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JR Head Appointed to Lead Bulldog Baseball Program

Jon Chidester SWOSU Athletic Director Todd Helton announced 10-year SWOSU Baseball assistant coach JR Head has been named new leader of the

Head becomes the fifth head baseball coach in SWOSU's NCAA era and the eighth all-time.

"I am very pleased to announce JR Head as our next head baseball coach," said Helton. "Coach Head has a proven record of leadership, recruitment, and skill as a baseball coach. He has earned his chance to be a head coach and we are excited to see him display the vision and passion that we know will bring Bulldog baseball future success."

Head has spent the last decade as an assistant for the Bulldogs working alongside former head coach Zack Saunders, who recently stepped down after 13 seasons. He's held many titles as a SWOSU baseball coach, beginning as a volunteer in the fall of 2014 before becoming a graduate assistant from 2016-19. After obtaining his master's degree as a GA, he stayed on with the program as the lead assistant from 2019 through the conclusion of the 2024 season.

In total, including his two seasons as a studentathlete at SWOSU prior to coaching, he's called Weatherford his home for the last 12 years.

"I am very excited for this opportunity," exclaimed Head. "SWOSU is such a special place with so many great people and I'm very grateful to get to continue being a Bulldog. I look forward to building on the foundation of the program and competing in the Great American Conference – one of the best conferences in Division II."

As the lead assistant with a heavy role in the offense, Head has commanded a Bulldog lineup that has consistently landed at the top of the GAC in multiple areas. The Bulldogs have finished inside the top-three in team batting average in four of the past six seasons.

This year, the Dawgs ranked second in the league with a .304 average led by three All-GAC selections. Two of those three led the conference in



an individual category, doubles and stolen bases, while the other was second on the doubles list just behind a SWOSU leader. All three finished inside the top-15 in individual batting average.

In 2021, Head helped tutor the program's first GAC Player of the Year, outfielder Alex Bedard, who went on to become an All-American – one of two Head has coached while at SWOSU.

In 2016, Head assisted with the Bulldogs as they reached new heights by winning the Great American Conference regular season championship and advanced to the NCAA Division II Central Region Championships. SWOSU won an NCAA era record 34 games and had eight players earn All-GAC recognition.

As a student-athlete, he played for SWOSU from 2013-14, starting 74 games in centerfield. He helped lead SWOSU to back-to-back conference tournament appearances and a second-place finish

in the GAC in 2013. As a senior, Head was named an Honorable Mention All-GAC selection. He was also a two-time member on the GAC All-Academic

Before joining the Bulldogs, Head played two seasons at Northern Oklahoma College – Enid, where he was an All-Region and All-American selection in 2012 and a two-time National Gold Glove winner.

A native of Midwest City, Okla., Head earned his bachelor's degree in Parks & Recreation Management in 2014 and obtained a master's degree in Sports Management in 2018 – each from SWOSU. He is married to Chelsea (Bates) Head, a former member of the Lady Bulldog Basketball program. The two reside in Weatherford and have a two-year-old daughter, Halle.


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SWOSU Reach Higher Program Awards over \$59,000 in Scholarships

The Reach Higher degree-finishing program

at Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) awarded over \$59,000 in scholarships to 20 SWOSU students during the 2023-2024 academic year, including the 2024 summer semester. Over \$54,000 came from a Finish Line scholarship funded by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. The remaining \$5,000 came from Reach Higher Scholarships funded by the SWOSU Foundation.

The Finish Line scholarship program provides funds for state system colleges and universities participating in the adult degree completion programs, targeting scholarships for adult students nearing degree completion. Reach Higher Flex Finish is designed for adults that have successfully completed some college coursework but have not yet finished a degree. The program results in a Bachelor of Science degree in Organizational Leadership with a focus in one of four areas: business, education, psychology, or technology.

"This program has already made a big impact that has been noticed at work and reflected positively in my recent yearly evaluation," stated Leanne Hileman.

"It is also helping me start up the small business my family has encouraged me to start once I finally finish school. This program and degree will help me to become not only a better leader but a better person for my family."

Not completing a degree the first time was a major disappointment for Brad Jones. "I was disappointed in myself and had a sense of unfulfillment in not completing a degree," he expressed. "I'm gaining confidence in the skills I am learning in the courses and, hopefully, will earn a promotion in my workplace. I'm going to be able to show my son what can be accomplished with patience, perseverance, and hard work."

Dr. Todd Wiggen, Coordinator of SWOSU's Organizational Leadership program, said that the Reach Higher adult-friendly degree completion options through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education encourage adults who have earned some college credit to complete their degrees

adults who, for whatever reason, did not finish their degree the first time around. We offer flexible enrollment and online coursework. Students can set their own pace in completing their degree," Wiggen

As the program coordinator and advisor, Wiggen provides personalized advising to ensure students finish in the most efficient way possible. In addition, the Reach Higher program is projected to have even greater scholarship funding for the 2024-2025 academic year. "I fully expect to be able to provide many more scholarships for both existing and new students in the program," stated Wiggen.

The Reach Higher/Organizational Leadership program is currently accepting students for the 2024 fall semester at SWOSU. 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



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Oklahoma History: The Origins of Collegiate and Secondary Education in Oklahoma

After the Organic Act established the Oklahoma

Territory, a legislative staff formed to help create a more systematic governing body. President Benjamin Harrison appointed George W. Steele as the new governor of the Oklahoma Territory, which would see tremendous advances in available public works/systems. The territory, with many fresh faces from the Land Run of 1889, was in dire need of schools and forms of higher education.

Governor Steele worked for seventeen months. During his time, he was a major advocate for public schools and universities. By his urging, the First Oklahoma Territorial legislature set up three collegiate schools in December of 1890. The three universities were the Norman Territorial University (which would later become the University of Oklahoma), the Oklahoma Agriculture and Mechanical College (that would go on to form Oklahoma State University), and the Central

State Normal School in Edmond (University of Central Oklahoma).

For these collegiate level schools to be at the same level of the rest of the country, they would need knowledgeable and well-trained teachers. So, two additional "teacher training" schools were opened a few years later; these normal schools were dubbed Northwestern State Normal (Northwestern Oklahoma State University) in Alva which opened in 1897 and Southwestern State Normal (Southwestern Oklahoma State University) in Weatherford in 1901.

The legislation also established a college in Langston in 1897 for African Americans: Colored Agricultural and Normal University (Langston University). As part of the push for "equal" opportunity, a secondary institution, the University Preparatory School at Tonkawa, was created in 1901 to prep high school graduates for entry to the University of Oklahoma.

Quickly after the establishment of these colleges and

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secondary schools, Oklahoma Territory found itself preparing for statehood. Part of the proposed entry as a state to the United States would see the territory combine with the remaining portion of Indian Territory. Early discussions between the territories were heated due to the feeling of an educational imbalance as most of the college and university locations would be on the western side. As part of a compromise, "Oklahoma Territory offered to duplicate in the eastern part of the new state the number and types of institutions that existed in the west side" (Oklahoma History Society).

The agreement was signed, and the First Oklahoma Legislature established a list of schools for the east. The colleges created were the Oklahoma Industrial Institute and College for Girls (University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma) in Chickasha and the Oklahoma School for Mines and Metallurgy (Eastern Oklahoma State College) in Wilburton. Then, three normal institutes were opened: East Central State Normal (East Central University) in Ada, Northeastern State Normal (Northeastern State University) in Tahlequah, and Southeastern State Normal (Southeastern Oklahoma State University) in Durant. To match the preparatory school for OU, the secondary Eastern University Preparatory School was established in Claremore.

With the addition of these higher education schools, the legislation wanted to ensure more students had access to adequate preparation to any of the normal secondary or university options. So, the formation of six additional district schools were created in 1909 to get students ready for entry to Stillwater's Oklahoma A&M and the other normal colleges. These six district schools were split evenly between the western and eastern halves of the state.



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




The Trifecta: Syring Lands on ABCA/Rawlings All-Region Team

The 2024 ABCA/Rawlings NCAA Div. II All-Region teams and Regional Players of the Year have been announced in all eight regions. Jackson Syring, for a third time this award season, found himself as a Second

Syring had previously been named all-region from the NCBWA and D2CCA and completes the trifecta for region recognition with his latest nod from the ABCA. He becomes the eighth Bulldog to earn All-Region honors from the ABCA in SWOSU's NCAA era. He led the team in batting average, hits, triples, RBIs, slugging percentage, hit by pitches, and on-base percentage. Syring's .394 batting average and 19 doubles both ranked second in the GAC, while his 57 RBIs finished as the fifth most in the league.

The ABCA All-America team was first recognized in 1949 and now includes nine divisions: NCAA Divisions I, II and III, NAIA, NJCAA Divisions I, II and III, Pacific Association Division, and high school. ABCA/Rawlings Gold Glove teams were first recognized in 2007.

Founded in 1945, the American Baseball Coaches Association is the primary professional organization for baseball coaches at the amateur level. Its over 15,000 members represent all 50 states and 41 countries. Since its initial meeting of 27 college baseball coaches in June 1945, Association membership has broadened to include nine divisions: NCAA Division I, II and III, NAIA, NJCAA, Pacific Association Division, High School, Youth and Travel.
