is once again partnering with the South Western Oklahoma Development Authority (SWODA) Area Agency on Aging (AAA), along with other Area Agencies on Aging across the state, to assist with funding direct services for people 55 years of age and older in need of some type assistance not otherwise provided by other agencies.

Some of the types of services include dentures and/or dental work, minor home repairs, wheelchair ramps and heaters and/or heater repairs.

There is an application and funds will be used on a first come, first served basis until they are all utilized. Funding for each type of service will be limited. Those who have desperate or unique needs should file an application because those situations are considered on a case-by-case basis. Assistance will be available once per person every three years.


The SWODA Aging Services Information Assistant receives calls daily from older people and/or their caregivers with needs, and many are

Masonic told nothing is available to help. This Masonic funding enables AAA staff to assist many callers with resources not available previously.

This funding "will not only help Oklahoma's older population but will also relieve some of the stress placed on caregivers whose older relatives are continually turned down because of the lack of resources for needed help," said Anita Martinez, SWODA director of Aging Services.

Counties covered by the SWODA AAA are Beckham, Custer, Greer, Harmon, Jackson, Kiowa, Roger Mills and Washita. The SWODA AAA has in-depth working knowledge of current government programs that are available to older Oklahomans, as well as knowledge of the existence of service gaps or non-covered needs of Oklahoma's older citizens.

# HIGHER GROUND

#### Heroes of the Faith



I suppose all of us have heroes; those who have suffered bravely or who stood tall in the midst of criticism and personal loss. George Washington Carver, William Wilberforce, Corrie Ten Boom, and Joni Eareckson Tada are just a few that have inspired and encouraged me at times and convicted me of my feeble efforts as well. But

in the field of missions there is one individual who, for me, stands out among many who have labored fearlessly and with deep devotion for the sake of Christ.

Hudson Taylor was a missionary innovator and founder of the China Inland Mission in the mid 19th century. Much to the dismay of his fellow missionaries, he chose to dress in Chinese clothing

that included wearing his hair in a long pigtail. He felt it would give him acceptance among those he was trying to reach. His methods often brought criticism from his friends and fellow workers. His faith in God to provide for his needs is legendary.

Unselfish to a fault, on one occasion he found himself broke just two weeks before his wedding. He had given everything away to 60 or 70 victims of the famine. He gave his fiancé permission to withdraw from the commitment if she wished. Her parents had died when she was a child so she replied, "Don't forget that I was an orphan in a faraway land. God has been my Father all these years. Do you think I shall be afraid to trust Him now?" Their relationship was full of love and affection.

Their ministry, although successful in many ways was not without its problems. In 1867 their fifth child died of hydrocephalus. A few weeks later, he wrote his mother in England, "I know not how to write. Our dear little Gracie! How we miss her! As I take the walks I used to take with her tripping by my side, the thought comes anew like a throb of agony, is it possible that I shall never more feel the pressure of that little hand, and yet, she is far holier, far happier than she could ever have been here."

But the tragic death seemed to unify the mission effort as those who had been critics rallied around

the young couple. Later after moving inland to the city of Yankchow, they faced mobs and riots that caused them to flee for their lives on one occasion. Often Hudson would become depressed to the point of considering suicide but his wife was his source of strength. Then the ultimate loss, his dear wife, Marie, who had borne eight children in twelve years, died of Tuberculosis. Later he married a dear friend who loved and cared for the children and enabled him to be absent for months at a time, visiting and encouraging the outlying mission posts.

Hudson died at the age of 73, having founded the China Inland Mission which utilized the services of 825 missionaries. On one occasion he said, "God chose me because I was weak enough. God does not do his great work by large committees. He trains somebody to be quiet enough, little enough, and then God uses him." Do yourself a favor by going to your public or church library and read the story of this great man of faith.

# "The Coin Guy" Gold Rush Ingots





On December 5, 1848, President James Polk announced that gold, in great quantity, had been discovered in California. Samples of it were found to be of the highest quality.

The ensuing gold rush witnessed many people going to California with picks, shovels and pans to process the gold. One thing was not brought

with them—available hard currency. Gold dust was abundant. Coins were scarce.

A "gold dust" economy became the norm and was difficult to measure it accurately for commerce. Saloons employed men with large thumbs and fore-fingers to "pinch" gold dust from a poke for a drink.

Private mints filled the need for making money by transforming raw gold into gold ingots. Some even minted gold coins that are now rare and very valuable.

When her grandfather could no longer prepare nutritious food for himself, he was placed on the list for Mobile Meals. Through Mobile Meals he received a hot, nutritious meal each day along with a visit from a volunteer. Megan was touched by the kindness of the Mobile Meals volunteers, and she continues to advocate for ending food insecurity for older adults. She presents

an engaging program to students and adults about the importance of giving back to the community, making healthy choices and the importance of staying alert when severe weather is in the forecast.

Gold has worked as a television meteorologist in Texas, Missouri and Oklahoma. She can be seen on weekend mornings on News on Six in Tulsa. Gold's early interest in the weather led her to the University of Oklahoma where, in addition to being involved in many campus activities and organizations, she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Meteorology and a minor in Broadcast Journalism.

Gold is a talented musician and has played the flute for many years. She used her performing skills to begin competing in the Miss Oklahoma's Outstanding Teen Competition in 2013. During her four years competing as a teen she was named the rookie talent and overall activewear winner and a Top 5 finalist. She continued in the Miss Oklahoma Competition where she held local titles of Miss Bethany, Miss Tulsa and Miss Bricktown. As Miss Bricktown, she received preliminary awards for onstage question and social impact pitch, red carpet and talent and was named Miss Oklahoma 2022.

CUSTER COUNTY / HL - The Custer County Board of Commissioners met as the Board of Trustees of the Custer County Law Enforcement Center and reviewed repairs paid for by the trust. District 2 Commissioner Bruce Walker highlighted the roof repairs and a grease trap repair. The payment for roof repairs was made at approximately \$420,000 and was originally bid at \$386,000. Walker was also elected as Chairman for the Law Enforcement Center Board of Trustees with District 3 Commissioner Lyle Miller being elected as Vice Chairman. Commissioners also said they would move their inspections of the jail from yearly to quarterly.

**HYDRO FD / CALLS FOR SERVICE** - The number of calls for service for the Hydro Fire Department increased significantly in 2022. Fire Chief Kirk Hartman said the department had 316 calls for service in 2022 compared to 235 calls in 2021.

CLINTON CC / TRADEWINDS - During a special meeting yesterday, Clinton City Council approved a funding request of \$550,000 from the Clinton Economic Development authority for the acquisition and demolition of the Tradewinds property. Spokesperson Russ Meacham says there will be additional costs for asbestos abatement and demolition. He says the transaction is expected to close on Friday.

CLINTON / BLUEPEAK - During a Clinton City Council meeting, the council under the consent agenda acknowledged a notice of rate adjustment by Bluepeak for commercial video service, starting in February. In a letter to the city of Clinton, Bluepeak said depending on your plan, adjustments will increase anywhere from \$5-\$8 per month. Bluepeak officials said the reason for the increased cost for tv service is that traditional cable channel, broadcast networks, and sports channels have continued to raise their rates roughly every year.

WEATHERFORD CC / LIFT STATION - The Weatherford City Commission has approved a change order for the Weatherford business and technology north park lift station. Water Superintendent Trent Perkins says the cost of the change order to the city is just over \$46,000.

WEATHERFORD CC / ENGINEERING - The Weatherford City Commission recently approved an agreement between the city and Myers Engineering for engineering services on the Lyle and Lawter Road projects as required by the Oklahoma Department of Transportation. The engineering services would be on an as-needed basis during construction.

CUSTER COUNTY / BEEF SEMINAR - A four-county beef seminar will be held in the month of January at the Custer County fairgrounds in Clinton. Custer County OSU Extension Agriculture/4-H Educator Larry Bryen says the event will be held January 18th starting at 9 a.m.

**WEATHERFORD / YMCA -** The annual fundraising campaign for the Great Plains Family YMCA in Weatherford is right around the corner. Spokesperson Megan Cleveland says the fundraising campaign begins in February.

WRH/EMERGENCY ROOM PATIENTS - An increase of emergency room patients have occurred recently at Weatherford Regional Hospital. Chief Executive officer Brian Denton said typically a busy day in the ER was treating some 30-plus patients in a day, now the number has been hovering in the 40's and 50's consistently. Denton attributes the spike to the temporary closure of Clinton Regional Hospital. Denton said Weatherford Regional Hospital is working to accommodate additional chemotherapy patients in connection with the temporary closure of Clinton Regional Hospital.

### Smith's Career Day Pushes SWOSU to a Win

For the first time this season, the SWOSU

Lady Bulldogs have a winning streak on their hands. They put up a season high 91 on Saturday afternoon to defeat Southern Arkansas, 91-81, thanks to a career high 32 points from Morgan Smith.

SWOSU moves to 3-8 overall and 3-3 in GAC play on the year. This is the second straight win for the Lady Dawgs. Their next contest will be during an Arkansas road trip. They will take on Ouachita Baptist in Arkadelphia next Thursday, before going across the street on Saturday to battle the Reddies of Henderson State.

Smith put up almost one point per minute today, shattering her previous career high of 20 points that she hit twice last season. She went 13-21 from the field and 4-8 from behind the three-point line. This is the largest point total put up by a SWOSU women's basketball player this season.

Things played fairly evenly through the first two quarters. It was deadlocked at 17-17 after the first quarter and SAU held a three-point lead heading

into the break. Five ties and three lead changes highlighted a competitive first half.

The third quarter turned the tide toward the Lady Bulldogs. They shot a blistering 61% from the field and 40% from three in this quarter. With SAU dealing with some foul trouble at the top of their rotation, the Lady Dawgs turned up the pressure and put together a run sparked by forcing turnovers and getting transition baskets off of those turnovers. They outscored SAU 30-20 and took a 66-59 lead going into the fourth quarter.

SAU attempted to comeback, but SWOSU looked composed down the stretch. They took smart shots, didn't commit dumb fouls in the late stages of the game, and got necessary stops. SWOSU also outscored SAU 25-22 in the fourth to secure the second straight victory.

Smith had the team high 32 points, as aforementioned. Averi Zinn put in 17 points, four rebounds, and three steals. Layni Zinn totaled 15 points and four rebounds as well. Shamica Smith led the team in rebounding with nine boards and added 14 points. Macy Gore continues to be an all-around player as she had six points, six rebounds, seven assists, and four steals.

momentum was squarely in the hands of the home team.

The Muleriders weathered that storm though and calmed things down, halting the ferocious comeback which turned the game into an 'every possession matters' affair down the stretch.

SWOSU trailed by just one point in the final minute of the game thanks to a set play that isolated Ben Smith in the paint for an easy layup, but could not make the needed play to flip the score in their favor after that. They fouled to extend the game but did not get the necessary offense to remain hopeful and ended up falling in a close contest.

Smith led the Dawgs with 18 points on the afternoon and added four rebounds. Kamden Gipson had 16, followed by Mark Berry with 13 and Goodlow with 11.

Final shooting numbers had SAU at 46.8% compared to SWOSU's 38.3%. The Muleriders outrebounded SWOSU 45-33 but committed four more turnovers than the home side. The loss drops SWOSU back to 6-6 on the season and 2-4 in GAC play. Southern Arkansas improves to 9-3 and 5-1 in league play. SWOSU hits the road to Arkadelphia next week for games against Ouachita and Henderson State on the typical Thursday and Saturday slate.
