bridge project over the Washita River on the east side of Clinton. ODOT Division 5 Engineer Brent Almquist said work on the bridge is expected to begin in the spring of 2021.

SENATE COMMITTEES CHOSEN- Senate President Pro Tem Greg Treat has announced appointments of chairs and vice chairs of senate committees. Senator Darcy Jech of Kingfisher has been chosen as chair of the senate rules committee and appropriations subcommittee on natural resources and regulatory services. Jech will also serve as vice chair of the senate judiciary committee. Meanwhile, Senator Brent Howard of Altus will chair the appropriations subcommittee on public safety and judiciary and will be vice chair of the senate finance committee.

SWOSU SPRING ENROLLMENT- Enrollment continues for students who want to begin or continue their educational careers at Southwestern Oklahoma State University during the upcoming 2021 spring semester that starts January 11th on the Weatherford and Sayre campuses. Students can enroll at the registrar's office on either campus. Online enrollment is also available through the SWOSU website for students that have completed at least 60 hours and the prior semester at SWOSU. There will not be a traditional spring break in 2021, but the semester will end one week earlier than normal. The last day of the spring semester is April 30th.

Thomas advances to State Championship; Clinton falls short

Once again and for the second week in a row, the Thomas Terriers came from behind to beat its playoff opponent - this time against the defending Class A champion Ringling Blue Devil – in a semifinal game by one point, 28-27, to catapult into Class A's championship football game this coming Saturday night at UCO.

Similar to quarterfinal game against Pawnee, the Terriers fell behind early in the third quarter, 20-7. However, the Terriers' offense caught fire and scored on all three of their second half possessions. Jaxon Ward led the way with a 1-yard quarterback keeper on fourth and one at the one yard line and a 2-yard run with 32 seconds remaining in the game. In between, the tossed a perfect 9-yard pass to senior wide receiver Noah Rainwater on a fade route in the northwest corner of the end zone for the second score. Ryden Luper connected on all four extra point kicks; Ringling's place kicker Logan Duhon missed an extra point kick after the Blue Devils' first touchdown of the game with 6:38 to go in the first quarter.

Thomas will now play for the Class A championship against a team they met earlier in the season – the Cashion Wildcats. Cashion had a close defensive battle in the other semi-final game in Class A against the Pawhuska Huskies – one of the most prolific offenses in the state – and held on to win, 7-6. Cashion beat Thomas on the Wildcats' home field on September 18. It was Cashion's fourth game and the Terriers' second game of the season.

The game will be played at Wantland Stadium on the campus of UCO in Edmond. Kickoff will be at 7:00 and it is the last official football game in the state of Oklahoma for the 2020 season.

The Clinton Red Tornadoes played the undefeated Wagoner Bulldogs in the Class 4A state championship game last Saturday at UCO. The Bulldogs were too much



for Clinton and won the 4A crown, 42-13.

The Bulldogs took advantage of two Clinton turnovers that turned into touchdowns while racking up 405 yards in total offense.

Clinton scored twice in the fourth quarter on a pass from Zade Cisneros to Caden Powell which covered 37 yards. The extra point attempt was missed and the lead was cut 35-6. After Wagoner scored its last touchdown, Atrel Bryson went 59 yards for one of his patented runs for the Red Tornadoes' last score of the game and the season. Bryson finished the game with 126 rushing yards on 16 carries and the one TD.

The Red Tornadoes finished the season with a record of 8-4.

SWOSU Rodeo Alumni Place Top Five at 2020 Wrangler NFR



A trio of Southwestern Oklahoma State University Rodeo alumni competed at the 2020 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo (NFR), which concluded on Saturday night at Globe Life Field in Arlington.

Hunter Herrin (Tie-Down Roping), Emily Miller-Beisel (Barrel Racing) and Sage Kimzey (Bull Riding) all left the 10-day event in Arlington with top-five finishes in the World Rankings. Herrin competed at SWOSU during the 2003-04 and 2004-05 seasons while Miller-Beisel and Kimzey were teammates at SWOSU during the 2012-13 and 2013-14 seasons.

Originally from Apache, Okla., Herrin made his 10th Wrangler NFR appearance in Tie-Down Roping and finished strong, placing either first or second in five of the final six rounds to climb up to fourth in the World Standings. A no-time in round four dropped Herrin to ninth in the average, where he totaled 78.70 seconds on nine scoring runs at the NFR.

A native of Ingalls, Kan., and currently residing in Weatherford, Miller-Beisel put forth a strong effort in her second straight Wrangler NFR appearance. In rounds 6-8, she had three of the fastest times of the week in Barrel Racing, winning two go-rounds as she moved up to also finish fourth in the World Standings. For the event, Miller-Beisel had a total time of 177.72 seconds on 10 rides, which placed her fifth in the average.

The Strong City, Okla., cowboy, Kimzey saw his streak of six consecutive World Championships in Bull Riding snapped in 2020 after securing a fifth-place finish in the world. Despite getting bucked off in four of the first six rounds, Kimzey rebounded to cover three of his final four bulls, including a tie for first in the final go-round on Saturday night with a score of 92.00

points. He finished sixth in the average with 423.0 points on five rides and he will continue his pursuit of the PRCA World Championship record in 2021.

The Wrangler NFR is the season-ending championship event for the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) and is widely acknowledged to be the world's premier rodeo. Held annually since 1959, the Wrangler NFR is ProRodeo's richest and most prestigious rodeo, and it showcases the very best cowboys, barrel racers and livestock in the world.
