

Another timeless fair is being held in Oklahoma. From August 25th – 27th, the Hinton Free Fair will be held at the fairgrounds each evening at 7pm. The fair is also one of Oklahoma's oldest and most popular community fairs. Locally owned and operated, the fair is believed to have begun in 1905 as an event to showcase the locals and their farm produce & animals. As the fair grew, a permanent location was established for future fairs, and it was moved to its new fairgrounds in the 1950's. New facilities and rides like the train, Ferris Wheel, swings, the dunking board, and "The Worm" were built over the next few years. With each fair being bigger than the last, new games, rides, and prizes were added. Today, the Hinton Fair boasts an impressive list of challenging and engaging games, thrilling rides, delicious food, and great entertainment.

Tickets for rides are only 50 cents each with all but the large rides requiring just two tickets. For fun to affordability, it can't be beat. The fair hosts a variety of entertainment from livestock shows, exhibits, and musical acts each night.

Harvey J. (Joe) Sullivan

Harvey J. (Joe) Sullivan was born to Charles F. and Minnie Pearl (Morrow) Sullivan on January 12, 1933, on a farm southeast of Putnam, OK and passed away Saturday, August 13, 2022, at home in Weatherford, having reached the age of 89 years, 7 months, 1 day.



Joe lived there nine years, starting first grade at the Independence Consolidated Country School. During World War II, when Joe was in the third grade, his family relocated northeast of Putnam where Joe attended a country school called "Soddy" through the eighth grade. Later his family moved southwest of Putnam where Joe graduated as Valedictorian from Putnam High School

Joe attended Oklahoma A&M, (now known as Oklahoma State University) in Stillwater for a year and a half. In 1953, Joe volunteered for the U.S. Army and was stationed in Arkansas, North Carolina, Alabama, and South Korea. Following an honorable discharge, he re-enrolled at Oklahoma A&M University. Shortly thereafter, Joe received a call from the Administrator at Southwestern State College, (now known as Southwestern Oklahoma State University) at Weatherford, OK, inviting him play his favorite sport – basketball. Joe accepted the offer and graduated in 1958 with a double major in Physics and Mathematics.

One day before graduation, Joe's basketball buddy, Orin Patton and he were in the Student Union when a very attractive coed walked up to speak with Orin. He introduced her to Joe as Lois Crowder, a high school classmate and graduate of Custer City, OK School. She was there for freshman orientation and Orin and Joe were observing and enjoying the freshman confusion. Later that night Orin and Joe saw Lois again. Joe, smitten with her good looks and wonderful personality invited her to a dance at the Student Union ballroom. She accepted, but when Joe tried to introduce her to some of his basketball friends, he could not remember her name. Embarrassed, Joe had to ask her name in front of all of his basketball buddies. Well, that broke the ice, and after a short romance - Lois and Joe were married at Independence Church on January 18, 1957.

In 1976, Joe and his family moved back to Borger, TX with another promotion. His position entailed assembling a group to purchase and maintain all of the computers in the Refinery and Natural Gas Plant for the automated control of many units.

With his specialization in electrical and instrumentation fields, Joe was offered a promotion to transfer to Phillips headquarters in Bartlesville, OK .In 1980, Joe became a consultant for all the refining and chemical plants across the United States. Joe also spent time in Stavanger, Norway, doing safety audits on offshore structures and operations.

In 1987 Joe was offered a transfer back to Borger, TX to head up a group called "Authority of Expenditures' (AFE). This position consisted of managing engineers in specialty fields, such as mechanical, civil, electrical, etc.

Joe had an opportunity to retire early from PPCO after 34 years with the company. He retired at age 60 and moved back to Weatherford, OK in 1993 to raise cattle

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on Lois' family ranch near Thomas, OK. What a change! While in Weatherford, Joe became a member of the First Baptist Church and was one of the very first groups at that church to be re-baptized at Crowder Lake.

Joe was preceded in death by his beloved wife Lois, his father Charles, and his mother Minnie Pearl. He was also preceded in death by three brothers and six sisters and was the last living member of his family.


Joe leaves behind many friends that he hopes one day to see again in Heaven.

Need an Appraisal?

By definition, an Appraisal is an opinion of value. Opinions can vary and it has often been said that no two appraisers will agree. While this can be true, by following accepted procedures, called methodology, these differences between appraiser's opinions can be minimized. The needs for an appraisal can be varied and many.

1. The most common appraisal need is for the purpose of borrowing money to purchase a home or any other piece of property. It may be for a business. Most lenders require an appraisal of the property being purchased or used as collateral to secure the loan. In some cases, by Federal Regulations, this appraisal must be performed by a State Certified Licensed Appraiser. In other cases, usually depending on the amount of value, a license is not required. In most cases, the lender must be the one to order the appraisal.

2. Another reason for needing an appraisal, could be pricing your property for sale, Many times, if you are listing the property with a Realtor, they will provide what is called a market analysis, which can be a form of an appraisal. Keep in mind, not all real estate personnel are qualified to appraise real estate. Their training is mostly dedicated toward the ethical handling of sales.

3. Other appraisal uses include; legal disputes, such as a divorce or a land division, such as a partition suit. The settlement and basis computation for an estate may require an appraisal. Most of these types of appraisals do not require a licensed individual.

The cost of an appraisal will vary with its use, size and time to secure the needed data. You can always ask for an estimate of cost before engaging an appraiser. Remember, experience in appraisals can be critical to good methodology.

Whatever you do: PUT ALL REAL ESTATE CONTRACTS IN WRITING. Verbal Real Estate Contracts are not admissible in a court of law.

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

half dollars began in 1892 celebrating the World's Columbian Exposition. The 1922 Grant

Memorial has a "star" on the obverse on the first issues but was removed later which created a "Variety" for

collectors to obtain.

The above coin, with the 'star' on the reverse, is key to the series. Its' mintage was 4,256 pieces. The same coin with the 'star' removed has a mintage of 67,405 pieces.

Laura Gardin Fraser, a U.S. Mint engraver, designed both the obverse and reverse sides.

The above Grant half dollar was certified by The Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS) as a Mint State 67. It sold at auction in Las Vegas for \$55,812.50.

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

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Humphrey to Consider Legislation to Support State's Ranchers



Rep. Justin Humphrey, R-Lane, said he is considering proposing legislation that could be brought forward in the House's current special session to assist Oklahoma farmers and ranchers in the current drought.

"Previously, in times of serious drought, Oklahoma's government has stepped in and assisted ranchers with shipping hay," Humphrey said. "During Oklahoma's last serious drought, state government utilized the National Guard to assist in shipping hay from other states not affected by drought. Legislators could take advantage of our current special session to support our state's ranchers and vote on a measure to help offset the hay cost. Our legislators might be the difference for many ranchers to remain in the beef industry."

Humphrey said ranchers are a vital component of Oklahoma history and the state's current economy.

"Oklahoma ranchers have supplied our state and nation with quality beef since statehood," he said. "When you think of Oklahoma, you think of cowboys and cowgirls, tough, full of Oklahoma grit, and willing to help out our neighbors in times of trouble."

Today, Oklahoma ranchers are in a severe dilemma, Humphrey said. He said reports indicate that most of western Oklahoma is in an extreme drought, with parts

of the Panhandle and Southwest Oklahoma in exceptional drought. Significant crop/pasture losses and widespread water shortages or restrictions are the main impacts of this drought. Additionally, the state is experiencing critically low lake levels and increased danger from wildfires.

"Suppose that was not enough," Humphrey said. "Factor in the unbelievable price of feed, fuel, supplies, and labor. Inflation has made it impossible to fertilize, weed spray and care for livestock the way most ranchers are accustomed. Now the drought has many ranchers wondering if they will be able to continue due to the loss of pasture and hav."

In the past, Humphrey said Oklahoma ranchers demonstrated a tradition of assisting each other and even pitching in to assist other states in overcoming difficulties like drought. But recently, he said he's witnessed something he finds profoundly troubling.

"Some Oklahoman ranchers and truckers are taking advantage of fellow Oklahomans who are in desperate need," he said. "Many Oklahoma ranchers are charging three times the normal hay cost. Numerous truckers charge three times the cost of an average shipment. Some landowners are doubling leases for hay. When did it become OK to profit or benefit from others' struggles? It's sure not the cowboy way!"

Humphrey challenges and encourages ranchers, truckers, landowners, and especially the state's government to do all it can to help struggling ranchers.

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
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

Back-To-School Insurance Tips

Summer is coming to an end, and the beginning of the new school year is around the corner. As the parent of two college students and one who recently graduated, I understand how exciting this time is for students and parents. Whether you are a recent high school graduate going into college or a nervous parent getting ready for your child's first day, it is important to review your insurance policies to make sure your entire family is properly covered.

During this busy time of year, I want to remind Oklahomans that having proper insurance can provide greater peace of mind all year long and protect their family from financial disaster. Here are some insurance tips parents and students should consider before heading to school.

Home

If your student is moving into a dorm room, your

homeowners policy will likely cover their belongings in case of a loss. Ask your child to let you know if they buy a new computer or other pricey items. You'll need to check with your insurance company to ensure your coverage will take care of these things.

Students living off-campus should consider renters insurance. This coverage will protect students' belongings and protect them if someone is injured on the property. Premiums for renters insurance range between \$15-\$30 a month, depending on the location and size of the rental unit and the value of the possessions. Whether they live on campus or off-campus, a home inventory is a good idea. The list of items will make a future insurance claim quicker and easier to settle.

Auto

Oklahoma requires every car to have auto liability coverage or otherwise meet the financial responsibility requirements of Oklahoma law. Auto liability insurance pays for property damage and bodily injury to someone else if you are found responsible for an accident, up to the policy's limits. If the title to the car is in your student's name, they will have to have their own policy. If your college student is driving a vehicle you own, your child can likely stay on your policy.

If your student is heading to college without a vehicle,

you might be eligible for a "student away at school" car insurance discount. Check with your insurance agent or insurance company and let them know where the car will be stored if the address differs from what's on the policy.

Health

Students have several options for health insurance coverage while away at college. If your children are covered under your insurance now, chances are they will still be covered while away at school. Any insurance plan that offers dependent coverage must make that available until the dependent is 26.

Many colleges and universities also offer their own student health insurance plans. The premiums and features vary widely from school to school. Check with your student's school health center to see available coverage options.

Denied Insurance Claims

If your family experiences a claim denial or settlement disagreement, you can file a complaint at oid.ok.gov. The Oklahoma Insurance Department's Consumer Assistance team serves to mediate claims between policyholders and insurance companies.
