



She was a member of the Baptist Church; she enjoyed cooking, sewing and help care for her grandchildren.



Hofmeister announces new members of **Student Advisory Council**

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Joy Hofmeister has named 97 Oklahoma high school students to her 2021 Student Advisory Council, the sixth consecutive year the group has been convened to assist Hofmeister and the Oklahoma State Department of Education in matters of policy.

"Students have a lot to say about their education, and it is critical that we listen to them. The direct insight we receive from our students is incredibly valuable, and each year I am encouraged by the

thoughtful reflection and fearless vision of these brilliant young leaders," Hofmeister said.

The 2020 Student Advisory Council last met virtually in June, where students voiced their challenges about learning amid a global pandemic and how racism impacts the classroom experience. Other past discussion topics have included the importance of personal financial literacy, increased awareness of student mental health needs, and how trauma can impede student success. Feedback from the Council has been instrumental in state-level initiatives to provide teachers more professional development in trauma-informed instruction, replace end-of-course high school testing with the ACT or SAT, and pilot Individual Career Academic Planning (ICAP).

Recommended by their district superintendents, the students hail from across Oklahoma and represent rural, urban and suburban schools of all sizes. Forty-four are returning members who have served on the council in previous years.

The first virtual meeting of the Student Advisory Council is scheduled for Jan. 26.

Oklahoma History: Softball in OKC

Chase Wright January 1st is always an exciting day; it's a day when resolutions are set and dreams of the new year are at their highest. It also happens to be the day when Oklahoma and Softball became inseparable. January 1, 1966, the Amateur Softball Association moved its headquarters from Newark, NJ to OKC, OK. Part of the decision to move likely came from the desire to get softball included as an Olympic sport in the early '60s. Shortly after the move, softball teams, that had been pushing for Olympic inclusion, began to promote new events, encourage new players, and compete in nationwide and international games.

However, despite the sport reaching its Olympic requirement in 1965, Olympic organizers did not include softball in the Olympics until 1996. Although by this time, the USA Softball Hall of Fame Complex (built in 1987) had been raking in publicity and fans from around the world. The Complex had been hosting worldwide games and is regarded as one of the finest softball facilities in the nation.

Softball was an Olympic sport from 1996 to 2008, and during this time, its popularity skyrocketed. Team USA dominated during these 4 Olympic periods with 3 Gold Medals and 1 Silver Medal. In the 1996 season, the United States won gold with only one loss due to a base error which resulted in a run not scoring (they lost by one run). American Hall of Famer Lori Hannigan pitched the first solo no-hitter at the Olympics in a game against Canada in the Summer Olympics of 2000. The 2000 season ignited USA's dominance of the summer league. They would go on to a 22-game winning streak at the Olympics between 2000 and 2008. Their only loss came from Japan in the gold medal match.

Things looked promising for softball and the Olympics until the decision to drop baseball and softball for the 2012

Olympic program "failed to be overturned by a 52-52 vote with one abstention" (ESPN). It seemed to be the end for international competition as countries began reducing their budgets for the sport following the announcement.

Even though worldwide competition was beginning to see a rocky future, the collegiate and national future for softball was on the rise. The OKC Complex began hosting the NCAA Women's College World Series, the World Cup, the Slow Pitch Championship Series, and the 18U Gold National Championship. A softball Hall of Fame museum was established to honor many of the great athletes that helped drive the sport. By the mid-2000's,

the 5-star facility and museum were booking 150,000 fans and had events slated for up to 30 weekends a year.

Then in 2016, the International Olympic Commission voted to include baseball and softball in the 2020 Summer Olympics. So, the next time you get a chance to visit the USA Softball Hall of Fame Complex, don't hesitate. You'll enjoy state-of-the-art entertainment setups like free Wi-Fi, live streaming, hospitality buildings, digital videoboards and fantastic food; all while watching the highest levels of competition from some of the most talented women in the world.

HIGHER GROUND Finding life after work



About 17 years ago I was approaching my last semester as Campus Minister through the Baptist Student Union. I had come to the campus, newly married, 37 years before, with great dreams of making a difference in the lives of young people during those crucial, decision-making years of college life.

I'll let eternity determine the degree of success I had, but now I was facing a new challengeretirement.

What was I going to do? Not being a golfer, and having little interest in hunting or fishing, and with limited money to do much traveling, I hoped that my usefulness had not come to an end. I knew that doing nothing was highly overrated, so I begin to look around for opportunities.

I remember looking over my shoulder at the parking lot of the Fastlane Truck Stop across from the YMCA.

There must have been 25 trucks parked there. The thought occurred to me that those guys (and gals) seldom were free to attend church. They were away from their families for long periods of time and faced many temptations. Before long, I had set up a table with devotional books available for free. My church provided funds to put together "goodie" bags to give away, along with New Testaments written especially for professional truck drivers. I became a selfappointed Truck Stop Chaplain. For about 17 years now I go out each Saturday morning, about 8:00 a.m. I hand out the sacks containing some fruit, a few cookies, a Daily Bread Devotional booklet, and a CD containing a testimony of Greg Laurie a product of the Jesus movement of the 70's movement. I get to meet some interesting people from all over the country and often those whose country of origin may be Albania, Armenia, The Ukraine, Romania, and certainly the Latin American people groups.

As I introduce myself and hand them the goodie bag, I explain that I am the chaplain. "How can I pray for you today?" Often they are a little startled because it has been a long time, if ever, that someone has asked them that question. Those who are believers, smile and are deeply grateful to have found a Christian with whom they can share their concerns. We bow and I pray for their safety, for their families back home, and other requests they have. For some it may be the first time that anyone has prayed for them by name.

One morning, as I finished praying, I said, "Have a good day." The lady driver hugged me and said, "You've already made my day."

On another morning as I was putting the books up, a young Hispanic man turned and said, "Oh, so you're the one who puts these books up." After embracing me he explained that a couple of years before, he had broken his legs in a truck accident, and during rehab, a book about Joni Eareckson's struggle with her paralysis, had kept him going during those painful days. He had gotten the book from our bookrack.

Some of you are approaching retirement, or already there. As long as you love God and love people, He will find something that you can do. Remember, everyday is preparation for tomorrow. Keep your eyes open and your heart available and those days of freedom will be both exciting and deeply satisfying.
