




They owned and operated ReAct Construction where she worked alongside her husband. In 1995 she began working as a secretary with OHP Troop H for 26 years.





BECKHAM COUNTY DISTRICT COURT-An arrest warrant has been issued in Beckham County District Court for a Sayre man on charges of conjoint robbery, robbery with a weapon and conspiracy. Court records show 20 year old Christian Robert Paulino allegedly conspired with 20 year old William Carl Ernst of Clinton to hold up the McDonald's in Sayre in January 2020. On the night of the robbery, Paulino, who was a McDonald's employee, met Ernst outside the restaurant. Ernst ordered Paulino back inside at gunpoint and held three employees at gunpoint, including Paulino, while taking approximately \$1200 and then fleeing on foot.

CADDO CO DISTRICT COURT- A Hydro man has been found competent to stand trial in Caddo County District Court on child pornography charges. twenty-one year old Austin Michael Glenn was arrested and charged last year after agents from the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, assisted by the Caddo County Sheriff's Office and Hydro police, served a search warrant in the 100 block of East Main Street in Hydro. The case originated last August when the national center for missing and exploited children forwarded a cyber tip they received from an electronic service provider to the OSBI. Glenn is charged with possession of child pornography, distribution of child pornography and violation of the Oklahoma computer crimes act. A preliminary hearing conference for Glenn is planned for August 5th.

CUSTER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS/CARES ACT RESOLUTION- Custer County Commissioners approved a resolution, concerning Cares Act funding. Commission Chairman Lyle Miller said these are reimbusement dollars for services during the COVID pandemic. Miller says the dollars will be split up between the county offices. He says county officials can spend these dollars as they deem necessary.

ODOT/DIVISION 5 AWARD- Division 5 of the Oklahoma Department of Transportation, based in Clinton , received recognition during the state transportation meeting this week. Division 5 engineer Brent Almquist says the gold concrete paving award was presented for the best concrete paving project in the state for the diverging diamond interchange at Elk City. The diverging diamond interchange opened last fall. The design has been gaining popularity because studies show it creates safe, less congested interchanges and reduces travel times.

STATE TREASURER CANDIDATE- Term-limited state lawmaker Todd Russ of Cordell has announced he will seek the seat of state treasurer. Russ is in his 6th two-year term in the Oklahoma House and will term limit out of office next year. Russ made the announcement. Current treasurer Randy McDaniel previously announced he would not seek re-election in 2022. Russ is the second candidate to announce his intention of seeking the seat. Oklahoma county clerk David Hooten announced plans to run for treasurer earlier this month.

INTERIM STUDY- State Representative Todd Russ of Cordell says he plans to have an interim study surrounding the unclaimed property fund. Russ says he would expect the interim study to occur after august.

WATONGA/OSBI INVESTIGATION- The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation is looking into the death of a two year old in Watonga. On June 18th medical personnel were called to the 500 block of North Hampton to assist with an injured child. The child was taken to the Watonga heli-pad and then transported to OU Children's Hospital in Oklahoma City and died three days later. OSBI says it is an open and ongoing investigation.

WEATHERFORDPD/MISSINGJUVENILE FOUND- A missing juvenile from Hobart was discovered this morning and was apprehended by Weatherford police. Assistant Police Chief Josh Vandeburgh says police found the youth during routine patrol in a Weatheford neighborhood. When the officer recognized the teen, he called the name of the youth, who ran and was apprehended after a short foot chase. Vandeburgh says the 15 year old youth was turned over to C-I-C in Clinton.



Oklahoma History: Dalton Gang

Chase Wright

The Dalton Gang, the infamous band of brothers that operated in Oklahoma and Kansas in the early 1890s, specialized in bank and train robberies throughout the territory. Also known as the Dalton Brothers, four of the gang's founding members were brothers with most of them coming from federal lawmen backgrounds.

Initially, the brothers began stealing horses for extra cash with brother "Bill" Dalton acting as spy and informant; Bill never actively participated in any heists. They quickly graduated to stagecoach robberies, and from there, to banks and trains.

Their spree was unmatched and led them to their biggest score on July 14, 1892, the most daring deed to date: the high stakes robbery of the "Katy" train near Adair, Oklahoma (which was Indian Territory at the time). The Katy train referred to one of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas, MKT, trains that connected the frontier military bases and delivered supplies between them. At the time, MKT's Kansas-Texas train was simplified to "KT" for timetables and the stock exchange. The Katy's valuables were a highly sought after market for the gang, and on that historic Thursday, their target approached.

Four members of the gang captured the night operator at its incoming station and had him signal the train to halt. When it reached a stand-still, two members took control of the conductor and train men. The operator was then taken to an express car where he was to order the messenger to open up. The messenger refused. So, the train's fireman was brought and forced to break down the door. Finally inside, the gang quickly began looting the safe's contents.

Unbeknownst to the gang, a special detachment of railroad guards was aboard the train and after

noticing the commotion, exited the train opposite the depot. There, the eight guards encountered members of the gang and a fierce firefight began.

Done inside, the gang onboard quickly sprung out and through the town dodging bullets and firing their own. Stray bullets fatally wounded Dr. W.L. Goff and injured Dr. Youngblood, who were chatting outside a nearby drugstore. Others injured included the two captains: J.J. Kinney, Chief of railroad detectives and commander of the guards onboard, and J.H. LaFlore, Chief of Cherokee Nation Police. They both recovered.

The gang escaped unscathed, and the railroad company promptly posted a bounty of \$5,000 per bandit of the robbery. Stories of their daring deed spread throughout the country and a sensation of embellished publishings and myths began.

Their success led many members of the gang to seek bigger and better robberies, and none more-so than Dalton brother Bob. Bob was quoted with the claim that he could "beat anything Jesse James ever did — rob two banks at once, in broad daylight." A comment made from a braggart which then turned to a serious possibility.

little about the event that was to play a part in my eternal destiny. I do remember Mrs. Killingsworth, our teacher, sharing about how God had answered prayer regarding the healing of her husband during a serious illness. In God's eternal plan, that seed about the power of prayer, found a home in my heart and caused me to search for God and his plan and purpose for my life.

The VBS ended, but there was enough interest about spiritual matters that it was decided that the ministry would be continued in the form of a Sunday school that would meet weekly to nurture the children in the community and the adults as well. In those days, there was a family on about every quarter section so the need was great. There was no pastor or any denominational ties—just a group of farmers, who with their families, gathering together each week to study the Bible. It was never very large but it continued for at least ten years. I remember a lady named Glennie Spencer, who taught the children's class. At one point we were challenged to memorize the Ten Commandments. For those who did so she would give a little, pocket sized New Testament. After completing the task I received the reward and it became my prized possession, the only Bible I had for many years.

Occasionally, a preacher would come by to preach to us. One Sunday a Methodist pastor from a nearby

A few months later, on October 5th, 1892, the Dalton gang attempted this insane feat in Coffeyville, Kansas. They had their eyes on the C.M. Condon & Company's Bank and the First National Bank located on opposite sides of the street. This fateful day would lead the gang to its meeting of famous outlaw Henry Star, its biggest tragedy, and its ultimate transformation into the most notorious gang in the west: The Wild Bunch (an inspiration to Butch Cassidy's Wild Bunch).

church filled the "pulpit." I don't recall much about the sermon. But I do remember his statements about hell. They convinced my tender heart that I wanted to become a Christian. But I didn't know how. Two or three years later, at the age of twelve, some men from a little country church came by our house. They asked my dad to lead the music during their upcoming revival. He agreed to do so. Our family, of course, would be involved. For whatever reason, my mother and I did not attend that first night. This gave me a chance to pour out my heart feelings to her in private. She agreed that it was time and as they say, "the rest is history." The next night on the first note of the hymn of invitation I was down the aisle sharing with the preacher that I wanted to become a Christian. I don't remember the words I said, I just remember the feelings in my heart and will. I wanted to give my life to Christ, to live for Him. Now seventy-two years later, I'd like to say with the Apostle Paul in Acts. 20:24, "...I consider my life worth nothing to me, if only I may finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me—the task of testifying to the gospel of God's grace." And it all began with a dream of a farmer.
