Nova Dean Brown





By definition, an Appraisal is an opinion of value. Opinions can vary and it has often been said that no two appraisers will agree. While this can be true, by following accepted procedures, called methodology, these differences between appraiser's opinions can be minimized. The needs for an appraisal can be varied and many.

I. The most common appraisal need is for the purpose of borrowing money to purchase a home or any other piece of property. It may be for a business. Most lenders require an appraisal of the property being purchased or used as collateral to secure the loan. In some cases, by Federal Regulations, this appraisal must be performed by a State Certified Licensed Appraiser. In other cases, usually depending on the amount of value, a license is not required. In most cases, the lender must be the one to order the appraisal.

2. Another reason for needing an appraisal, could be pricing your property for sale, Many times, if you are listing the property with a Realtor, they will provide what is called a market analysis, which can be a form of an appraisal. Keep in mind, not all real estate personnel are qualified to appraise real estate. Their training is mostly dedicated toward the ethical handling of sales.

 Other appraisal uses include; legal disputes, such as a divorce or a land division, such as a partition suit. The settlement and basis computation for an estate may require an appraisal. Most of these types of appraisals do not require a licensed individual.

The cost of an appraisal will vary with its use, size and time to secure the needed data. You can always ask for an estimate of cost before engaging an appraiser. Remember, experience in appraisals can be critical to good methodology.






Through Kids Cafés, meals and snacks are provided

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


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
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Bulldogs Tie for Second in Great American Conference Preseason Poll

The Great American Conference released its Preseason Volleyball Coaches Poll for the 2022 season, with the Bulldogs being voted in the number two spot for the league.

The poll had reigning regular season champion Oklahoma Baptist in the top spot with six first-place votes followed by SWOSU and Harding who both earned 104 total voting points and tied for second. However, Harding (4) edged SWOSU (1) in first-place votes. Right behind the aforementioned three, was Arkansas Tech who snagged the final first-place vote. 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Thoughtful Prayer



Everybody prays. Even atheists in fox holes pray. But most would agree that prayer can become so trite and perfunctory that it could not be said to be "the effective fervent prayer of a righteous man," as James describes the kind of prayer that is powerful in its effect. Yet the Bible calls us to "devote"

(ourselves) to prayer," to "pray without ceasing" and Paul describes Epaphrs as "wrestling in prayer" for the folks back home in Colossae. (Col: 4:12) Jesus prayed all night before calling out the Apostles, as well as on many other occasions.

Great men of God in the past were fervent in their prayer efforts as well as calling others to do likewise. Great men of God in the present do the same. Yet as Wesley Duewel has said, "The power of prayer is still largely undiscovered and little

understood by many of his dear children."

Prayer is coming into the presence of Holy God, acknowledging his authority and power. "Our Father in Heaven..." gives voice to that understanding. We recognize his holiness..."hallowed be your name."

Whatever our request, the chief desire is that "...
Thy will be done."

So, when we pray, the first question must be "what is God's purpose in this?" Or, "What would God like to see happen?" We can only know this as our study of the Scripture enlightens the eyes of our heart revealing His heart. So, Bible study and prayer must go hand-in-hand to be effective.

When Jesus gave his final earthly message to the disciples, he said, "You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you." So when we pray we are primarily asking God to unleash His power in and through us or other people to accomplish his will in our lives or in the lives of others. So the basic question should be, "God, what do you want to see happen in this situation, event, or person's life?" If we limit our prayers to simply praying, "God bless

so-and-so, or to be with someone," we limit God's power to be poured out in specific ways.

What is paramount in the heart of God? Some would say that it is that we all be healthy and wealthy. If you listened in to most prayer requests in any small group or observed a list on Wednesday evening, that would seem to be so. Everyone knows somebody who is sick.

But we all know that Jesus did not die on the cross so that we would all be healthy. He died, taking our sins upon himself, so that we might have a relationship with him that would lead us to worship and obey. So why don't we have as our prayer priorities the things that involve the spiritual life---things that will last for eternity—our character/heart needs. I am convinced that we grieve the heart of God when we pray without a repentant heart, with no concern for the salvation of people, or mention of revival or spiritual awakening among his people. We want revival without repentance. We want his blessings without brokenness.

It is not wrong to pray for physical needs. But it should have as its ultimate purpose the refinement of our character, that we would become more like Jesus. To comment: jhm82@outlook.com.
