2022's SWOSU Athletic Auction to be Hosted in the Skyview Suite

The 16th annual SWOSU Athletic Auction will open its online bidding from August 1st - August 18th. Featuring another year of spectacular items and memorabilia, the auction has been a staple of SWOSU athletic fundraising and has always served as the beacon that the newest year of Sports is beginning!

On Friday, August 19th, following the live auction, the Hall of Fame Banquet will be held in the Skyview Suite in the Pioneer Cellular Event Center at 5:30pm. Three inductees will be honored into the Class of 2022, Mark Bay (Football), Clarke Hale (Men's Basketball), and Carly Zak (Volleyball).

Mark Bay played during the 1987-1990 seasons as a linebacker, racking up 308 total tackles, First Team NAIA All-American honors, and was named Defensive Player of the Year for District IX.

Clarke Hale was a record setter during his basketball career in the last 2000s, and set alone as the all-time dinner starts with a cocktail hour, dinner, and a live

scorer for SWOSU until this last season. Hale earned a spot on the All-Lone Star Conference (North Division) Team every season and was named MVP for his team in the Conference Tournament in 2009.

Carly Zak was a breakout star in the world of collegiate volleyball from day 1 and was named the GAC Freshman of the Year in 2013. Zak's legendary prowess on the court was unmatched, and she become the first SWOSU volleyball player named 4 times to the All-GAC, the first player to earn an All-Region Selection, and led the team to the first appearance for SWOSU in the women's volleyball NCAA tournament. She continues to hold the current SWOSU career record for kills, and even held the record for the conference as a whole during her competitive years.

The year events end with the annual live auction and dinner on August 20th. Beginning at 5:30pm, the auction featuring exclusive items only available to the live attendees.







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Need an Appraisal?

By definition, an Appraisal is an opinion of value. Opinions can vary and it has often been said that no two appraisers will agree. While this can be true, by following accepted procedures, called methodology, these differences between appraiser's opinions can be minimized. The needs for an appraisal can be varied and many.

 The most common appraisal need is for the purpose of borrowing money to purchase a home or any other piece of property. It may be for a business. Most lenders require an appraisal of the property being purchased or used as collateral to secure the loan. In some cases, by Federal Regulations, this appraisal must be performed by a State Certified Licensed Appraiser. In other cases, usually depending on the amount of value, a license is not required. In most cases, the lender must be the one to order the appraisal.

Another reason for needing an appraisal, could be pricing your property for sale, Many times, if you are listing the property with a Realtor, they will provide what is called a market analysis, which can be a form of an appraisal. Keep in mind, not all real estate personnel are qualified to appraise real estate. Their training is mostly dedicated toward the ethical handling of sales.

Other appraisal uses include; legal disputes, such as a divorce or a land division, such as a partition suit. The settlement and basis computation for an estate may require an appraisal. Most of these types of appraisals do not require a licensed indi-

The cost of an appraisal will vary with its use, size and time to secure the needed data. You can always ask for an estimate of cost before engaging an appraiser. Remember, experience in appraisals can be critical to good methodology.






Volleyball to be the recipient of the grant.


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







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SWOSU Names Annual Foundation Scholarship Recipients

Reclaim a Generation



Most authorities who gauge such things agree that the younger generation is less knowledgeable about the Bible and are less likely to take time worn-values seriously. Many drift away from their faith when they leave home. While there are many exceptions to this, it is true that we as believers would do well to "Reclaim a Generation."

This is the title of a prayer guide authored by Cheryl Sacks. The subtitle is 21 Days of Prayer for Schools."

Mrs. Sacks is a former school teacher and administrator, author of many books on prayer, and nationally known conference speaker. She outlines a 21 day journey of prayer which

is broad enough to include students, teachers and support groups, parents, school board members, churches, etc. It is a challenging charge to put into action our concerns about this generation that is facing confusing claims and half truths about their identity, traditional values and their place in the world. We dare not sit back and complain when the power of prayer is at our disposal. This is a concern that churches of various backgrounds can unite on.

The booklet presents various suggestions and prayers for the different groups that affect our students. For example one quote from her 21 days to pray for High Schools is as follows:

"High School can be an incredibly intense time for teens as they navigate dating and romantic relationships, friendship struggles, identity crises, bullying, exposure to drugs, alcohol, sex, immense peer pressure, and much more. It is no wonder that almost 70% of Christian youth leave the Church after high school. It's one of the most volatile seasons of life for young people, and we must pray to cover our nation's high schools with God's presence."

"Reclaim a Generation" is available at Prayershop. org. The total cost is \$14.95, which includes tax and shipping and handling charges. This is about what

you would pay for a meal out in a nice restaurant. Surely this next generation is worth that investment.

Educators often speak of "at risk" children and surely some are more at risk than others. But, every child is at risk in today's confusing world of misplaced values and misinformation. I pray that individuals in churches would rise up and assume leadership roles to meet the challenge of praying 21 days for our children and those who influence their lives.

Recently, while visiting for VBS prospects, I was amazed at the number of single parents, mostly moms but some dads. Most are struggling from paycheck to paycheck, often having little time or energy to give attention to each child's needs, or to encourage academic excellence. Not only do they need our prayers, they need someone to come alongside to share their burdens, to mentor, and to listen to their pain. Oh, I know how busy you are! But, maybe your child wouldn't be stunted for life if you missed one of his soccer games (whatever sport or event) We tend to have time for those things that we think are important or that we enjoy. SWOSU's Dr. Bo Pagliasotti Appointed to the NCAA Management Council

Southwestern Oklahoma State University's own Faculty Athletic Representative (FAR) Dr. Bo Pagliasotti was appointed to the impressive role of NCAA Division II Management Council this past school year and will serve a term through 2026.

The Management Council reports directly to the Presidents Council and is charged with recommending administrative policy and regulations that govern the division. The Management Council reviews and acts on recommendations from the Division II committee structure and from Division II representatives to committees with Association-wide functions. The Council also is responsible for appointing Division II representatives to those committees.

The committee must include at least four Athletic Directors, at least four Senior Woman Administrators, at least four FARs and at least one conference commissioner.

"I am very honored to serve on the NCAA Division II Management Council," said Pagliasotti. "I take this responsibility seriously and I am excited to represent the SWOSU family and every university, team, and athlete in the Great American Conference on a national level."

Pagliasotti is the lone representative for the Great American Conference on the Management Council and is one of only 28 members total.

He is in his sixth year as the Bulldog's FAR – a role he was appointed to during the 2017-18 school year by former SWOSU President Dr. Randy Beutler – and is also the chair of the Kinesiology Department

at SWOSU and the Sports Management Master's Program Director. In addition to Management Council, he serves as one of seven members on the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship Committee which awarded 1.24 million dollars to student athletes pursuing graduate degrees this year.

Prior to his administration efforts, Pagliasotti spent 10 years coaching at SWOSU where he started the Bulldog Volleyball program in 2005 and served as the head coach until 2011.

"We are being represented by the best and we know Dr. Pagliasotti is going to do a great job representing the Great American Conference," SWOSU Athletic Director Todd Helton said. "We are also very appreciative of his willingness to serve on this extremely important committee during the restructure of the NCAA DII constitution."
