Weatherford Thomas P. Stafford Regional Airport Opens New Terminal

The Weatherford Stafford Regional Airport hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony in front of a large crowd of local community members and aviation enthusiasts on Tuesday, November 22, in honor of the airport's new terminal building.

The \$1.6 million project began in December of 2021 and took nearly 11 months to complete. The new terminal building was necessary because the current building, attached to the Stafford Air and Space Museum, would not accommodate the increasing air traffic that the airport was experiencing. The improvements will provide visiting pilots and passengers with a grand new entryway as they fly into Weatherford.

"I am proud to help dedicate Weatherford's new terminal, which will be a significant asset for the surrounding region. Already home to a first-class air and space museum, Weatherford is a growing community because of its forward-thinking policies and prime location in western Oklahoma. This new terminal will empower economic development, support jobs and grow workforce opportunities as it draws new businesses to the area for years to come."

Senator Jim Inhofe served as the keynote speaker and led the ceremonial ribbon cutting, signifying the optimistic future of both the Weatherford Stafford

Regional Airport and the City of Weatherford. In addition to cutting the ribbon on the new terminal, this event allowed pilots and aviation enthusiasts, alike, an opportunity to provide Senator Inhofe with a collective thank you from the industry and a warm sendoff as his final term as US Senator comes to a close. With over 50 years of public service, Inhofe has been the number one supporter of aviation throughout the country as well as back home in Oklahoma.

One of Oklahoma's favorite astronauts and local hero General Tom Stafford was in attendance to provide remarks on this momentous occasion for Weatherford.

Oklahoma Secretary of Transportation Tim Gatz stated, "This airport is evidence of the advanced commitment by the City of Weatherford for improving aviation infrastructure. Since the community's founding, civic leaders and citizens have dedicated their resources and time to invest in pro-growth projects. This airport has become a symbol of the character and integrity that embodies the Oklahoma standard."

This project would not have been possible without the leadership of the City of Weatherford, the Oklahoma Aeronautics Commission, and the FAA working together to find a funding solution to complete such a critical project.



It is safe to say that Weatherford is doing amazing work to help create tomorrow's aviation and aerospace workforce which is so vital to the state's second-largest industry.



PSO/RATE REVIEW - The Public Service Company of Oklahoma (PSO) has filed for a rate review. Officials say the proposal will provide funding to harden the PSO electrical grid, meaning power outages would be less frequent, smaller, and shorter. This proposal will also strive to encourage clean energy and protect not only the public, but PSO workers as well. If approved, the proposal would increase PSO net revenue by \$173 million annually to reflect current levels of investment and costs incurred to serve customers. For the average residential customer who uses 1100 kilowatt hours per month, the increase would be about \$14.11 a month.

BECKHAM/ALBRIGHT - An Elk City man has waived a preliminary hearing in Beckham County District Court to charges of first-degree arson and attempted first degree murder. 24-year-old Alexander Michael Albright allegedly set fire to the outside of a home in Elk City that was occupied at the time by his ex-girlfriend and three others. Albright will be back in court for formal arraignment on December 7th.

CLINTON/HOSPITAL UPDATE - Clinton Mayor David Berrong says he believes "bigger and better days" are on the horizon for Clinton Regional Hospital as Carrus Health will manage the hospital on an interim basis over a 12-month period. Carrus will begin managing the hospital starting January 1st.

Buzzer Beater Lifts Dawgs over William Jewell

Junior forward DeAngelo jump shot. Adkins got a tip-in layup as time expired, giving men's basketball a 63-62 victory over William Jewell College on day two of the Drury

The win makes it a perfect 2-0 showing for the Bulldogs at the event, heading into Thanksgiving Break. They move to 3-2 on the season and will rest up for another busy week starting next Monday.

SWOSU survived a scare from the Cardinals. The Bulldogs held a 10-point lead with just under four minutes to play in the contest and had that lead change hands with 12 seconds to play following a made WJC

Trailing 62-61 out of the ensuing timeout, Kamden Gipson drove to the hole and missed a layup but was saved by a crashing Adkins who grabbed the offensive board and quickly put the ball back in the basketball before the buzzer sounded.

The rebound marked Adkins' 11th of the game – tying a career high. He finished with a team best 15 points, also earning the first double-double of his SWOSU career.

It was a game controlled mostly by SWOSU, with five lead changes and one tie nearly all coming in the early going. After a back-and-forth start, the Dawgs

distanced themselves for much of the remainder leading by seven at halftime and by as many as 11 in the second half before the Cardinals made their final run.

Final numbers showed SWOSU shooting 40% compared to WJC's 38%. After knocking down 17 three-point shots on Tuesday, SWOSU was just 7-for-24 on Wednesday.

On defense, SWOSU won the turnover battle 16-10 but got slightly outrebounded 39-35.

Gipson was the second-best scoring option. After his career game against Drury, he finished with nine points and a season best five assists.

Mentioned above, the Bulldogs will rest up with the holiday before a three-game week next week. They begin on Monday (11/28) when they host nonconference opponent Randall University. Conference play kicks off Thursday (12/1) when Oklahoma Baptist comes to town. They'll finish the week on the road in Durant on Saturday (12/3) for more GAC action against Southeastern.

SWOSU women's basketball took on the

Lubbock Christian in the Pioneer Cellular Event Center on Monday night. They fell just short of the upset, 73-67.

SWOSU came out on fire from the three-point line. They shot 50% from behind the arc in the first half. The catalyst for the hot start was Adysen Wilson. She went into halftime 6-9 from the field and 6-8 from three for 18 points. This scoring mark is her new career high.

The Bulldogs hustled into the locker room up 43-36 and looking good. SWOSU biggest lead was when they led by 11 at the 6:37 mark of the second quarter. They outshot and out rebounded LCU by slim margins in the first half.

The third quarter is where things turned. Lubbock Christian outscored SWOSU 19-9 in the quarter to retake the lead going into the 4th quarter, a lead they did not relinquish. The last SWOSU lead of the game ended at 3:43 in the third quarter.

SWOSU went cold when they needed it most. After shooting 50% from three in the first half, the Lady Bulldogs went 0-8 from three in the second half. Wilson, who notched her career high in one half, did not attempt a shot in the final two quarters.

Wilson led with 18 points; Morgan Smith also had 18 points in the losing effort. Shamica Smith added 13 points and and a team high six rebounds. Averi Zinn threw in 10 points and a team high six assists.

SWOSU drops to 0-4 on the young season. Their non-conference schedule halts for now, with their next game against foe Oklahoma Baptist. The game will be on December 1 at 5:30 pm, back in the Pioneer Cellular Event Center.

On November 9, 2022, this milestone was reached with international engagement from over 220 countries! The digital repository collection consists of over 25,000 items. Here are some quick facts about our collections: 3,202 items, from SWOSU journals and publications, have been downloaded 242,344 times in 210 countries.

13,408 items, from SWOSU History and Productions, have been downloaded 197,238 times in 191 countries

171 videos and audio recordings, from all SWOSU collections, have been streamed 2,112 times.

Weatherford Chamber to Celebrate the Season with "Miracle on Main" Parade and "Here for Cheer" Celebrations



SWOSU Students Awarded "Reach Higher" Scholarship

Twelve Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) students involved in the Reach Higher degree program were recently awarded scholarships. Eight students received a \$1500 Finish Line scholarship from the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education: Rhonda Bennett (Anadarko), Denise Boswell (Weatherford), Janessa Bustin (Sayre), Tara Denney (Cheyenne), Brayan Flores (Oklahoma City), Jennifer Nightengale (Foss), Antonae Thompson (Oklahoma City) and Tyler Welch (Gans). Four students each received a \$750 Reach Higher Scholarship from the SWOSU Foundation: Amanda Blankenship (Owasso), Joshua Gossman (Moore), Brad Jones (Mustang), and Abigail Ulery (Oklahoma City).

The Finish Line scholarship program funds State System colleges and universities participating in the Reach Higher adult degree completion programs to target scholarships for adult students nearing degree completion. Reach Higher is a degree-finishing program designed for adults who have successfully completed some college coursework but still need a college degree. The program of study results in a Bachelor of Science degree in Organizational Leadership with an area of focus

in general business.

"The . . . program is "a life-changing opportunity for me," stated Jones. "As a working adult raising a family, I've wondered if I would ever finish what I started over 20 years ago. The Reach Higher program has given me renewed confidence in myself as a student. It is lifting the burden of disappointment I've had in not achieving something my parents and others invested in."

Nightengale stated that completing her degree sets a positive example for her children. "I believe the benefits from the Reach Higher program and from getting a college education will lead me and my family to a better future."

Ulery has overcome some challenging life experiences and sees the Reach Higher program as a path to overcome those struggles while financially supporting her family. "What the Reach Higher program means to me is flexibility," stated Ulery. "I can complete my work after I get off from my job."

The Reach Higher program "has helped me in so many ways," said Boswell, "being a single mom with three kids, working and going to school, [Reach Higher] made it possible for someone like me to finish my degree."

Boswell also plans to continue her education by pursuing a master's degree at SWOSU.

Dr. Todd Wiggen, the coordinator of SWOSU's Organizational Leadership program, Reach Higher Flex Finish, said the Reach Higher adult-friendly degree completion options through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education encourage adults who have earned some college credit to complete their degrees successfully.

"The program is really geared to working adults by offering flexible enrollment and online coursework. Students can go as fast or as slow as they want and are able," Wiggen said. "Many of our students may only take a class or two a semester due to their other obligations, and others will take five to six courses to try and finish as rapidly as possible. It is truly up to the individual." The program is also waiting on approval of other areas of focus options, including education, psychology, and technology, to provide even greater flexibility for students.

The Reach Higher/Organizational Leadership program is currently accepting students for the 2023 spring semester at SWOSU. Additional information is available by contacting Wiggen.
