

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BECKHAM COUNTY/ILLEGAL MARIJUANA GROW- Beckham County Sheriff Derek Manning says state and local authorities conducted a raid on an illegal marijuana grow operation, just west of Elk City. Sheriff Manning says authorities destroyed some 2500 marijuana plants. He says county workers took the plants and destroyed them at a location within Beckham County under the supervision of the Oklahoma Department of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs.

CLINTON SCHOOLS/BOND- Clinton schools superintendent Tyler Bridges says the district is in the planning process to put a bond issue before district voters this coming school year. Bridges says the exact scope of what would be in a bond issue is still in the planning stages. Meanwhile, Bridges says the district did get several million dollars from stimulus funds that are being used for various upgrades in the district.

CLINTON/ALLIANCE HEALTH NEW CEO- The Board of Trustees of Alliance Health-Clinton have announced the appointment of a new chief executive officer. Tracy Byers will assume the role beginning August 8th. Hospital officials say in his 20-plus years of experience in the healthcare industry, Byers has built a strong track record of success in physician recruitment, expansion of services, and operational leadership. Byers comes to Clinton from Alliance Health-Madill.

CUSTER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS/SALES TAX- Custer County Clerk Melissa Graham told county commissioners that the five year renewal of the Custer County Sales Tax comes up next year. The current sales tax breakdown is 50% to the general fund, 30% to the sheriff's department, 8% to both rural fire departments and Custer County OSU and 4% to the Custer County Free Fair. The sales tax renewal will need to be to the board of elections next April to be on the June 2022 primary ballot.


DEWEY COUNTY/PLANE CRASH- The pilot of a crop dusting plane is dead after his aircraft crashed 5 miles east and 1 mile south of Seiling in Dewey County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 65 year old Isaac Regier Jr., of Fairview died from injuries sustained in the crash. The patrol says the crash is under investigation.

LAKE TEXOMA/DOUBLE FATALITY- Two people are dead, including a western Oklahoma man, following an accident on Lake Texoma. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 80 year old Devered Dee Hines of Cordell and 62 year old Eddie Wayne Hines of Duncan died after being ejected into the water when the boat they were riding in suffered a steering malfunction. The operator of the boat, 67 year old Clifford Eugene Hines of Ponca City was also ejected, but was treated and released from Alliance Health-Durant. The patrol says the boat struck all three men after they had been thrown into the water. after filing unopposed. Also, Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown will serve another term in office after not drawing an opponent. The Clinton ward 3 council race will be held during the November 9th general election.

SWOSU/VACCINATION CLINICS- SWOSU is planning COVID vaccination clinics in August and September. The clinics are open to everyone, including SWOSU students who start classes on August 16th. SWOSU will host a COVID vaccination clinic on Friday, August 20th, on the Weatherford campus at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center from 10am-2pm. A clinic for the second dose of the vaccination will be held Friday, September 10th, at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center from 10-2. SWOSU college of pharmacy rural health center coordinator Dr. Randy Curry encourages people who have not been vaccinated to set up appointments at SWOSU or with a local provider.

WASHITA COUNTY/FATALITY- A Clinton man is dead and three others were treated and released following a two vehicle accident at the intersection of state highways 152 and 54 north, approximatley 13 miles east of Cordell in Washita County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 65 year old Timothy Ray Townsend of Clinton died at the scene of the accident. 36 year old Skyler Joe McCuistion, 33 year old Spencer Tew, both of Elk City, and 20 year old James L. Williams of Dill City were all treated and released from various Western Oklahoma hospitals. Troopers say Townsend attempted to make an improper turn into a westbound turn lane and turned into the path of the McCuistion vehicle. Both vehicles departed the road before coming to rest. OHP says Townsend was partially ejected through the passenger side windshield.

WEATHERFORD SB/CONSTRUCTION UPDATES- Weatherford Schools Superintendent Jill Henderson provided a construction update on the various projects in the district during a recent meeting of the school board of education. Henderson says both elementary buildings are progressing. She says the turf project at the high school football field should be ready for the first game of the season and the track project is expected to be complete for the first meet of the season.

When more half dollars were needed by the Federal Reserve the U.S. Mint had the necessary blank planchets and dies to





Last week, the tale of the Dalton gang led up to the ambitious double bank heist in Coffeyville, Kansas. Coming from their successful train robbery near Adair, Oklahoma, the Dalton gang found themselves riding downtown in Coffeyville on October 5th, 1892, with two banks looming ahead. The gang had decided to split into two groups: Bob and Emmett would hit the First National Bank, and Grat, Broadwell, and Powers would hold up the Condon Bank across the street. The plan had the gang tie their horses up on a familiar hitch post behind the Condon Bank offering them a speedy escape route. However, the city had undergone many changes since their last visit and the hitch post had been removed for more construction. The gang decided to hitch their horses in a nearby alley behind the city jail and proceeded toward the banks.

Now, previous visits to Coffeyville had been uneventful due to the brother's incognito lifestyle, but their recent exploit of the KT train a few months prior – the one that led to \$4,000 bounties on each member's head - had gained the group a vast amount of notoriety. This fame led to locals recognizing a couple of the brothers and members of the gang. As the 5 bandits entered their respective banks, Winchester rifles in hand, dozens of plaza workers and store owners began spreading the news that the Daltons were robbing the bank. The townsfolk quickly gathered their own guns and took up positions around the banks.

Inside, the robberies seemed to be going off without a hitch. In the Condon Bank, Grat Dalton had walked one of the cashiers to the vault and ordered it opened as Powers and Broadwell covered the other occupants and the door. The cashier told Grat that the vault was on a timer and could not be opened for another 10 minutes - a lie, but Grat's greed for the gold inside prompted him to believe the cashier and wait for it to open. Meanwhile, across the street at the First National Bank, Emmet and Bob were busy stuffing gold bars into sacks and began heading toward the exit. Emmet and Bob grabbed a nearby cashier who they planned to use as cover on their way to the meetup. All according to plan.

As Emmet and Bob took their first step out the front door of the First National Bank, a shot rang out. The plaza's businessmen, posted up around the building, quickly got into a fierce firefight with the bandits. The pair left their hostage on the front porch and headed back through the bank hoping to make their getaway through its rear exit. They grabbed two more employees

as hostages.

Across the street, Grat and his accomplices heard the shots ring out. Grat decided that the additional weight of the gold was too much and was busy dumping bags when a bullet shot through the glass of the Condon Bank hitting Broadwell in the arm. Scooping what loose cash they could, the trio fled through the back alley.

Things were not faring well for Emmet and Bob who were huddled in the First National Bank. As they burst out of the rear exit, they came face to face with citizen, Lucius Baldwin, who had been watching the door. Bob ordered Lucius to drop the gun, he refused, and Bob shot him with this rifle. Now in the open, a bloody fight began. Bob noticed a pair outside a drug store across from the bank, George Cubine and Charles Brown, had a rifle aimed at his head. Bob quickly dispatched George and shot Charles as he went for the gun. In all of the hecticness, Bob and Emmett failed to notice that their first hostage, Thomas Ayres (the one they dumped outside the bank when the shooting began), had circled back around the outside of the bank, stopping by a hardware store to grab a rifle. Ayres came around just as Bob executed Charles and took aim. At the last second, Bob saw Ayres and from roughly 200 ft away shot him in the head. Ayres survived but was paralyzed for life. Bob and Emmett had made it to the horses. Bob signaled to Grat and the boys in the Condon bank to hurry out.

The gang met up with sacks full of money, and as they began to unload onto their horses, two town marshals came around the corner. Grat shot and killed the first marshal, but before he could turn on the second, the marshal shot him in the throat. The townsfolk closed in on the bandits, Bob went down in a hail of gunfire from the hardware store, and Powers was shot trying to mount his horse. Broadwell managed to mount his horse, but was quickly hit again and rode off; he was found dead two miles away. Powers fell in sea of bullets near Grat leaving only Emmett Dalton alive; he held up his hands in surrender. Emmett was treated for near 20 gunshot wounds and lived. After standing trial and being sentenced to life in prison, Emmett was surprisingly pardoned in 1907.

Now outside of prison, Emmett moved to California and would go on to write about the exploits of the Dalton Gang. The book was instantly popular, and Emmett and his wife returned to Coffeyville and they were treated like celebrities. After his death in 1937, his book was adapted into a western movie When the Dalton's Rode. Many other films about the brothers and their exploits have been




Photo: George "Red Buck" Waightman, killed by **Custer County Posse 1896**

made, including the 2020 release of The Dalton Gang.

Following the almost complete wipeout of the Dalton Gang in Coffeyville, Bill Dalton and Bill Doolin (who had been waiting outside the town to backup the robbers as they fled) found themselves riding under the outlaw Henry Starr outside of Kingfisher. When they rose to take over the gang as leaders, they became known as the Wild Bunch and would incur the wrath of U.S. Marshal Evett "E.D." Nix, who was appointed one hundred marshals under his command to bring down the outlaws. Over the next five years, Nix and his marshals would hunt down each member of the Wild Bunch. One of the last members to get taken down, was George "Red Buck" Waightman, who was killed on March 4th, 1896 by a Custer County posse near Arapaho, Oklahoma. Bill Doolin and the marshals would play cat and mouse for a couple more years, but that's a tale for another time.

HIGHER GROUND For His Glory



Corrie ten Boon spent a year in a concentration camp for being a part of a family that hid Jews from the Nazi's during World War II. Her story is told in the book The Hiding Place, which was also made into a movie. She suffered through horrible treatment from the Jim Morrison guards, and her sister, Betsie died under

unbelievably harsh conditions. After her release through a clerical error, she was etermined to let the world know how God had strengthened her through those painful months. One of her classic quotes from that period is "There is no pit so deep that God's love is not deeper still." With no resources other than her faith in the greatness of God, she traveled the world speaking to hundreds of thousands on almost every continent. Her travels are cataloged in her book, A Tramp for the Lord. One of the stories from that book describes

her visit to an old couple in a communist controlled country. They were so elderly and incapacitated that the authorities left them alone. But the old lady was performing a service to the Kingdom of God that only she could have done. Propped up by pillows on a small sofa, her body twisted by muscular sclerosis, she used one finger, typing on an old typewriter. Far into the night she would translate Christian books into Russian, Latvian, and the language of her people. Always using just one finger—peck. . . peck. . . she typed out portions of the Bible, the books of Billy Graham, Watchman Nee, and Corrie ten Boon.

Her husband said, "Not only does she translate their books, but she prays for these men every day

city who can type quietly, undetected by the police."

When Corrie and her aide returned home, they managed to have a new typewriter sent to her. Later they received a letter from her husband saying—in the early morning hours she had left to be with the Lord. But, he said, "She had worked up until midnight that same night, typing with that one finger to the glory of God." Corrie thought of Jesus blessing the woman who had given all that she had to the temple treasury and imagined the blessings that awaited that old, crippled woman who likewise gave all that she had.

With all the freedoms we have and the resources so readily available, God waits to bless us and others through us if only we would capture the message of

while she types. Sometimes it takes a long time for her finger to hit the key or for her to get the paper in the machine, but all the time she is praying for those whose books she is working on." He continued, "God has a purpose for her sickness. Every other Christian in the city is watched by the secret police. But because she has been sick so long, no one looks in on her. They leave us alone and she is the only person in the entire
