

Thirty days prior to the sale, the bulls are shipped back to the ranch. There, they receive dry hay and cattle cubes until they are sold as two-year-old bulls ready to work.

Prior to their annual sale, Mike stated that he was always nervous and doubtful, wondering if the buyers would come. When the sale is over, he is always humbled by the number of repeats and new buyers that attend.










Weatherford Community Habitat for Humanity welcomes the new family. Habitat for Humanity started this project in 2019 and the family is scheduled to move in at the end of February.

BLAINE CO / HENSLEY - The Blaine County Sher- | ELK CITY / GOLF CONSTRUCTION - The iff's Office says a bench warrant was issued this week in Blaine County District Court for Braden Donnie Scott Hensley for recklessly handling a firearm. Authorities say the warrant was issued following an investigation, surrounding a weapon being fired near Geary Elementary School while children and staff were present at dismissal time. Deputies took Hensley in custody at his residence east of Geary.

DEWEY CO / ACCIDENT - A Weatherford man is hospitalized in critical condition at OU Medical Center in OKC, following a two-vehicle accident on US 183, 2.5 miles south of Taloga in Dewey County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 64-year-old Henry Deaton is hospitalized after the pickup truck he was driving crossed the center line and struck an oncoming semi. Troopers say Deaton was ejected from his truck during the accident.

CADDO CO / OSDH - The Oklahoma State Department of Health has provided an update regarding an illness outbreak investigation affecting Custer and Caddo Counties. State health officials say cases have decreased since the start of the outbreak and the risk of contracting illness is reduced. To date, there have been 53 confirmed cases with over a quarter of those requiring hospitalization. Additionally, according to the CDC results, their analysis of the epidemiologic data and environmental testing did not implicate a single food, water or event that could serve as a source of infection for the outbreak.

golf course and public safety plans were presented to the Elk City Commission. The commission voted to hire the Elk City Golf and Country Club to manage the local golf course. Two architects also presented concepts for police department and fire station upgrades. Meanwhile, an April municipal vote will call for repurposing the existing half-cent sales tax adopted by voters for the new elementary school. That revenue would fund the fire and police department upgrades. The commission chose Reese Construction to go forward with concept planning if the sales tax continuation is approved in April. The repurposed sales tax would not increase taxes.

Anderson has surrendered his CLEET certificate and resigned from the WPD last week.


Kaylee Barkley (softball) and Caleb Clines (baseball)

The Davis family weighs their cattle at birth, weaning, and yearling. They also perform DNA tests and ultrasounds.

"Every calf that goes through the shoot at Davis Angus has a DNA blood card," Debbie explained. They send in their samples for each calf to the American Angus Association, which has an extensive database.

Davis Angus also focuses on feed efficiency, calving ease, and carcass traits.

"The Targeting the Brand is the program that the American Angus Association has for those cattle that are eligible for Certified Angus Beef (CAB)," Debbie said.

This helps producers target high-quality beef. Your bulls have to meet certain requirements, such as marbling and dollar grid values, to become CAB.

The association also provides a program where producers can sell their Angus cattle through the Certified Angus Beef program. If you have an Angus calf, you can sell and produce a better product for more money through this program.



Oklahoma History: Discoveries from the Spiro Tribes





Oklahoma has always had a heavy influence in the world of agriculture even long before the United States was even a dream. If we travel to the eastern edge of the state, along the southern bank of the Arkansas River, we'd find in front of us a complex of twelve mounds, layers of dirt, systemically placed between the period of A.D. 850 and 1450. Around the mounds were ceremonial areas and one of the greatest cultures and city the world would see. There, at the site of those mounds, we can get a glimpse into the past – a glimpse into the Spiro Mounds.

Located seven miles outside Spiro, Oklahoma, the mounds site is rich with history and listed by the Oklahoma Historical Society (OHS) as "the only prehistoric Native archaeological site in Oklahoma open to the public." The site is home to the Spiro Mounds Archaeological Center, which preserves the site and offers exhibits, info slides, and explorable trails.

The Spiro Mounds were created by the prehistoric Spiro people, who built a sophisticated culture featuring an extensive trade network, religious center, and political system. Off of the Arkansas River, the mound site was center-point for the Spiro people to spread their influence,

an influence like their speech, which has roots in the modern Wichita, Kichai, Caddo, Pawnee, and Arikara speakers.

The area created a specific type of culture called the Mississippian Culture. This culture featured leadership from many language groups and supported several million people. Their trade routes went from the California Coast to the Gulf of Mexico and linked Oklahoma to the other regional mound centers. At the time, the mound regions were: the Cahokia (located in East St. Louis), Moundville (Alabama), Etowah (Georgia), and the Spiro Mounds.

The Spiro Mounds consisted of one burial mound, two temple mounds, and nine house mounds. The burial mound, named "Craig", gained world renown as incredible pieces of art and artifacts were extracted from the site. Its cavity created an almost perfect preservation of fragile artifacts and trinkets like those made from freshwater pearls, conch shells, wood and copper. The state of the conditions also allowed fabrics and perishables like animal fur, lace, feathers and several stone statuaries like those made from flint clay and Mill Creek chert bifaces.

The burial mound has been referred to as the "Great Mortuary" and has been called "King Tut of the Arkansas Valley" by the Kansas City Star in 1935. Archeologists believe the near-perfect condition of the chamber to have come from the earth minerals coming through the mound, hardening the cedar log walls, which made them resistant to decay and protected the artifacts.

Unfortunately, between 1933 and 1935, the Craig Mound was excavated through a commercial enterprise and while tunneling into the mound, they broke through one of the log walls breaking fragile artifacts and caused others to disintegrate. Thousands of other rare and priceless objects were sold to collectors. Once they finished, they dynamited the burial chamber and sold others artifacts to collectors around the world. Some have been returned through donation and others have been found and documented by scholars.

While word got out about the sheer number of artifacts coming out of the site, their better preservation and more elaborate decoration than any other Mississippian site, the Oklahoma Legislature passed a licensing requirement to protect the site which stopped all future commercial excavation from 1935 onwards. In 1936, OU began a scientific excavation, uncovering 600 complete or partial burials with thousands of other artifacts. Archaeologists oversaw the Works Progress Administration (WPA) until its end in 1941 due to World War II.

The land became privately owned and farmed until the 1960s when it was purchased by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and eventually turned into the Spiro Mounds Archaeological State Park in 1978. The mound was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1969 and transferred under the OHS in 1991.

Today, the expanded Interpretivie Center at the Spiro Mounds allows visitors to learn about one of the most prolific art and cultural discoveries of Oklahoma's past.









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
