



Nine returning Lady Bulldogs from last year's roster will be joined by five new additions to the team in 2022-23.

SWOSU will be without some familiar faces this season. The Lady Dawgs lost reigning D2CCA National Player of the Year Makyra Tramble and Lauren Ramey to the Division I starter Bethany Franks.

New head coach Jeff Zinn also kicks off a new era of SWOSU women's basketball. He replaced 13-year coach Kelsi Musick back in May. Coach Zinn brings 28 years of successful Oklahoma high school head coaching experience to SWOSU and spent last season at NCAA Division I Oral Roberts University as an assistant women's coach. This season will be his first as a head coach at the college level.

Zinn brought on assistant coach Heather Davis to his staff. Davis came from UCO where she was an eight-year assistant coach for the Bronchos after also finishing up her playing career there. Davis replaces Musick's longtime assistant Cophie Anderson.

The Lady Bulldog basketball program has made the NCAA Tournament in each of the last five seasons. SWOSU is a five-time regular season champion of the Great American Conference and has won the conference tournament four times since the league began in

The new campaign starts November 11 at the GAC/MIAA Crossover held in Topeka, Kansas this year. SWOSU will take on Washburn

University, the host of the event, on Friday, November 11, and Pitt State on Saturday, November 12.


direction of the Kiesau-Lee Funeral Home.





The Custer County Conflict Food Drive results are in: 41,809 pounds of food were collected for food-insecure Western Oklahoman by the Clinton Red Tornadoes and Weatherford Eagles. The Eagles have been announced as the "winner" of this drive for bringing in the most food for the event.

WEATHERFORD CC/FAA GRANTS - The Weatherford City Commission approved the receipt and spending of two grants for work at Stafford airport. Director Mark Schoonmaker said he wants to spend the \$45,000 in grant funds for projects at the airport, including the purchase of a transport golf cart for those who are utilizing the airport.

BLAINE COUNTY / FATALITY - An 11-year old Wetumpka girl is dead and a woman is hospitalized in critical condition at OU Medical Center after a one vehicle accident in Blaine County, 1 mile north of Southard. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said the driver, 47year old Jennifer Lee Hughes Bailey of Wetumpka, is hospitalized following the accident. The cause of the crash is under investigation.

CUSTER COUNTY / FATALITY - A two car collision on County Road 2310 North, just south of East 980 Road approximately four miles east of Arapaho in Custer County has left three dead. Oklahoma Highway Patrol said that a vehicle driven by Sabrina N. Bates age 24 of Custer City and two juvenile passengers were traveling northbound on North 2310 Road and lost control as they traveled over a bridge and went left of center, colliding head on with a vehicle travelling southbound, driven by Tina A Smith, age 45 also of Custer City and one juvenile female passenger. Bates was transported by air evac to OU Medical Center and admitted in good condition with trunk, internal and leg injuries. One juvenile passenger in that vehicle was pronounced dead at the scene by the medical examiner's office and one juvenile passenger, age 2 was transported to OU Children's Hospital where she was treated and released. Tina Smith and her passenger, a juvenile female were both pronounced dead at the scene. OHP said the collision is still under investigation.

WEATHERFORD/REPUBLIC - Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown said he hasn't had positive feedback regarding a presentation by Republic Services last week to switch to a polycart trash pickup service. Brown said under the proposal, the city would save about a million dollars a year. The commission decided to table any action, regarding the presentation for at least a month.

CLINTON CC / HOSPITAL - Clinton City Council acting as the hospital authority heard a presentation from attorney Jim Slaton representing Carrus health care. Slaton did say if Carrus became involved no personnel changes would occur and said there are services that the company would want to implement such as swing bed and OB services.

ODOT / 8 YEAR PLAN - Twenty years after the adoption of the Oklahoma Department of Transportation's first 8 year construction work plan, the Oklahoma Transportation Commission approved its newest update. It contains \$8.4 billion worth of critically needed transportation improvement projects. Locally, in Custer County, in federal fiscal year 2023, a 5-mile widen, resurface and bridge project is planned on Highway 54, north of Weatherford. Another five mile widen and resurface project is planned on Highway 54, north of Weatherford in federal fiscal year 2024. The grade, drain, bridge & surface of interstate 40 at exit 65 at Clinton is slated for federal fiscal year 2025. A 3-mile resurfacing project on interstate 40 beginning at mile marker 65.6 to 69, will occur in federal fiscal year 2028. An 8-mile widen, resurface and bridge project on State Highway 33 is planned for federal fiscal year 2030.

BURNS FLAT / ARPA FUNDS - The Oklahoma Legislature approved nearly \$2 billion in federal pandemic relief funds with about a quarter of that money going to water infrastructure projects. Despite requesting \$30 million in ARPA funds for improvements to the water and internet infrastructure for Burns Flat and its spaceport, the Oklahoma Space Industry Development authority was approved for \$4.25 million.

**CLINTON CC / AIR CONDITIONING BID - By** a 3-2 vote, the Clinton City Council approved a bid for phase one of the air conditioning project at the Clinton Fire Station. It was determined that the bid of just over \$21,000 from Wisdom Refrigeration was the best bid, despite not being the low bid. Fire Chief Brett Russell said the department has had tremendous expense over the last 2 years with the current system. He said the department spent over 2 weeks without any air conditioning this summer and ended up installing conventional window units in the firemen's bedrooms.

**CLINTON CC / SPARKLIGHT - Cable TV provider** Sparklight has informed the city of Clinton that effective with their next billing statement, its modem and EMTA rates will increase by \$2 per month. In a letter to the city, General Manager Amanda Moore said the rate hike is due to supply chain challenges, labor shortages and market inflation which have increased technology costs over the past year. This marks the first increase of modems and EMTA rates in nearly five years for Spark-



# **Tigers Run Past Bulldogs in SWOSU's Latest Game**

SWOSU Football went score-for-score with #5/4 Ouachita early on the road in Arkadelphia, but the Tiger offense proved to be too much to handle as the Dawgs eventually fell 63-24 on Saturday afternoon.

Ouachita scored touchdowns on nine consecutive possessions, starting when the game began.

The Tigers, who boast the second-best running attack in all of Division II, rushed for 481 yards in the contest and added 228 yards through the air. 709 yards of total offense is the most a SWOSU defense has allowed in the Division II era.

Tylan Morton and the offense showed bright spots Saturday, especially in the first half when he and the Dawgs scored on three consecutive drives when both sides were battling. Morton finished 24-33 for 261 yards and a pair of scores and added 37 yards rushing. He was intercepted one time.

After a three-and-out to start the game, SWOSU fell behind 7-0 following a quick four play drive by Ouachita that ended with a 30-yard touchdown pass. The Tigers, predominantly a running team, came out with an uptempo pace and threw the ball twice in those four plays, catching the Dawgs off balance from the jump.

that point, the Bulldog offense settled in and began to score. SWOSU was halted in the red zone the following possession but got on the board with a Jaren Van Winkle

The offense then went on a 10 play, 74-yard drive next capped off by a Troy Henderson run from one-yard out

for the first touchdown of the game. The score came one play following a 16-yard Morton scamper.

The last SWOSU score of the first half came on the very next drive when Morton connected with Deshon Moreaux streaking down the sideline for a 36-yard touchdown pass and catch.

Unfortunately, while the offense was clicking in the first half, so was Ouachita's. The Tigers had an answer to SWOSU's score each time with one of their own. After Moreaux's touchdown had the Dawgs close at 21-17, Ouachita scored again and then began to get stops on defense which allowed the margin to grow.

At halftime SWOSU trailed 42-17 and only managed one more score in the contest.

Ouachita put up 21 unanswered points in the third quarter before Jalen Lampley finally got the Dawgs on the board with a 32-yard touchdown grab. Neither side scored in the fourth quarter.

In the game, Moreaux and Lampley combined to catch 11 passes for 165 yards and their scores. Isreal Watson hauled in nine grabs for 63 yards.

Gerald Palmer ran the ball 14 times for 33 yards.

On defense, Treymon Fullwood led the team with 11 tackles (8s-3a) followed by Ashton Hamby with nine and Keldric Martin with eight. Ouachita did not turn the ball over on Saturday.

Ouachita had a pair of 100-yard rushers and six total touchdowns on the ground. The starting Tiger quarterback finished 12-13 for 197 yards and two scores.

# **Soccer Stays Undefeated** In GAC Play



SWOSU Soccer took a trip east on I-40 on Saturday, taking on Southern Nazarene. They came out on top 2-1.

Alimata Rabo would start the scoring early with a 4' goal to continue off of her record setting performance against Oklahoma Baptist just two days ago. This is her seventh goal of the season and the third game of the past four in which she has scored a goal.

The scoring would cease for 70 plus minutes, until SNU tied the game at 1-1. In the 86', Julie Andersen would break the tie and score a game winning goal, assisted by Rabo. This SNU goal marks the first GAC goal that goalkeeper Ashley Hughes has given up this season.

The score does not tell the whole story of the game in this one. SWOSU tripled SNU in shots (27-9), bested them in shots on goal (7-5), and held a distinct advantage in corner kicks (8-1). SWOSU had numerous opportunities at scoring and if they had found ways to capitalize on more of them, the final would have been more lopsided.







# Rabo Breaks Scoring Record in Rout of League Leading Oklahoma Baptist

Senior forward Alimata Rabo accounted for four her career and six on the year. of the six goals the Bulldogs scored against Oklahoma Baptist in a 6-0 rout and in doing so, became SWOSU Soccer's all-time scoring leader.

Rabo sat with 76 career goals and two behind former teammate Sandra Nabweteme (78) on the alltime scoring list. She proceeded to tie that record in the first half, break it shortly into the second half, and finally extend it with her fourth (and final) goal of the match--The ultimate haul.

Rabo's four goals ties the school record for most goals scored in a single game. Kelsi Visor did that once back in 2011, and Rabo has now done that feat on six separate occasions. She now has 80 goals in

The match Thursday was supposed to be tightly contested. Oklahoma Baptist entered Thursday in first place in the Great American Conference standings. SWOSU was 2-6-2 against OBU dating back to 2018. Yet, none of the aforementioned mattered as the Dawgs picked up the game winning goal just 13 minutes into the match and proceeded to score three goals in each half to win it.

Prior to Thursday, Oklahoma Baptist had not allowed more than four goals in a GAC match since joining the conference in 2015.

SWOSU took 22 shots total, 13 on goal, while the defense limited OBU to just four shots on target. Goalkeeper Ashley Hughes took care of the rest and posted her fourth conference clean sheet of the season. Freshman Lillian Rhodes came in for Hughes with 10 minutes remaining and earned one save. Five games into SWOSU's conference schedule, the stingy Bulldog defense has yet to allow a goal.

Desiree Rodriguez and Brenna McGuirk scored SWOSU's other two goals. Rodriguez put the Dawgs ahead 2-0 when she took a pass in the box and kicked it home for her first goal of the season. McGuirk's second goal of the season came in Thursday's final minute.

Assists on the afternoon were from Rodriguez, Micaella Swain, Wagner, and Claire Torry.

## Your God is Too Safe



One of my favorite verses in the Bible and one that you would do well to memorize is Romans 15:13, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Paul had not yet visited the church in Rome. It was primarily

made up of Gentiles but with a number of Jews as well. It was this letter that changed Martin Luther's life and brought on the Protestant revolution.

Paul shares with them his intention to visit the church after he takes an offering to the church in Jerusalem. Little did he realize that his visit would not be as a free man but as a prisoner under house arrest. In his later letters from his cell in Rome, he refers to himself as a prisoner of the Lord.

Earlier in this letter he commends the church because their faith is "being reported all over the world."

He shares that he is "constantly praying for them." Because of Rome's distinction as the capital of the Roman Empire, word of the faith of this group of believers would spread rapidly through traders and other travelers.

In this last prayer verse we referred to, he notes that God is a God of hope. While the persecution led by Nero had not yet reached its peak, nonetheless the Christian church was going through tough times.

Our landscape today littered with people who are feeling the sting of hopelessness. The doctor reports to the anxious family that there appears to be "no hope." A marriage that once was filled with joy and great anticipation is now rendered "hopeless." A young single mother with a six month old baby and a ninth grade education, no job, and \$1300 rent payment due. Hopeless!

But there is hope in Christ. He can take the tattered pieces of a life and do the impossible. God is a God of hope. He can give you joy and peace as you trust

Him. It won't happen overnight and it won't be easy. But God' grace and powerful love, the same power that raised Jesus from the dead, is available to each of us. He longs to change your focus. The word "repent" basically means a changing of your mind; a change in the way you think. Whereas you have been the one in charge and gone into the God business, you must relinquish your control and enter into a relationship of surrender and obedience to a Father who longs to bless you and give you joy and peace.

David's prayer in Psalm 25:3-7 is recipe for hope. "No one whose hope is in you will ever be put to shame. But they will be put to shame who are treacherous without excuse. Show me your ways, O Lord, teach me your paths; guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Savior, and my hope is in you all day long. Remember, O Lord, your great mercy and love, for they are from of old.

Remember not the sins of my youth and my rebellious ways; according to your love remember me, for you are good, O Lord.

# OSDE Publishes Oklahoma Family Guides to Support Classroom Instruction at Home



The Oklahoma State Department of Education (OSDE) announced that it has published 58 new or updated Oklahoma Family Guides to give families a convenient way to support their children's classroom learning at home.

The guides originally were produced in fall 2019 for core subjects – language arts, mathematics, science and social studies – in prekindergarten through second grade. In 2019, the OSDE added guides for the same subjects in third through sixth grades. All now include additional examples to help make student learning expectations more concrete and understandable and to reflect shifts in academic standards since that time, if applicable. Guides for prekindergarten through sixth grade are newly available for music, physical education and visual art, as well as kindergarten through fifth grade for health.

Written by subject matter experts in the OSDE's Office

of Curriculum and Instruction, the guides are color-coded by subject. The front side of each guide focuses on gradeand subject-specific expectations and learning goals for the school year and what to do at home to help children reach them. The reverse side includes guiding questions to foster additional skills including curiosity, communication and comprehension.

Each of the guides is a printable, one-page flyer convenient for at-home use or while meeting or talking with teachers during conferences or other occasions. Suggestions in each guide were designed to be easily integrated into existing family routines and schedules. Guides are available by individual grades and subjects, for all subjects within a single grade and for all grades within a subject.

The donation will help provide nearly 850,000 meals to Oklahomans who are food insecure.

surplus food donations to our partners every year."


During April and May, Walmart and Sam's Club locations across the nation were matched with at least one of 200 local Feeding America® member food banks.
