

SWOSU PRESIDENT INTERVIEWS-Regents of the Regional University System of Oklahoma have voted to conduct interviews with fifteen candidates for president of Southwestern Oklahoma State University. RUSO Executive Director Sheridan McCaffree says zoom interviews will be done with the candidates during the first part of February. The list will be narrowed for in-person interviews to be conducted when the regents meet again in late February in Weatherford. The selection process started with 83 candidates that applied for the position, currently held by SWOSU President Randy Beutler, who is retiring June 30th.

CUSTER COUNTY DISTRICT COURT- A

Custer County murder suspect has been denied motion for immunity. Twenty-two year old Cole Isaac Phillips of Weatherford is charged with first degree murder in the April 2020 shooting death of 20-year old Joshua Price. Court records show that Phillips told police that Price came to his house angry and was trying to fight him and that Phillips defended himself. Additionally, Phillips said Price made threats against him and when Price shoved him, Phillips drew his weapon and shot Price twice. However, authorities said there did not appear to be any sign of a struggle inside the residence and the two men had been arguing via text, leading up to the incident. A pre-trial hearing is planned for February 26th.

BECKHAM COUNTY DISTRICT COURT-

Two people are now charged with the murder of a North Fork Correctional inmate in May of 2020. Court records show Jerrad Pointer and Tre Lane are charged in the murder of Vincent Worley. Pointer, allegedly, used a makeshift sharpened instrument to attack Worley, resulting in his death. Lane told investigators he helped inmate Pointer attack Worley, but that he stayed in the cell after the initial attack while inmate Pointer chased Worley out into the pod.

WEATHERFORD SCOOTERS-Weatherford City Commissioners recently held discussion over a partnership to develop a program for the City of Weatherford to maximize the impact of micromobility scooters. The commission took no action. However, the consensus appeared to favor moving forward toward a partnership.

WEATHERFORD RAPE ARREST- Weatherford police have made an arrest on a first degree rape case. Detective Matt Bartel said 20-year-old Tristan Bailey is charged in connection with the crime. Bartel says Bailey is charged with rape in the first degree.

DOBSON NAME CHANGE- Dobson Technologies, a leading provider of high-speed, fiber-optic networks, said it has changed its name to Dobson Fiber. The name change and branding initiative reflects the focus and growth of the organization in the coming years. Dobson Fiber owns and operates a 4000-plus mile regional fiber optic network and provides connectivity services, including high-speed internet, data and cloud connectivity, and voice over internet telephone solutions.

WEATHERFORD OLD HOSPITAL- Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown said the city will utilize the old hospital building for training purposes before it is demolished. Brown says the former hospital site will be the location of the new police station 911 center. He said officials have met with architects in an effort to put together a plan for the new building.


WEATHERFORD DOMESTIC ASSAULT AND BATTERY- One person was injured in a domestic assault and battery in Weatherford in the 100 block of West University. Police Detective Matt Bartel said one person sustained a laceration to the neck from a broken bottle. Bartel said the case is under investigation and no arrests have been made.



A last-second three-pointer from Tauriawn Knight bounced off the back iron and left SWOSU with a 73-70 defeat at East Central on Saturday afternoon at the Kerr Activity Center.

East Central shot 51.7% from the field in the first half and knocked down three three-pointers as they built a 39-35 lead at the break. The Tigers build their largest lead of eight points early in the second half, but the Bulldogs came back and took the lead twice after halftime, the last at 64-62 on a layup from Damion Thornton with 4:30 to play.

ECU broke a 64-all tie on a three-pointer with 3:09 to play and pushed the lead to five with just under one minute to play. Showing their resolve, the Dawgs got back within three on a pair of free throws by Thornton with less than eight seconds to play. A steal by Knight gave him a shot to tie at the buzzer, but his shot hit the rim and bounced off as time expired, allowing ECU to escape with the win.

Knight led the Bulldogs with 18 points and four rebounds while Kamden Gipson added 14 points, seven rebounds, five assists and three steals. Thornton chipped in 12 points and four rebounds and Bralyn James also reached double figures with 10 points on 3-8 shooting.

"That was a tough game today, just no focus on our part," Head Coach Terry Evans said. "We got down early, turned the ball over too many times and had to fight uphill all game. Teams in this league are all so evenly matched that the team that's more focused and ready to play is going to win the game and we weren't that team

Lady Bulldogs Avenge Lone Loss with 30-Point Victory at East Central

In what was billed as a 'Can't Miss' game by NCAA.com on Friday, it was the #17-ranked SWOSU Women's Basketball team who seemingly couldn't miss as they avenged their lone defeat this season with a 93-63 victory over East Central on Saturday at the Kerr Activity Center.

Both teams struggled to get going offensively in the first quarter, hitting a combined nine field goals and going into the second quarter deadlocked at 11-all. SWOSU scored the first eight points of the second quarter and never looked back, knocking down seven threes in the period and hitting 11-of-16 field goals overall to build a 42-28 lead at the break.

SWOSU would not let up in the second half, building a lead of 22 points at one point in the third quarter before pushing their advantage as high as 37 in the fourth and cruising to the 30-point victory. The Lady Bulldogs scored at least 25 points in each of the final three quarters and topped the 90-point mark for the seventh time in 12 games this season.

Three players reached double figures for the Lady Dawgs, who were led by Karly Gore with 20 points on 7-of-10 shooting, which included a pair of three-pointers. Makyra Tramble had 19 points and tied a career-high with 17 rebounds while knocking down her 100th career three-pointer during just her 40th career game. Tramble

also had five assists and four steals in 33 minutes of action. Lauren Ramey also knocked down four threepointers and finished with 16 points and four rebounds in the win.

"We saw the feature on NCAA.com that this was a top game to watch this weekend and we wanted to put on a performance," SWOSU Head Coach Kelsi Musick said following the win. "That was our goal, to avenge a loss so we were definitely ready to play. We needed to shoot the ball well and our defense was much better overall. That's something we've been focusing on and I thought it showed today."

SWOSU is now 11-1 on the year and winners of five straight since their previous loss to East Central.

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
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SWOSU Selects Lacy Mott & Lauren Ramey as Bulldogs of the Week

Bulldog Football Announces 2021 Signing Class

SWOSU Head Football Coach Chet Pobolish and his coaching staff announced the addition of 36 studentathletes who have joined the Bulldog Football program on National Signing Day. They join four mid-year enrollees in making up the Bulldogs 40-member recruiting class of 2021.

"Recruiting changed quite a bit this year, due to the pandemic, but we felt like we were ahead of the ball and able to turn something that could've been a negative into an opportunity," Pobolish said. "I really feel like our staff did a great job of identify student-athletes who will fit into our program and be a great representation of Bulldog Football."

Of the newcomers signing to join the Bulldogs, three are transfers with two years of eligibility remaining while 37 will come to SWOSU as true freshmen. The Dawgs added 21 players who will start their career on offense, 17 who will play defense and two specialists, with wide receiver and offensive line the positions most addressed with eight signees apiece. Incoming Bulldogs hail from five different states, with SWOSU signing 19 Oklahoma high school graduates and 18 players from Texas with one signee each from California, Colorado and Kansas.

"It's extremely important for us to have success recruiting in Oklahoma and Texas," Pobolish said. "When we first create our recruiting board, we build a circle 250 miles around Weatherford because there's enough talent in that area for us to focus on. It's important to us to find kids who want to come here and can fit into our community and it's also important for their parents to be able to come visit and see them play."

A phone bid of \$320,000 was given. Then a bid of \$330,000 was made. The hammer fell at \$330,000. No one else made a bid. The error note sold for \$330,000 plus a buyer's fee of 20% which comes to \$396,000.

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Oklahoma History: Belle Starr

Many of the infamous Wild West outlaws are intimately familiar with Oklahoma. From Jesse James's gold, to Bonnie and Clyde's shootout, to the Wild Bunch's high profile bank & train robberies, Oklahoma was an attractive location for laying low and dastardly deeds. Another *Starr* of the South, who met their end in Oklahoma "Indian Territory," was one of the most notorious women of the period – the "Bandit Queen" Belle Starr

Belle, born Myra Belle Shirley, grew up in Missouri in the early 1850's. According to sources who knew her family at the time, she was well educated and had already become adept as a pianist. Her family life was typical; her father was an innkeeper, and they were respected as a middle-class family. Life for Starr was organized, calm, and a little boring. However, tragedy struck when the Civil War outbreak took the life of her brother Edwin and forced her father to close his business. Her family gathered their things and headed to Texas, where they would hopefully be able to leave all those painful memories in Missouri.

While in Texas, she met Cole Younger, a member of the James-Younger gang. The gang centralized around Jesse James and his brother Frank. The History channel described Belle's attitude towards her new running mates as "untroubled" and even listed her as a "partner in crime by 1869." Some of her crimes involved stealing horses, cattle, and money around the Dallas area. Always atop her mare named "Venus," Belle was romanticized in the public's eye for her high-fashion outfits like velvet skirts and plumed hats. She gained the nickname "Bandit Queen."

In 1874, Belle found herself alone and betrayed when her recent partner Jim Reed was killed, presumably by his own gang. On the run from the law, Belle found shelter in Oklahoma Indian Territory. While in Oklahoma, Belle began leading her own band of thieves.



Shortly thereafter, she met her future criminal partner and namesake Sam Starr. They became "married" under common-law and went on a successful crime run for almost a decade. In 1883, the couple was arrested and spent five months in a federal prison in Detroit.

Upon release, they dove straight back into their criminal activities, but Belle once again experienced loss when Sam was killed in a gunfight 3 years later. By this time, Belle's notoriety was at its peak, and she found another companion named Jim July. But a violent life leads to violent ends, and in 1889, July was arrested and set to appear in Fort Smith, Arkansas, for sentencing. Belle went with him until they reached

Fort Smith where she turned back home. While on the way back, she was ambushed and fatally wounded near Eufaula, Oklahoma, with two shotgun shots in her back. July believed the murder was done by a neighbor that they had been fighting. However, charges were never brought upon anyone for her death.

Following her death, Belle's story was published by Richard K. Fox in a novel entitled **Belle Starr**, the **Bandit Queen**, or the **Female Jesse James**. Belle became of the most prominent figures of the Great Southwest and her death became one of the most highprofile, "unsolved murders" stories. A statue of Belle Starr can be visited at Woolaroc museum in Oklahoma.

I've been Rescued



I enjoy meditating on Paul's prayers to the churches. I can't imagine someone sitting in a dark cell, knowing that the next day his life might end, and being able to put together amazing doctrinal truths and Godly principles for life. Of course, the Holy Spirit was guiding him, but he had to

of parchment and a quill to work with. But more amazing is that we have it in hand to read and apply today. Human nature has not changed that much in 2000 years. There is still selfishness, pride, lust, and the desire for pleasure and power. One of my favorite prayers is Col. 1:9-12. It is a little hard to determine where the prayer ends and teaching begins. But let's look at these verses:

"For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you and asking God to fill

you with the knowledge of his will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding. And we pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience and joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the kingdom of light."

When placed alongside my puny efforts at prayer, I feel a little embarrassed. He had not started or visited that church, but he had learned from Epaphras of some false teaching that was threatening the infant church. In the prayer he does not deal with the heresy but simply sets forth some basic concerns for their spiritual growth, describing some essentials that would provide a defense from any false teaching.

His first concern is that they would have spiritual wisdom and understanding that would lead them to knowledge of the will of God—what should be a first priority in the church and in their lives. In our day of misinformation, half-truths, and quick judgments we would do well to first, earnestly seek

the will and ways of God. He has not left us in the dark. Too often we want someone to tell us what to believe instead of doing research, first of all in the Scriptures.

Then Paul's prayer leads to a result of that knowledge; they would walk worthy of the Lord. The output from that life would result in (1) pleasing God, (2) bearing fruit from the good works they would demonstrate, (3) growing in the knowledge of God---something that is sadly deficient in today's world, (4) strengthened with all power (remember, their understanding of the Holy Spirit was probably weak, much like today). All this would then equip them with patience and endurance in dealing with the false teaching they faced. Paul would not let them forget the matter of gratitude—they were now qualified to share in the inheritance that God had prepared for them. They had been rescued from darkness and brought into the kingdom of light. Their sins had been forgiven and they had been redeemed. That fact must ever be on our minds.
