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



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

HIGHER **GROUND**

What Are You Thinking!?



Peter wrote his second letter to his friends to "stimulate them to wholesome thinking." (2 Peter:3:1) We are in need of people who demonstrate wholesome thinking for a change.

I recently read a book by John

Maxwell entitled, Thinking for a Change. The idea he pursued was not just about the need to be a thinking person instead of just reacting from emotion. It mostly discussed how positive actions come about through reflective thinking, focused thinking, and shared thinking. It is not primarily a religious book, in that not a lot of Scripture is quoted. But the principles are certainly Biblical and desperately needed in this day of reactionary thinking.

The psalmist prayed that "The words of my

mouth and the meditations of my heart be pleasing in your sight, O Lord, my rock and Redeemer." Ralph Waldo Emerson declared that "Life consists of what a man is thinking about all day."

Maxwell wrote, "Our thoughts determine our destiny. Our destiny determines our legacy."

The Apostle Paul instructed us to think about things that are true. . . noble. . . just. . . pure. . . lovely. . . are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy; think on these things. (Phil.4:8)

Maxwell suggests that reflective thinking is "like a crock-pot of the mind. It encourages your thoughts to simmer until they are done." To often we go to a conference or seminar and take notes in our desire to learn but go home and seldom get with a partner and discuss what we have gained. (This could be true to a church service, too!) He suggests three things to reflect upon. "What did I learn today? What should I share? What should

Another area that he considers significant is "Possibility thinking." Too often when a new idea is presented our thoughts go to all the problems that might come with that idea. That may be a good start but it should not end there.

Consider the positive things that could come

from the idea.

Could this benefit people? Is this something that would stir our imagination and create possibilities for action that would enhance or advance the Kingdom of God? How can we deal with the problems that might ensue?

Our natural reaction is to not ask the difficult questions because that requires work and we would rather play it safe and not make waves. Sometimes our insecurities surface because "we didn't think of that."

He closes the book with a chapter on "Unselfish thinking." It is worth the price of the book (which cost me 50 cents at the local Et Cetera shop). Seriously, this is invaluable thinking. Alan Loy McGinnis stated, "There is no more noble occupation in the world than to assist another human being---to help someone succeed."

Albert Einstein once said," many times a day I realize how much my own outer and inner life is built upon the labors of my fellow men, both living and dead, and how earnestly I must exert myself in order to give in return as much as I

have received." Someone once said, "Most of my best ideas come from other people, from books I've read or conversations I've shared." We need to think deeply and live differently. Have a thoughtful day!



CLINTON / LUCAS - U.S. Third District CADDO COUNTY / BURN BAN EXTENSION Congressman Frank Lucas was one of the guest speakers at the most recent Custer County Cattlemen's Association meeting in Clinton. Congressman Lucas says the farm bill needs to be tweaked to reflect today's prices, with the main discussion coming down to a 20% difference in pricing. Congress will head back into session next month following the presidential election.

CUSTER CO / ELECTION TURNOUT - Custer County Election Board Secretary Anne Brown indicates that voter turnout for the upcoming Presidential Election next month will be heavy. "There is an increased number of people voting by absentee ballot and some of that is just that. They don't want to stand in line for other reasons. I'm not sure what that would be," explained Brown. We're always encouraging people to vote absentee by mail or to vote early here in our office." Custer county elections officials say early in-person voting begins Wednesday, October 30th. Early voting is from 8-6 Wednesday - Friday and from 8-2 on Saturday, November 2nd. In addition to the presidential election, the city of Clinton has a race for both mayor and Ward 4 City Council. Polling sites will be open on election day, November 5th from 7am - 7pm.

Caddo County Commissioners have decided to extend the burn ban for a period not to exceed 14 days. The exceptions surrounding outdoor welding, cutting torch, grinding activities, and outdoor cooking remain in place under specific conditions. Fireworks are also prohibited during the ban.

CANUTE / GYM FLOOR - Repairs are being made to the gym floor at Canute Public Schools after a geo-thermal pipe busted, causing water damage several weeks ago, says Superintendent Jamie Cook. "We had a flood in the gym about six weeks ago and had to replace the floor. [It's] coming along nicely." Superintendent Cook says the new gym floor should be ready for use in the next 6-8 weeks.

SWODA / SCAMMERS - The Southwestern Oklahoma Development Authority (SWODA) is urging the public to be cautious of scammers trying to obtain your personal and medical identity information. It is important to protect your Medicare number and only share it with trusted individuals. SWODA officials say Medicare will not call you for your Medicare number, they already have it. It is equally important to report suspected medical identity theft or Medicare fraud to your local senior Medicare patrol program or by calling SWODA.



Rights Month—an annual tradition led by the National Consumer Voice for Quality Long-Term Care, or Consumer Voice, to raise awareness of the dignity, respect, and self-determination of long-term care residents. While October has been set aside to spotlight these crucial rights, ensuring respect and empowerment for residents is a commitment that should continue throughout the year.

This year's theme, "The Power of My Voice," emphasizes the importance of self-empowerment for residents, encouraging them to express their preferences, advocate for their personal growth, and pursue fulfilling lives. Lori Smetanka, executive director of Consumer Voice, said that resident voices are central to decision-making in care settings.

"Residents' voices are the most important at the decision-making table," Smetanka said. "This year's theme empowers them to express their likes and dislikes and passionately pursue the lives they wish to lead."

The Nursing Home Reform Law of 1987 guarantees that nursing home residents across the United States retain specific rights, including personalized care, respect, privacy, and freedom to make choices about their daily lives. This law also ensures that residents of other facilities, such as assisted living and residential care facilities, continue to enjoy their rights as American citizens. Residents' Rights Month is dedicated to reminding us of these protections and recognizing the unique contributions of those who call these facilities home.

Working year-round, the National Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program supports these rights, providing advocacy and guidance for long-term care residents and their families. SWOSU Bulldawgs Fall to Southeastern 30-15 on 2024's Homecoming

SWOSU threw for a season high 256 yards

but fell 30-15 on Homecoming to Southeastern Oklahoma State.

The Dawgs scored on a 72-yard pass and catch from Tate Robards to Julian Stratford just before halftime, and got within two scores late following a Keyshawn Walls rushing score – but could not produce enough scoring to catch Southeastern on the scoreboard.

Straford's touchdown, his first of the season, came with just eight seconds remaining in the half. Robards caught him in stride down the sideline at around the 50-yard line and Stratford did the rest. It put SWOSU within striking distance heading into the break, trailing just 9-7.

Southeastern forced a safety on the first play of the game and added a touchdown drive on their following drive of the first quarter before getting held scoreless the rest of the half. They regrouped at halftime though, putting up 21 third quarter points which proved to be enough. Walls' first rushing touchdown of the year came with 6:28 left to play in the game.

Completions to Jax Smith for gains of 12 and 46 moved the ball down the field, and Walls eventually punched it in. A successful two-point conversion put the score at 30-15 where it remained the rest of the game.

The Dawgs thought they were getting the ball back with a three-and-out right after the score, but a penalty on the Southeastern punt kept the Savage Storm drive alive and ruined any chance at a further comeback.

Robards played a significant portion of the game on Saturday. He finished 13-for-25 through the air for 229 yards with a touchdown and two interceptions.

Southeastern totaled 436 yards on offense, compared to the Dawgs' 290. SWOSU committed a season high 10 penalties for 104 yards. The Storm had eight for 65 yards.

Southeastern also controlled the ball for much of the game with over 39 minutes of time of possession.

Smith caught five passes for 96 yards. Stratford hauled in four for 94. Elijah Reed caught five for 44.

Keshaun Jackson (11) and Logan Monroe (10) combined for 21 tackles and 1.5 tackles for loss. Desmond Greene intercepted his sixth pass of the season in the first quarter.

SWOSU (2-6) will remain at home next week and play host to Southern Arkansas in week nine. Kickoff for that game (Nov. 2) will come at 2:00.






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
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
