

After a highly competitive selection process, we are thrilled to introduce the 52 outstanding students who make up Youth Leadership Oklahoma (YLOK) Class 25.

This year's class represents 26 counties and 47 different high schools across Oklahoma. From June 1-6, these future leaders will embark on a transformational journey across the state, traveling to Edmond, OKC, Tecumseh, Lawton, Sulphur, Tulsa, Stillwater, Enid, and OKC again.

CUSTER CO / FATALITY - A two-vehicle accident in Custer County claimed the lives of two people. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 42-year-old Monica Martinez of Clinton and 51-year-old Jeffery Terrell of Custer City died at the scene of the crash at U.S. 183 and County Road E 920, 4 miles west of Custer City. Troopers say Martinez drove left-of-center and struck Terrell's

vehicle head-on.

SWOSU/HODGE CENTER UPDATE - SWOSU President Dr. Diana Lovell says progress continues constructing the Hodge Center for Pharmacy and Rural Health. "Every room is shaped but not completed; we don't have doors on rooms, we don't have the laboratory equipment...but it is fabulous," explained Lovell. "I took a potential donor there. We had a wonderful, wonderful showing of the Hodge center." One of the benefits of the new building is that it will allow for expanded community health services of the SWOSU Center for Rural Health.

CLINTON / OHP HEADQUARTERS – A new Oklahoma Highway Patrol headquarters is still planned to locate at the former Glancey Motel property in Clinton. According to Mayor David Berrong, prior to bidding opening, anxiety around this project is at an all-time high. "It's been delayed, as government projects tend to be. We just wanted to put a sign out there, say, coming law enforcement center," said Berrong. The current HQ remains fully operational and will not be torn down until the new site is built.

Deborah McGee claimed the Ward 2 city council seat. Howard Hursh Sr. Wins the Ward 4 council seal. Neal Riley was elected to the council's member-at-large position.

CORDELL / ELECTION RESULTS - In Cordell, James Newman Jr. won the Ward 3 council seat. Additionally, Dale Selman defeated Randi Hunter for the office number 5 seat for Cordell's School Board of Education.

HINTON / ELECTION RESULTS - In Hinton, voters chose two candidates in each of the Board of Trustee races. In one race, Brian Sweany and Casey O'Neal McLoud were chosen by voters. In the other race for unexpired term, Joshua Cain Toho and Charles Basse were elected to trustee seats.





Oklahoma History: How the Eastern Redbud Became Our State Tree

Shakes off the last chill of winter, the landscape erupts in a brilliant wash of pink. Along country roads and in city parks alike, Eastern redbud trees burst into bloom. Their dark limbs suddenly become draped with thousands of tiny magenta blossoms. It's a spectacle that generations of Oklahomans have cherished as the first sign of spring's arrival. But the redbud is more than just a pretty harbinger of warmer days – it also holds a proud place as Oklahoma's official state tree, a title it has borne for nearly nine decades.

The redbud's journey to official status began with one woman's vision in the 1930s. Maimee Lee Browne, an Oklahoma City civic leader, fell in love with this tree's beauty and spearheaded a campaign to see it formally recognized.

Browne initially aimed to crown the redbud as Oklahoma's state flower – until discovering that honor already belonged to mistletoe, a territorialera emblem adopted in 1893. Undeterred, Browne shifted gears and focused on making it the state tree instead. She organized tree-planting drives and extolled the redbud's virtues to garden clubs and schools. Her grassroots efforts gradually won over public and political support.

By March 1937, after years of advocacy, a resolution to name the Eastern redbud as Oklahoma's state tree had passed the legislature and arrived on Governor E.W. Marland's desk for signing. Then, just as victory was at hand, an unexpected controversy nearly derailed Browne's plan.

As Governor Marland prepared to sign the redbud bill, a telegram from Mrs. Roberta Campbell Lawson of Tulsa arrived and threw the outcome into doubt. Lawson, a prominent clubwoman, warned that the redbud was actually the infamous "Judas tree" on which Judas Iscariot had hanged himself, and she argued that such a tree was too cursed to represent Oklahoma.

Fortunately, her sensational objection was swiftly debunked. John Y. Iskian, a resident of Oklahoma City who hailed from Jerusalem, stepped forward to explain that Oklahoma's Eastern redbud was an entirely different species from the Old World Judas tree. With that clarification, the scare died down, and Governor Marland signed the resolution on March 30, 1937, officially crowning the redbud as the state tree.

The legislature's proclamation even noted how the redbud's bright blossoms had welcomed "sturdy and hardy pioneers" settling the territory. That 1937 resolution gave Oklahoma its state tree, a status later cemented in 1971 when Governor David Hall signed it into law as a permanent statute.

In the decades since, the Eastern Redbud has only entrenched itself further in the landscape and culture of Oklahoma. Its natural range spreads across the state's eastern half, where redbuds often flourish in the understory of woodlands and along creek banks. Gardeners across Oklahoma prize the redbud as an ornamental, planting it in yards and parks for its vibrant spring display and the dappled summer shade of its heart-shaped leaves.


Wildlife benefits from it as well. Honeybees flock to the redbud's nectar-rich blooms, and birds such as bobwhite quail feast on its seed pods.

People have long found practical uses for the redbud beyond its beauty. Native American tribes and early settlers brewed the redbud's bark into teas to treat coughs and fevers, and even burned its wood for warmth in winter. Because the redbud is one of the first trees to bloom each year, families often brought its flowering branches indoors to "drive winter out," and children were fond of eating the blossoms as a sweet springtime snack. These humble traditions underscore how deeply the redbud was woven into everyday life on the frontier.

Today, the redbud continues to hold a special place in Oklahoma. Each spring, communities like Shawnee host Redbud Festivals where neighbors gather under the pink canopy of blossoms to celebrate the season. Nature lovers can also witness spectacular displays of wild redbuds. For example, the hillsides of the Chickasaw National Recreation Area in Sulphur turn vibrant fuchsia with redbud blooms each April.

In the end, the Eastern redbud stands as more than just a tree. It is a living emblem of Oklahoma's history and natural spirit. Each spring's explosion of pink blossoms is a reminder of pioneer days and of visionaries like Maimee Browne who helped make this tree a lasting symbol of the Sooner State.

As long as redbuds continue to bloom across Oklahoma, the state's story will keep blooming alongside them.



SWOSU Football Announces Pair of Staffing Changes for 2025 Season

SWOSU Football head coach Andrew Rice has

announced two changes to his full-time staff for the 2025 season. Staffing changes include the addition of Adam Carr, and the elevation of Marquise Cunningham from graduate assistant to full-time. Carr will coach quarterbacks, while Cunningham will be over the defensive line.

"Both of these coaches make this program better and will represent Bulldog Nation well," said Rice. "We were fired up to get Coach Carr onboard and to be able to retain Coach Cunningham."

Carr and Cunningham have been serving in their new roles since the start of the spring semester.

He began his coaching career in 2021 at Austin High School, working with quarterbacks.

Originally from St. Louis, Missouri, Carr graduated with a bachelor's degree in finance from Texas State back in 2022 during his time as a student assistant.

<u>Marquise Cunningham – Defensive Line Coach</u>

Cunningham has now spent more than five years in total at SWOSU, first as a player from 2020-22 before he transitioned to a coach after his playing career ended. He came to Weatherford from Los Medanos Junior College where he was a First Team All-Conference selection on defense.

Originally from Tracy, California, Cunningham holds two degrees from SWOSU -- a bachelor's in exercise science and a master's in sports management.


