history. The painting is a colorized version of a 1917 photo, capturing the Cottonwood Band outside on the grounds as they arrived at the Capitol. The musicians were the very first band to play at the newly completed Capitol building in August of 1917.

The band was based just outside of Weatherford and got its name from the rural Cottonwood dependent school. All of the band members were in-laws of the Wright and Witzel families, except for Ervey Hayes. They played together between 1916-1919 and became a highly sought after troupe for their big brass sound and rhythm. They performed in fairs and celebrations around western Oklahoma and garnered sponsorship from the Farmer's Union (an organization with a rich history and impact in Oklahoma's and the nation's direction). An article from the The Oklahoman, published on August 23, 1917, details the day the band's music filled the halls and the lives of all in and near the Capitol.

"The state capitol yesterday lay swathed in its customary cloak of dignified quiet. From the subbasement to the place where the dome ought to be there was not a sound to break the great stillness... suddenly somewhere in the state house a brass band broke loose with a blare and fanfare that was new to the capitol. It was an unheard of thing and the first music to stimulate the echoes in the state house since its completion."

The paper goes on, recounting the day and how several hundred men and women from the Capitol and nearby, clamored through the halls in search of the band. Eventually, the streaming line of people found the band on the 4th floor playing "Dixie," and the sheer passion in which they played led to the myriad of officials, clerks, stenographers, and locals to break out into cheers and dance. The band continued to play for several more songs, all the while shaking hands and exchanging greetings with the excited delegates in town for the state convention.

That day, captured in memento black and white, lay instilled in the hearts of those in attendance and will, now forever, be enshrined in Oklahoma's halls of history. Framed and in color, the painting is on display for all who come to the Capitol to see. For those with a keen eye, there are some fun Easter eggs hidden among the painting, and if you look close enough... you may just start to hear the bum-bum-bum of the bass...and catch a trill of their horns as the music once again echoes through the newly renovated halls.



Whatever the reason, they are individuals bearing the image of the divine and thus worthy of our respect and love.

We desperately need some healthy role models, not perfect people, but those who demonstrate unselfish love and respect, and who are willing to give of their time and love to serve as mentors to young couples. U.S. Bank Notes Get Redesigned

U.S. currency will see new designs in the future. This is to help deter counterfeiters who use very sophisticated systems to defraud our money.

With enhanced security features new bank notes will be released. The Advanced Counterfeit Deterrence (ACD) Committee,

working with the U.S. Secret Service, the U.S. Treasury, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, and the Federal Reserved System, is undertaking this monumental task.

Every new design will be published six to eight months before their release. The \$10 bill will be the first, with a new design, and be released in 2026. In 2028, will see the new \$50; a new \$5 bill in 2032; with the \$100 note in 2034.

These new notes will be a chance for currency collectors to get a new example of each note as they are available through a local bank.

BOARD OF ED FILINGS - Candidates for board of education filings and Western Technology center will file declarations of candidacy next month. The filings will begin Monday, December 5th. The threeday filing period ends at 5pm on December 7th. A primary election for those seats will be held February 14th. Any runoff races will be held during the April 4th general election.

WEATHERFORD / CHRISTMAS PARADE -The deadline to submit entries for this year's Weatherford Christmas parade is coming soon. Chamber of commerce executive director Elizabeth Amen said parade registration is due November 29th. The Christmas parade will be held on December 1st.

CUSTER CO / HWY 33 CLOSURE - As construction continues on four bridges on Highway 33 in the western part of Custer County, District 3 Commissioner Lyle Miller said the detours advised by ODOT are to travel through Clinton or Putnam but increased traffic on county roads around the area is reason for caution due to the number of vehicles using them. The project is slated for 270 working days, but Miller said that snow and or rain days can extend the length of the project timeline.

CLINTON / MUSIC SERIES - The City of Clinton has been awarded multi-year matching grants of \$90,000 to present 10 free outdoor concerts annually in 2023, 2024 and 2025. Chamber of commerce president Julie Caldwell said the concert series will be a huge benefit to the Clinton community. Caldwell said the Clinton Levitt Amp Music series line up will be announced soon. She said the concerts will be held in the Ampitheatre of Mclain Rogers Park.

ELK CITY / PROPERTY - The city of Elk City recently purchased some additional property for development. Mayor Cory Spieker said the city is making sure it has future retail space. Spieker said the city is working on infrastructure and recently completed a \$1.7 million new water line project.

WATONGA / AIRPORT DEDICATION - The city of Watonga and the Oklahoma Aeronautics Commission hosted a public celebration and ribbon cutting for the new airport runway project at Watonga regional airport. The \$2.8 million project was 100% federally funded by the FAA.

CLINTON / GLANCY MOTEL - Clinton Mayor David Berrong said the Clinton economic development authority heard two proposals surrounding the Glancy Motel and Pop Hicks properties. The authority will meet again in early December to discuss the proposals.

CUSTER CO / LAWTER ROAD - Custer County district 2 commissioner Bruce Walker provided an update on the Lawter Road project. Walker said currently the project is scheduled to go to bid in January; however, he said the work cannot go to bid until a pipeline is moved.

WEATHERFORD SB / FUNDRAISERS During a recent Weatherford School Board of Education meeting, board member Dennis Green expressed his concern over the number of fundraisers district-wide. Superintendent Jill Henderson said the district will gather information on the number of fundraisers and report back to the board during

Jon Chidester Assistant AD/Media Relations fell to Cameron 83-71 in a

non-conference matchup after Cameron scored over 50 points in the second half of Wednesday's contest.

Following a slow start to the game on both sides, things picked up in the second half. It was Cameron though who got the better of the Dawgs when the pace quickened.

SWOSU weathered first half shooting woes and warmed up as the half came to a close. After jumping out to an early 10-2 lead, the home side trailed nearly the rest of the half and by as many as seven. After shots began to fall late, they entered the half time locker room trailing just 32-31. The Dawgs opened

SWOSUMen's Basketball the contest 3-of-22 (14%) before finishing six for their last 14.

Cameron also helped the Dawgs hang around with 11 turnovers in the half and by only shooting a touch better than the home side at 33%.

The Bulldogs improved their shooting in the second half, but Cameron couldn't miss. The Aggies were a blistering 19-for-29 which included 7-for-11 from beyond the arc. They led by as many as 17 points with 5:56 remaining in the contest after going on a three-point spree with four treys in four-straight possessions.

From there, SWOSU tried to make a run and cut it to as few as seven but couldn't overcome the margin.

Cameron finished at 47.7% from the field compared SWOSU's 29.2%. Both teams knocked down eight three-point shots, but Cameron did so with 15 fewer attempted.

Kamden Gipson led the team with 24 points, followed by Ben Smith with 13 and Mark Berry who added 10.

Both sides turned the ball over all game. Cameron finished with 24, SWOSU 16.

SWOSU was outrebounded 55-38.

The Bulldogs move to 1-2 on the season and will travel to Missouri next week to compete in the Drury Classic on Tuesday and Wednesday. SWOSU will face Drury on day one and William Jewell a day later.


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45th Annual Santa's Village, Holiday Bazaar Event to be Hosted in Watonga





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


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Gipson and Zinn Named as Newest Bulldogs of the Week
