The luminaria represents the loved ones we cherish, all those here or gone.






Canute and Hendrix Students Plan Senior Art Exhibit at SWOSU

WESTERN OKLAHOMA/ELECTIONS - Two of three Western Oklahoma school districts passed bond issues at the ballot box last week. Voters in the Clinton School District gave 76% support to a \$50 million bond for district upgrades. Meanwhile, voters in the Burns Flat-Dill City School District supported two bond propositions, each getting 89% support. Superintendent Larry Johnson says one is for \$1 million for building upgrades, the other is for \$500,000 for the replacement of the district's four route buses. Additionally, a \$36 million bond for Hinton Public Schools went down in defeat, getting just over 30% support. In the lone school board of

CLINTON CC/TRAIN TRACK- Clinton City Council tabled action this week, surrounding repairs to the train track at Acme Brick Park. City Manager Robert Johnston says the city has made arrangements to get a bridge inspection complete and will hopefully have more information to present to the City Council at its next meeting.

WEATHERFORD/RECOGNITION- 26 business and higher education partnerships, throughout the state, were recently recognized as innovative collaborations that further the education of Oklahoma's workforce. Southwestern Oklahoma State University and Weatherford Regional Hospital were among those recognized with the Oklahoma State Regents for higher Education's Regent Business Partnership Excellence Award. The Regents Business Partnership Excellence Award is designed to highlight successful partnerships between higher education institutions and businesses to further cultivate the higher learning environment through state regents economic development grants.

Bulldogs Battles Savage Storm in Windy Saturday Slugfest

SWOSU Baseball played a pair of close and fun to watch games on Saturday

against Southeastern but fell short in both games dropping the day's slugfest opener 24-21 before also falling in the series finale 9-7. With winds howling out to center field, both offenses took advantage of the day and tormented the pitchers from nearly start to finish.

On Saturday, there was a span of eight consecutive top and bottom half innings where teams scored runs. Starting in the top of the fourth inning of game one, both sides plated runs in every inning through the conclusion of the game in the ninth and then continued the scoring into the series finale where the streak was finally halted in the bottom of the third inning when SWOSU was held scoreless.

SWOSU's 24-21 loss to Southeastern did break records. The two teams' 45 combined runs and 44 combined hits both set new GAC records for runs scored and hits in a contest.

The Bulldogs dropped the series 2-1 to the Savage Storm and remain tied for the No. 8 spot in the Great American Conference standings with three weekends left to go in the regular season. SWOSU will take a break from league play this Tuesday when they welcome USAO to Weatherford in a non-conference contest set to start at 3pm.

GAME ONE – SE 24, SWOSU 21

Errors haunted SWOSU in the slugfest that was game one. The defense committed five errors that resulted in 10 unearned runs.

Every pitcher that made an appearance, on both teams, allowed at least three runs.

Taylan Mullins-Ohm finished 3-5 with three home



runs, seven RBI, and four runs scored. JC Reed led inning that had SWOSU playing from behind the the team with four hits, finishing 4-6. Every member of the starting lineup had at least one hit.

13 of SWOSU's 21 hits went for extra bases. Enzo Bonventre also hit a ball out of the park, while Alex Rice collected a rare inside the park home run.

The game lasted four hours and one minute.

GAME TWO – SE 9, SWOSU 7 (5 inn.)

Because of the long game one, game two was forced to end early due to darkness. After SWOSU answered a pair of Southeastern runs in the top of the first with four of their own in the home half, the Savage Storm pushed the margin back out with a six-run second Enzo Bonventre.



In 1879 the U.S. Mint produced a \$4.00 gold coin known as a "Stella" (Latin for star) as evidenced by the star on the reverse.

The mint struck 475 pieces which were given to members of Congress for inspection which was standard practice at the time. It was a well-known fact the Congressmen gave their \$4 gold coins to their respective

"girlfriends" at certain nefarious houses in Washington,



D.C. as "gifts".

These \$4 gold coins rarely come up for sale. On February 24, 2022, an auction was held in Dallas, Texas. On this day two \$4 gold coins were the stars of the auction.

An 1879 \$4 Stella certified by the Numismatic Guaranty Corporation as a Proof 65 Cameo set a record price of \$184,500. The other 1879 \$4 Stella was certified by the Numismatic Guaranty Corporation as a Proof 65 which brought \$174,000.


