



# **SWOSU Hosts 5th Dr. Blake Sonobe Lecture Series**

Lecture Series at Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) is scheduled for Friday, October 28, 2022, from 6-8 p.m. in the Fine Arts Center – the public is invited to attend. This year's lecture features Ms. Camille Goerend, a Biological Sciences major and senior from Weatherford, Oklahoma. Goerend will speak about her experiences working as an undergraduate researcher for Dr. Vijay Somalinga. The title of her talk is "Beta-Carbonic Anhydrase: A potential antibacterial target against Rhodococcus equi, the main cause of pneumonia in foals".

Goerend has had a successful research career while at SWOSU, serving as a Stafford Scholar for the General Thomas P. Stafford Air and Space Museum. Most recently she represented SWOSU as the university representative for the 27th Oklahoma Research Day at the Capitol where she won the grand prize of a \$5,000 research grant to continue her studies. After graduation,

The fifth installment she plans to attend medical school.

Dr. Vijay Somalinga is an Associate Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences. His research focuses on understanding protein structure-function relationships and how proteins affect physiological processes in microorganisms. Somalinga holds the distinction of advising back-to-back grand prize winners of the Oklahoma Research Day at the Capitol. He has advised 3 students to date and currently advising five SWOSU undergraduate research students. Somalinga's students have won several regional and state-level recognitions for their research.

The Dr. Blake Sonobe Lecture series was started as a way to recognize outstanding student researchers in multiple academic disciplines and to share experiences with fellow students and the community at large. Past speakers have included Elisabeth Allbritton, Chemistry; Dillon Martone, Language, and Literature; Bryler Atchley and Hannah Budde, Biological Sciences; and Ariana Martin, Computer Science

HIGHER GROUND National Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church.

"Religious persecution in China today is worse than it has been in decades." This report is from Bob Fu, former Chinese dissident and longtime international human rights advocate while speaking at a gathering at Dallas Baptist University. Fu formerly taught in a communist school in China, but he became a

Christian and pastored a network of underground churches. He was arrested and imprisoned but managed to escape with his wife and later settled in the United States where he founded the ChinaAid advocacy organization.

He noted that the Chinese Government has "launched a war against the cross," outlawing its public display throughout the nation. According to this report from the Baptist Standard, China has outlawed the public display of the cross and began a "cross demolition campaign." Pastors who refused to remove the cross from buildings received 12-14 year prison sentences.

Fu said he is discouraged by the increase in religious persecution, he reminded the group that religious revival followed persecution during Mao's Cultural Revolution, and he predicted a "much bigger revival" could result from the suffering of Chinese Christians today.

This is only one of many spots around the world where it is very physically dangerous to be a follower of Christ. Many places in the Middle East as well as in Africa, have had homes and churches burned and many lives lost because of their faith in Christ.

Even in the USA, while interviewing an athlete, the name of Jesus is blocked out for fear of offending somebody. It is okay to use it as a swear word but not okay to speak favorably of that great name.

Churches often speak little of the "day of Prayer" for our brothers and sisters suffering for the name of Christ. It might interfere with our schedule. One of the most important things for those being persecuted is to know that they are not alone-that they are not forgotten.

How can we pray for the Persecuted Church? We might

think that we should pray that the persecution would stop. While that is true; many know that to just simply stop their witnessing would end the persecution so that is not the first choice. Some thoughts are as follows:

- Pray that they would sense the presence of Christ through the Holy Spirit.

- Pray that their faith would endure--"that they would stand firm in all the will of God, mature and fully assured. (Col. 4:12)

- That their strong faith and demeanor would be a witness to their captors.

- That they would be able to forgive those who persecute them.

- That families left behind would be provided for and comforted.

- That healing from beatings and torture would come quickly.

- That government authorities would be responsible in punishing the perpetrators.

- That the power of the Holy Spirit would break through the barriers and true revival would break out.

# Soccer Concludes Arkansas Road Trip With Tie

The second matchup of the season went different than the first. SWOSU defeated Harding 2-0 at the SWOSU Athletic Complex on September 29.

SWOSU was firing shots, but could not get any into the back of the net. They outshot Harding 16-6. They had more shots on goal, with seven, than Harding had total shots. Yet, no points were put on the board for the

duration of the game.

Emmy Wagner posted season highs in minutes (66) and shots (4) in today's game, as well as a shot on goal. Alimata Rabo also had four shots, with three of those shots on goal. Ashley Hughes faced two shots on goal and saved both of them, giving her another GAC shutout.

SWOSU eludes yet another loss and stays undefeated in the GAC on the year, 5-0-5. They go to 5-4-7 overall in 2022. Their last home game will be on October 27 against Southern Nazarene at 3:00 PM.





# Home Win Streak Snapped in Loss to OBU

SWOSU Volleyball couldn't get anything going at Jon Chidester home against Oklahoma SWOSU Media Relations Baptist on Thursday

evening, falling in three sets to the Bison. The loss snaps a 19-game home win streak that dated back to the spring of '21 COVID season.

OBU completes the regular season sweep of the Dawgs with the win having also beaten SWOSU 3-1 back exactly a month ago in Shawnee.

SWOSU moves to 12-11 and 8-4 in conference play. hey remain in third place in the GAC standings.

With their backs against the wall, SWOSU fought back in the third set behind the energy of Carmen Kinsey. She had three kills and three blocks to try to will the Dawgs to a fourth set, but with the Bulldogs up 21-20 after completing a comeback down 18-11, OBU scored the next five points to end it.

Kinsey finished with seven kills in the match, bested only by her partner in the middle Zoey Sparks who had eight. Final numbers showed SWOSU with a .084 hitting percentage compared to OBU's .206. The Bison hurt the Bulldogs on the service line, finishing with nine aces in the match. SWOSU finished with 7.0 blocks (3s-8a) but OBU edged them with 10 (5s-10a). With four regular season matches remaining, SWOSU will look to finish strong heading into the postseason. Up next will be Southeastern, next Tuesday, at home. From there, SWOSU travels to East Central (10/27) and Northwestern (11/1) before closing out the schedule at home against Southern Nazarene (11/3).

SWOSU played OBU tight in the beginning stages of the opening set, but after the 11-11 mark the Bison began to pull away. Six out of the next seven points went to the visitors and they closed out set one from there.

In the second, OBU hit a match high .385 and nearly led the entire way through.

HYDRO / BRUSH TRUCK - The Hydro volunteer fire department has raised more than \$47,000 for a new brush truck for the department. Fire Chief Kirk Hartman said he is hopeful that the truck will be in service in the summer of 2023.

CLINTON CC / HOSPITAL - Clinton city council acting as the hospital authority decided to refer multiple proposals to city staff regarding a hospital management operating company agreement for Clinton Regional Hospital. City attorney Ryan Meacham recommended that the council meet with the hopes an agreement can be negotiated by then.

TWO VEHICLE FATALITY ACCIDENT - A 32-year-old Hydro female died in a 2-vehicle accident. Alexis Murray was driving westbound on HWY-152 and struck the rear of a John Deer Tractor being driven by 55-year-old Jerry Willard. Willard was uninjured, Murray was pronounced dead at the scene.

CLINTON / LIGHTING - Clinton mayor David Berrong said he hopes the city can partner with the Cheyenne and Arapaho tribes on a lighting project in the future. Berrong said that could include lighting from exit 69 off I-40 all the way to the recently upgraded bridge on the east side of Clinton.

CADDO CO DIST COURT / GLENN - A Hydro man scheduled to appear in court this month for a blind plea in connection with child pornography charges won't be in court until next month. Twenty-two-year old Austin Glenn will appear in court November 9th to enter a blind plea in the case. Glenn was arrested and charged in October 2020 after agents from the Oklahoma State Bureau of investigation assisted by the Caddo County Sheriff's office and Hydro police served a search warrant in the 100 block of East Main Street in Hydro. The case originated when the national center for missing and exploited children forwarded a cyber tip they received from an electonic service provider to the OSBI.

ECU came into this contest on a five-game winning streak after dropping their first two games of the 2022 season.

The game started slowly in the first quarter with a touchdown from each team and a couple of punts traded back and forth. It looked to be a shootout after SWOSU tied the game at 7-7 with 6:38 in the first quarter.

The next ECU possession was capped off with a 40-yard reverse jet sweep touchdown run on a 3rd & 17 play where SWOSU looked prime for a

The Dawgs came right back down the field with their best possession of the game. It was a 16 play, 81-yard drive that ended with Dexter Brown walking into the end zone untouched for a two-yard touchdown reception. This drive ended with 8:12 left in the second quarter.

The next SWOSU score would come again from Brown in the form of a 29-yard run. The problem is that ECU had scored four touchdowns in that time span.

This left SWOSU with less than a quarter and a half to make up the 21-point deficit. The ECU lead proved to be insurmountable for the Dawgs.

SWOSU gave up too many big plays on defense. The Tigers had touchdown plays of 66 yards, 40


yards, 42 yards, and 88 yards. ECU outgained the Dawgs 458-346 on 10 less offensive plays.



# State Superintendent Hoffmeister Announces 'CLASS 2.0' Grant Initiative This Fall



State Superintendent of Public Instruction Joy Hofmeister announced that the Oklahoma State Department of Education (OSDE) intends to complete a planned phase two of the Oklahoma Classroom Learning and School Supplies (CLASS) Grant initiative this fall.

Based on its record-setting success implementing the first round CLASS Grant initiative in February 2022, the OSDE once again plans to dedicate \$6 million in federal relief funds to help classroom teachers obtain resources for their students through the national nonprofit DonorsChoose.

Hofmeister directed federal funding to the CLASS initiative after a survey of teachers revealed the urgent need for new classroom tools to address learning gaps created by the pandemic.

"Teachers in Oklahoma need as much classroom support as possible as the impacts of the pandemic continue to be felt and available resources remain scarce," Hofmeister said. "Rising inflation has kept needed school supplies and learning resources outof-reach for too many teachers and families. Our first round of CLASS Grant funding was wildly successful in addressing the high-demand need for resources to support learning and we anticipate continued success with CLASS 2.0."

Dates for the second CLASS Grant initiative (CLASS 2.0) will be announced once it has the Governor's cabinet secretary's signature.

The OSDE will provide up to \$800 to an educator's project, available on a first-come, first-served basis for only one project per classroom teacher. Materials requested must be for student use; professional development materials will not qualify.

More than 7,500 Oklahoma classroom teachers in 1,411 schools at 462 districts received shipments of hand-picked learning tools and school supplies through the first CLASS grant initiative.


