



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Oklahoma Senator Jech Pushes for Important Bills Before May 31



As we approach the constitutionally required Sine Die adjournment on May 31, the Legislature is continuing to work through the budget process and sorting through the figures that differ between the Senate and House proposals.

One of the main topics of discussion this session has been delivering a tax cut to Oklahomans. The Senate voted to eliminate the state portion of the grocery tax earlier this year, meaning Oklahoma families can see annual savings up to a few hundred dollars once the tax cut is effective.

Our work also continues on policy measures as we prepare final versions to be sent to the governor's desk. A few of the measures I've authored have already been signed into law, including Senate Bill 1713. This measure provides that school districts that purchase their insurance through interlocal cooperative agreements must have a board of directors that includes one member with 10 or more years of experience in property and casualty insurance and another member who is an American Academy of Actuaries member. Having the oversight of these professionals will make sure our schools have proper guidance and can make educated decisions related to their coverage, especially as insurance costs continue to rise.

Of the House measures I've worked on, four have been approved by the governor, including HB 3643, HB 3196, HB 3458 and HB 3460. These measures relate to several subjects from modernizing state recordkeeping processes; helping address the statewide shortage of large animal veterinarians; designating "Space Day" in Oklahoma to honor General Thomas P. Stafford; and providing that the Attorney General and Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority may

receive confidential records from the Oklahoma Tax Commission for purposes related to compliance, investigations or prosecution. It was a pleasure to work with our colleagues in the House on these bills that will benefit Oklahomans, and I appreciate the governor's consideration and approval.

As Senate Rural Caucus Chair, I am happy to report that the Rural Caucus has had many meaningful discussions this session.

During our weekly meetings, we've been joined by state officials including Attorney General Gentner Drummond, State Treasurer Todd Russ, Oklahoma Broadband Office Executive Director Mike Sanders, and Executive Director for the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority Adria Berry. We greatly appreciate these individuals and agencies for visiting with us and providing insight into their departments work in rural areas of the state.

In case you missed it, I recently visited with two Custer County students to discuss the importance of Agricultural Programs and the benefits they can provide to the next generation.

In addition to legislative work, we took time last week to recognize Oklahoma's agriculturists and 4-H members at the Capitol. On Ag Day, we heard from a number of producers from across the state, as well as Secretary Arthur and other officials from the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture Food and Forestry.



CUSTER CO COMM / THOMAS – Custer County Commissioners recently approved an interlocal agreement between Custer County and the city of Thomas for a street paving project, says District 2 County Commissioner Bruce Walker. The District 2 will replace asphalt with concrete along Highway 33 and 1st Street (County Road N2390). The city of Thomas was awarded a \$75,000 grant for the work.

THOMAS/ SIDEWALK PROJECT - There are multiple sidewalk construction projects going on in Thomas, currently. "One that we're finally going to be done with is Main Street," explained Mayor Jeff Gose. Goodwill will be located in the Weatherford Shopping Center. Hangry Joe's location will be on East Main Street between Taco Bell and Luigi's Restaurant.

WEST OK / TORNADO CLEANUP - Clean-up and damage assessment is in full swing in Custer County and the surrounding area, following tornado damage. According to Custer County Emergency Management Director Mike Galloway, although all damage sites have been found in Custer County, evaluations are still underway. The National Weather Service says a survey crew found EF2 damage outside of Custer City.

HINTON SB / BOND - The Hinton School Board of Education recently decided to call for a bond election in August for improvements in the district. Matt Reichert is Vice President of Stephen H. McDonald & Associates Incorporated. The \$23.6 million bond would be used for a cheer, wrestling, baseball, softball, and track facility, including locker rooms, renovations at the multipurpose building, a Comet training center with a weight room, a classroom, and a saferoom project at the middle school and roof work at the old gymnasium.

Rick Bigger discussed the mission of AMR, with representing your patients' best interests being the most important role of an EMS. Bigger says the ambulance service went on 2400 calls last year and transported around 1800 patients.

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

West OK Cooperative Seeks to Revitalize Historic Sections of Clinton

With the Route 66 Centennial just a little under 2 years away, several rural communities along the historic path of the Mother Road are expecting tourism to boom. These centennial celebrations, with the prospect of countless visitors, have created opportunities to redevelop and reimagine what these historic communities look like, and a community of artists and entrepreneurs based in Clinton are helping shape a vision for the future of Clinton.

The West Ok Co-op, described as a "a community of artists, art inspired entrepreneurs, and seekers that have roots in Western Oklahoma," according

to their website, is spearheading these community driven redevelopment efforts to engage travelers.

"The West OK Co-op is really focusing on the historic east side of Clinton, which, you know, just happens to be where our Route 66 is," said Jason Smith, Co-founder and President of the Board for the West Ok Co-op. While most visitors to Clinton are aware of the flagship Route 66 Museum that sits on the west side of town, Smith believes that Clinton has much more to offer visitors and that by developing the East Side of Clinton, they could get people to "slow down through Clinton, because the reality is that we do have an off-main main, so


sometimes you'll have tourists or even regional people here that don't even realize Clinton has a historic downtown because they just flew through on Gary Boulevard," added Smith. This slowdown also has the potential to dramatically affect the local economy.

But Smith is not alone. West Ok Co-op's treasurer, Andrew Stone, is one of the artists trying to drum up public interest and comments on their plans. "We're developing a series of projects, one being the exit 69 corridor into Clinton, that through a series of landmarks we can start talking about the history of Clinton, getting people to historic downtown Clinton and then developing an itinerary that's based around the storytelling of Western Oklahoma," said Stone, who is also a professional architectural designer.

Smith and Stone are currently planning to pursue grants and funds centered around Route 66, but they also want to ensure that residents of Clinton have a hand and voice in collectively developing this new vision of Clinton.

One of their greatest hopes is to ensure the representation of the various cultures that make up Clinton. They invite Clinton residents as well as residents of Western Oklahoma to join their open house meetings at their art space located at 613 Frisco Ave. They plan to hold open meetings every Tuesday at 6pm during the summer months, and they invite any and all who are interested to join them.

to high school graduation requirements has been signed into law.

House Bill 2158 was authored by Rep. Dick Lowe, R-Amber, who said empowering students to take control of their finances starts with education.

"Requiring students to master financial literacy before graduating isn't just about balancing budgets," Lowe said. "It's about laying a good foundation as they begin the next chapter of their lives by equipping them with the tools they need to navigate financial decisions thoughtfully."

The measure requires students to complete 1/2 unit of personal financial literacy coursework in the 10th, 11th or 12th grade. The coursework may be integrated into an existing class or taught on its own. HB2158 outlines certain topics to be taught, including retirement planning, investing, online banking features and credit scores.

"I proudly signed HB 2158 into law because students need these crucial financial literacy skills to thrive in their lives and careers," said Governor Kevin Stitt. "I'm proud of Representative Lowe for introducing this important piece of legislation, and I'm excited for the doors this opens for Oklahoma students."

HB2158 will take effect July 1, 2025.



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

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17th Annual All-Sports Golf Classic Names Six Inductees into Hall of Fame



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


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The Weatherford Athletic Department honored 6 individuals, as well as the 2003 State Runner-up wrestling team, for their contributions to athletics at Weatherford High School with the 15th Annual Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony this past Friday. Among the honorees inducted into the hall of fame were Henry Frizzell, Mike Smith, Michael Roberson, Courtney Harper, Trent Ratteree and Brent Bell. Selected by committee, these individuals embody the ethos of a Weatherford Eagle. Here are brief summaries of the honorees.

Henry Frizzell, while not a native of Weatherford, helped secure funds in the early 80's with other Weatherford residents to purchase the land where Eagle Field now stands. Frizzell spent countless nights volunteering to the help maintain the field, which was originally called Jaycee Field in honor of the organization that Frizzell led that secured funding to make the field a reality.

Mike Smith, a graduate of Weatherford High School's class of 1972 as well as a former Eagle athlete, would go on to have a successful 42 year career teaching and coaching high school sports in Oklahoma and Texas. Smith retired in 2021 after coaching for 25 years in Wolfe City, Texas.

Michael Roberson, a graduate of Weatherford High School's Class of 1991, competed on the varsity basketball and baseball teams during his accomplishments on the baseball diamond during commitment to students Athletes is unwavering.

high school help secure his position at 3rd base during the 1991 All State Baseball game and he helped propel the Eagles to the State Quarterfinals during the 89-90 season.

Courtney Harper, a graduate of Weatherford High School's Class of 2008, was key a key member of Weatherford High School's undefeated State Championship basketball team of 2007. Harper would win several honors during her high school career including All State honors during her senior year. She would eventually play college basketball as SWOSU and UCO and was inducted into the Oklahoma Basketball Hall of Fame with the 2007 Weatherford Lady Eagles basketball team in 2017.

Trent Ratteree, a graduate of Weatherford High School's Class of 2007, was an All State athlete in basketball and track and field during his time at Weatherford High School. But it was his passion for Football that would lead him to become a walk on for the OU Football team. He was a three time winner of the Derrick Shepard Walk of of the Year award and he was also a semi-finalist for the Burlsworth Trophy.
