

Soccer Wins GAC Championship, Earns NCAA Tournament Bid

SWOSU Media Relations the GAC Tournament Championship today with a 2-0 win over Oklahoma Baptist. The conference championship moves the Dawgs into the NCAA National Tournament.

SWOSU Soccer claimed

This was the third meeting between the two schools this season. SWOSU outscored OBU 10-0 in these three contests. The win avenges the 2021 GAC Tournament Championship defeat that SWOSU took at the hands of Oklahoma Baptist last year.

The Bulldogs defense was once again the most valuable piece of the team. OBU's attack found its way deep into the SWOSU side of the field many times during the game, but the backline stayed solid and clogged the box enough to keep the Bison out of the goal.

Sola Tsuruta scored in the 9' off of a penalty kick granted by a foul in the goalie's box on an OBU defender. She put the ball straight past the goalie in the top right corner of the net. This would be the game winning goal. Micaella Swain added an 80' insurance goal off of her right foot. The Bulldogs found running room in the middle of the field and a numbers advantage when Alimata Rabo found an open Kelsey Smith, who found an open Swain for the goal. Rabo and Smith were on the record for the assists. Sola Tsuruta won the GAC Tournament Most Valuable Player award as well as making the All-GAC Tournament Team. Ashley Hughes, Alimata Rabo, Micaella Swain, and Laura Jorgensen joined her on the All-GAC Tournament Team for the Dawgs.

This is SWOSU's fifth GAC Tournament Championship in school history. The win propels SWOSU to the NCAA Tournament with an automatic bid. Their match site and first opponent in the tournament will be revealed on Monday, November 7.


Wayne, and Oklahoma University Football.


He was preceded in death by his parents, eight brothers, his wife Dorris, and, most recently, his youngest son Mike.

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






loved ones on their own. The South Western Oklahoma Development Authority (SWODA) Area Agency on Aging (AAA) believes it's important caregivers know they are not alone in their struggle to help their loved ones.

SWODAAAA provides for respite services for eligible caregivers in partnership with the Department of Human Services, Aging Services Division.

Studies have shown caregivers will give better care, maintain their own health, and have reduced levels of stress if they can get away from the responsibilities of providing care even if it's for only a few hours. Respite does just that. It provides a way for a caregiver to get out of the everyday routine of caring for their loved one.



For example, a caregiver has the option of using respite services to go to a doctor's appointment, to get their hair done, to visit friends at a coffee shop, or even go to a movie.

Caregivers are defined as "people of any age caring for someone 60 years of age or older with two Activities of Daily Living Impairments (dressing, bathing, eating, transferring, toileting, or walking) and/or requiring substantial assistance because of a cognitive or other mental impairment."

Oklahoma Centennial Ranch Award Recognized

The State Historic Preservation Office of the

Oklahoma Historical Office has approved an Oklahoma Centennial Ranch Award to the Robert William and Eva Mae Winters' ranch. Brothers Gary Ralph Winters of Altus and Richard William Winters of Konawa and cousin Danny Wayne Winters of Oklahoma City are owners of the ranch. They are grandsons of the original homesteaders. The ranch is located in western Kiowa County ranch, south of Lone Wolf and next to the North Fork of the Red River.

In the Kiowa-Comanche-Apache opening, a land lottery was offered on August 6, 1901 which formed Kiowa, Comanche, and Caddo Counties. Some persons entered the drawing and never intended to homestead a farm or ranch, but rather as a way to make money. Many sold their lot number to people who actually wanted to homestead a claim with at least five years of residency and improvements. It seems logical that Robert William Winters had bought a claim from someone whose name had been drawn in the lottery because his one brother and one sister also got claims to the north of his claim. That would have been highly improbable in a drawing of 13,000 claims out of the 165,000 registered persons.

Robert William Winters filed his claim on October 29, 1901 as recorded on the Land Track Books. He married

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Bulldog Upset Bid of No. 17 Harding Falls Short

Jon Chidester SWOSU Media Relations the No. 17-ranked team in

Division II on the ropes in the fourth quarter following a blocked punt that was returned for a touchdown that gave the Dawgs a lead, but it was Harding who finished the quarter strong by scoring two consecutive touchdowns to escape Weatherford by a 37-29 margin.

The blocked punt started with Ashton Hamby who got his hand on the ball which sent it straight up into the air and directly into Keldric Martin's hands with running room in front of him. Martin took it 34 yards for the score and everyone inside Milam Stadium felt the momentum shift. The special teams score gave SWOSU a 23-21 lead with 11:17 remaining in the game. Harding

SWOSU Football had did however, block the ensuing extra-point to make the score only a six-point swing. On the following drive, the defense was one down away from keeping momentum on the home side but could not hold the Bisons on fourth and five, which kept their drive alive. It was nearly a fourand-out and SWOSU would have gotten the ball back in Harding territory looking to extend the lead. Instead, the Bisons converted the fourth down play with a nine-yard pass which was HU quarterback Cole Keylon's only pass completion of the game. Seven plays later, Harding had regained the lead with a 29-yard touchdown run.

A Bulldog offense three-out-out on the following drive did not help the cause, but it was a failed punt attempt that proved costly. Harding got the ball at the 17-yard

line and extended the lead to two scores four runs later. Trailing 37-23, SWOSU inched back with a sevenplay, 75-yard drive capped off by a 24-yard Tylan Morton run, but a failed onside kick sealed the outcome. 37-29 final.

Morton finished the afternoon 19-38 through the air for 161 yards and one touchdown, and added another 81 yards on the ground which included the aforementioned score. Special teams was a roller coaster for both sides on Saturday. They might be the reason the game was so close to begin with. Harding jumped out to a 14-point lead in the first quarter before SWOSU finally got a stop on defense to force a punt. The Bisons long snapped floated a wobbly ball to the punter who could not handle the snap, and the Dawgs recovered the poorly executed play in Harding territory.

Morton found Jalen Lampley in the end zone for a 13-yard touchdown pass and catch and SWOSU was right back in the game at 14-7 nearing the end of the first quarter.

Lampley led all pass catchers in the contest with six grabs for 70 yards and his score.

The defense came alive in the second quarter, holding Harding to zero points. Meanwhile, the Bulldogs managed a field goal late in the half to go into the locker room trailing just 14-10.

Both sides scored one touchdown in the third quarter and entering the fourth it was Harding with a 21-17 lead.

Defensively, SWOSU was led by Anakin Aupiu who tallied 13 tackles. Martin added 11, followed by Courtney Ledyard and Jameon Mitchell with 10 apiece.

SWOSU's loss moves them to 3-7 on the season. They have lost five straight games and will look to finally stop that streak next Saturday against Northwestern in the season finale. That game will be Senior Day, where all Bulldogs playing their final game will be honored prior to the start of the game.

Proof-like 1831 Gold Coin attains High Price at Auction

In American Numismatics are some coins which set the bar very high in excellence and quality.

The 1831 a \$5 gold half eagle coin had a mintage total of 140,594 pieces. The above pictured coin was saved by an astute collector of a finely maid product of Philadelphia.

For reasons known only by the mint most of the 1831 \$5 gold coin production

were melted. John Dannreuther, a rare coin dealer in Hollywood, California, estimates no more than 50 examples survive today.

The above coin was certified by the Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS) as a Mint State 65+. It sold at auction on October 20, 2022, for \$387,750.

WEATHERFORD CC / RESOLUTION - The Weatherford City Commission has approved a resolution of a project sponsorship for a transportation alternatives program application and maintenance commitment for the Shooting Star Park. It's an 80/20 \$2 million grant. The grant application is due by the end of November. **CLINTON CC / AGREEMENT -** Clinton City Council meeting as the hospital authority approved a managment services agreement with Carrus Healthcare for the provisions of management services for Clinton Regional Hospital. Carrus Healthcare is scheduled to take over operations of the hospital on January 1st, 2023.







WEATHERFORD CC / HOTEL MOTEL - The

Weatherford City Commission approved four grant recommendations from the hotel/motel committee for various events in the city of Weaterford. One of the grants was for \$12,000 for an Oklahoma Cornhole Association major tournament to be held in Weatherford in December. The commission also approved grant funding for the Weatherford High School Max Dipple wrestling tournament in December, the Weatherford classic basketball tournament in January and billboard advertising for the Stafford Air & Space Museum.

BURNS FLAT / SPACEPORT - A new organization formed by a group of talented aviation professionals plans to locate at the Oklahoma Spaceport at Burns Flat. Premium aerospace Oklahoma will be a difference maker in the aircraft painting industry and maintenance service. It's a four phase project that will bring 450-600 new jobs.

WEATHERFORD / AIRPORT - Weatherford economic development director Yolanda Creswell said a ribbon cutting for the newly completed airport terminal is planned for next month. Officials said pre-registration will need to be done to attend the event scheduled for November 22 at 1pm. Any questions can be directed to economic development director Creswell. **OHP** / **CANTON LAKE** - The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said its dive team was activated on Sunday for a submerged vehicle in Canton Lake at the Canadian campground area boat ramp. Authorities said a person had reported he was a passenger in a vehicle that went into the water with three other occupants who did not make it out. Divers conducted a recon of the vehicle and the surrounding area and did not find any victims. Authorities said they did find everyone safe. Divers recovered the vehicle in about 8 feet of water.

WRH / INPATIENT OUTPATIENT VOLUMES -

The chief executive officer of Weatherford Regional Hospital told the hospital authority that the hospital has had busy inpatient and outpatient volumes. Brian Denton said all emergency rooms were full and said it has been that way recently. Denton said there were about 900 emergency room visits in the month of October.

WEATHERFORD / FIRE CAUSE - Weatherford Fire Chief Mike Karlin provides an update on the latest in the investigation, surrounding the cause of the fire at Trinity Baptist church in Weatherford. Karlin said the official cause will be listed as undetermined even though officials are leaning heavily that the fire was electrical in nature. Karlin said the fire originated above the ceiling in the northeast corner of the sanctuary.

Outside of the event times, the Weatherford Recycling Center accepts the following items at all times through their drop-off bins located in the drive-thru: cardboard, aluminum cans, plastics (no styrofoam), paper, and steel & tin cans. If you have glass that needs to be handled, you can drop it off at the Old Landfill Location on E 1035 Rd. (off of South Custer) Monday to Friday and on the first Saturday of the month, 8am to 12pm & 1pm to 5pm.

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






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
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

Eva Mae Stephenson on August 3, 1904. He paid \$146.61 for the 113.97 acres on July 23, 1908 to the General Land Office of the Dept. of the Interior at Lawton. After improvements and a period of living on the land, he received his Homestead Patent, signed by US President William Taft on April 23, 1909. There were six children raised on the ranch which included Robert Carl, Clyde, Thelma, Lillian, Ralph and Bryce Winters. One unusual, but funny, and interesting fact was that the three original neighbors had "cold weather" names: Winters, Snow, and Frost.

Even though this homestead was located in Kiowa County, Robert's parents John William and Sarah Frances (Howard) Winters, had homestead their farm about one mile south in Jackson County across the North Fork of the Red River. That property was designated as an Oklahoma Centennial Ranch in April 1989.

Throughout the 129 years, cattle have been the main income on the land. Warren Winters, Gary Ralph Winters' son, has operated a cow-calf herd on the ranch for several years.

To qualify for a Centennial Farm or Ranch Award, a property must be occupied by a family member for at least 100 years and must currently be operated or occupied by a family member or leased out by a family member. The property must include a minimum of 40 acres and gross annual sales of at least \$1,000. The Oklahoma Historical Society and the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry have sponsored the Centennial Farm and Ranch Awards for 33 years, in which time 69 awards have been given in Kiowa County. The Kiowa County Courthouse on the second floor has a large wooden county map display with brass labels depicting the locations of Oklahoma Centennial Farms and Ranches in the county.





HIGHER GROUND Let's Have a Party



Don't invite your friends to your banquets? This is part of one of the most misunderstood or neglected teachings of Jesus. It sounds strange to our modern ears. We tend to associate with comfortable easy friends who we enjoy being with. In Luke 14:12-14, Jesus speaking to the Pharisees about humility and pride,

spoke these words; "Suppose you gave a lunch or a dinner," he said, "Do not invite your friends, your brothers or sisters, or our relatives, or your rich neighbors. If you do, they may invite you to eat with them. So you will be paid back. But when you give a big dinner invite those who are poor. Also invite those who can't walk, the disabled and the blind. Then you will be blessed. Your guests can't pay you back. But you will be paid back when those who are right with God rise from the dead."

We are entering the season of many banquets, meals and celebrations. This teaching of Jesus sounds harsh and one commentator softens it by saying that in the original language it could be translated, "don't habitually, or only invite those you are comfortable with and then fail to associate with the marginalized of the community." It is easy to limit our association with a few comfortable friends instead of reaching out to others. This self-centered lifestyle is in opposition to that which Jesus taught and displayed.

This brings us to the Thanksgiving season. There will be many church Thanksgiving meals offered. (Which I thoroughly enjoy) We make a point to say that everyone is welcome, church member or not-which is proper. But that word is seldom heard by those on the outskirts of society, the marginalized, the poor, the forgotten. We assume that somehow, they will come if they want to, but we are not too concerned about their absence. Let

me propose another option.

I am privileged, and I use that term purposely, to meet with and help pay the utility bills of many in this group, though our Ministerial Alliance program. This puts me in contact with people that I would not normally associate with. I count this a privilege because I am brought face to face with the people that Jesus loved and cared for. They count. They bear the imprint of the Divine, as those made in the image of God. They may know that churches will have a Thanksgiving meal, but they assume that "it's not for them."

Could we not get out of our comfort zone and in a face to face contact, share an intentional invitation to come and be a part of a free feast, celebrating the bounty of God's blessings with no agenda attached, simply as an act of love-even offering transportation if needed. That is a little scary for some, who may struggle with their identity and insecurity. But, as the well-known saying goes, "Ships are safe in the harbor but that is not what ships are built for." Christians are not reborn to play it safe.
