


Dakota Jones Named GAC Pitcher of the Week

CORDELL STORM SIRENS- Cordell City Council approved a contract with Myers Engineering to perform bidding and negotiating services for the purchase of two new outdoor storm warning sirens. City Administrator JC Moser said the city will also relocate two existing outdoor storm warning sirens.

CUSTER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS-

Custer County Commissioners approved a resolution in reference to condemnation proceedings on the West Barnitz Creek Project. Commissioner Lyle Miller said commissioners spoke with their attorney about the proceedings. The county is going to condemnation after being unable to obtain .29 acres for the project at the intersection of county roads 2140 and 880.

CUSTER COUNTY JURY TRIAL- A Clinton man was found not guilty by a Custer county jury in connection with a 2019 child abuse case. The jury found 39-year old David Brandon Griffin not guilty of using a belt to hit an 8 year old child. Court records show Griffin had a previous injury to a minor child case in 2000, in which he pleaded guilty.

CUSTER COUNTY JURY TRIAL- Two Clinton residents were found guilty by a Custer county District court jury in connection with a 2019 incident. Twenty-eight year old Chabon Warden and thirty-four year old Merrick Warden were charged with robbery, where several people entered an apartment in Clinton and took seven grams of methamphetamine. One occupant of the home suffered injuries during the incident and required surgery. Sentencing in connection with the convictions will be held following completion of a pre-sentence investigation.

WEATHERFORD ERICK TRAVEL STOP-

The City of Weatherford will be represented next month at the Erick Travel Stop. Chamber of Commerce President Justin O'Connor said representatives will be greeting motorists who stop on the eastbound side travel stop to promote the city and its attractions. The date that the City of Weatherford will be represented at the travel stop is May 5th.

FEDEX PLANS TO OPEN NEW FACILI-TY-Officials with the City of Weatherford said plans have been received for a new Fedex ground distribution center on frontage road. Economic development director Yolanda Creswell said the new building will be 30,000 square feet. Company officials say the site was chosen because of its ease of access to major highways, proximity to customers' distribution centers, and a strong local community workforce for recruiting employees.

WEATHERFORD SALES TAX-Another up month for sales tax receipts in the city of Weatherford. Mayor Mike Brown said it marks the 4th consecutive month that sales tax receipts have increased. Sales tax receipts received in the month of April through February sales was up 1.22%, collecting just over \$831,000.

WEATHERFORD **STAFFORD MUSE-UM-**The Director of the Stafford Air and Space Museum said work continues on the exhibits at the museum. Max Ary said the musuem has about 400 new exhibits that will be built over the next few years. Ary says the F-117 stealth fighter still may not arrive until early next year as officials wait for the air force to demill the aircraft.



The SWOSU Baseball team completed a home-andhome non-conference sweep of Cameron last week with a 9-5 victory over the Aggies at the Athletic Complex in Weatherford.

The Bulldogs had seven hits on the day, getting two a piece from Alex Bedard and Keyshaun Smith while Griffin Larsen hit a two-run home run in the sixth and Ryan Dos Santos had a bases-clearing triple in the seventh. Each team scored a run in the first inning before SWOSU scored three in the third and never relinquished the lead from that point on.

Noah Chapin (1-2) tossed the first five innings and struck out seven while allowing two runs on five hits to earn his first victory of the season. Three other pitchers saw time before handing the ball over to Haden Branch, who struck out three and recorded the final four outs to earn his third save of the year.

SWOSU improves to 19-10 on the year with the win and they'll now head to Harding for a three-game series, which has been moved to Sunday-Monday due to forecasted weather conditions in Searcy.



Four Claim All-GAC Distinction as Lady Dawgs Finish Fourth at Conference

Behind another stellar performance from Great American Conference Freshman of the Year Megan Brown, the SWOSU Women's Golf team finished in fourth place at the GAC Championships, which took

place on Monday-Tuesday at Hot Springs Country Club.

Brown finished third in her first GAC Championship Tournament and at its conclusion she was named the GAC Freshman of the Year and a unanimous First Team All-GAC selection, making her one of four Lady Bulldogs to earn recognition from the conference. Rebecca Lau was also named to the First Team while Mikaela Rindermann earned a spot on the Second Team and Georgia Miller earned Honorable Mention.

SWOSU placed fourth as a team, five shots behind Harding in third place while also placing behind Henderson State and Arkansas Tech, who tied for the tournament lead before HSU won the conference championship in a playoff. Brown tied for third place at six-over par for the tournament while Lau was tied for 12th at 15-over. Rindermann and Miller tied with each other at 21-over par and Zoe Morton rounded out the scoring for SWOSU.

Brown (Cordell, Okla.) becomes the second Lady Bulldogs to be named GAC Freshman of the Year, joining Emily Folsom who earned the honor in 2015. She also extends SWOSU's streak of having a First Team All-GAC selection to eight consecutive years. In six tournaments prior to the GAC Championship, Brown recorded three top-10 finishes and finished in the top 20 at each event the Lady Bulldogs competed in, highlighted by an individual championship at the Newman Spring Invitational. A twotime GAC Player of the Week this season, Brown has a stroke average of 76.5 this year with 11-of-13 rounds she played scoring in the 70's.

Lau (Puchong, Selagor, Malaysia) also earned a spot on the First Team, giving SWOSU multiple first-team selections for the fifth consecutive season. In her freshman campaign, Lau had the second-best stroke average on the

team at 78.7 with a low round of 73 at the Diffee Ford Lincoln Invite, which was her best finish of the year as she tied for fourth, one of two top-10 finishes she recorded this spring. Rindermann (Norman, Okla.) picks up her first allconference award following her sophomore season, which

has included three consecutive top-10 finishes to round out the regular season. She entered the GAC Tournament with a stroke average of 79.1 in 13 rounds of action this season and her best finish was tying for sixth place at the Holiday Inn Express Classic.

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Miller (Kamloops, British Columbia, Canada) rounded out the selections with honorable mention for her freshman season. She's been in the lineup for four tournaments this spring and has a stroke average of 80.9 for her nine rounds of competition, which includes a season-best finish of 20th at the Natural State Golf Classic.

The Lady Bulldogs were ranked fifth in the Central Region's final published ranking, which puts them in good position to qualify for the NCAA Division II Central Regional Championships for the eighth consecutive season. The nine-team field for the tournament will be announced next Monday, April 26th, with a press release at NCAA.com.




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




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Keanni Barron and Sierra Smith Named Bulldogs of the Week

Do We Want Revival?



"Revive us again, Revive us again, fill each heart with thy love. May each soul be rekindled with fire from above." The last verse of this great hymn written by William Mackay, is seldom sung today. But it should be the heart cry of every child of God. Revival is often misunderstood by many who confuse it

with an evangelistic campaign where many come to faith in Christ. Sometimes both may occur.

Revival usually happens when the Sovereign Holy Spirit moves upon a group of people at one time. It usually results in great conviction of sin, attended by people confessing their sins. It is not orchestrated by a committee or even a pastor. We cannot program God. He moves as He wills. It does come often after groups of people, recognizing their great need are willing to seek God with contrition, confession, and brokenness. Many times we see great moral collapse, misplaced values, or the sins of society and determine that "they" need a revival. In most cases, the people most in need of revival are those religious folks who have let comfort and pleasure become their Gods. As Pastor Tony Evans has said, "We need revival in the church house, before we can expect revival in the White House."

One example of revival, little known by most folks is the great "Welsh revival of 1904-5. Led mostly by Evan Roberts, it became so pervasive that drunkenness was cut in half and criminal activities were reduced to the point that the police were left only to direct traffic of those going to church. So, they developed Gospel quartets to sing at church. The course language of

coal miners was so changed that the horses would not comply because they were not use to respectful talk.

The spirit of revival crossed the ocean to Welsh immigrants in Pennsylvania. The Methodists of Philadelphia reported ten thousand converts. In 1904, nearly a thousand Atlanta businessmen united in prayer for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit. On November 2, stores, factories and offices closed at midday for prayer. The Georgia Supreme Court adjourned.

In 1905, fifty-eight of the leading business firms of the city of Louisville closed at the noon hour for prayer meetings. Henry Clay Morrison said, "The whole city is breathing a spiritual atmosphere... Everywhere in shop and store, in the mill and on the street, salvation is the one topic of conversation."

Contrast this with today's atmosphere where graphic sex and coarse language is tolerated as normal and the name of Jesus Christ is deleted from an athlete's testimony lest it offend somebody.

Do we need revival? Most would say we do, but are we willing to pay the price of personal hunger and passionate prayer, asking God to reveal Himself to us in a fresh way, confessing our sins, both of omission and commission.

It has been said that our heart is an idol producing factory. Our idols may be hard to identify because self-indulgence, self-sufficiency, and self-seeking have become normalized in our society. Paul's challenge to "...present our bodies as living sacrifices"...is thought by most to be intended for missionaries and particularly religious people. In truth it should be the norm for all believers. My prayer for myself is, "Lord, show me your power and holiness in such a way that I would see my sin in contrast and say with Isaiah, 'here am I Lord, send me." Since no living person can be on a circulating coin all the females honored must be deceased. Maya Angelou passed away in 2014 and Sally Ride passed away in 2012.


